**Congress Will Settle Rows**

**Wide Plain in Powerful Support Given Big Air Force Demands**

Washington, April 22—(AP)—Congress met the president, will settle arguments in the military's official family.

This is made plain in the powerful congressional support given to demands for a bigger Air Force despite the insistence of Secretary of Defense Forrestal, backed by President Truman, that the Army and Navy should be expanded equally.

Last year's authorization law which set up Forrestal's Defense Department provided that if any one of the three services—Army, Navy or Air—agreed with Forrestal the dispute could be settled in the White House. But Congress seems to have taken the bait.

Size of Air Force Issue

The immediate issue is the size of the Air Force. The air arm proposed at the close of the war that the peacetime organization be 70 groups of combat fighters.

But the White House and Budget bureau decided that economy demands left money enough to support only 55 groups. The Air Force bowed to the decision for two years, but did not recede from its ultimate goal of 70 groups.

Forrestal, opposing the overall military budget for Congress this spring, proposed 60 groups and recommended that the Air Force's response be set at 55-000. Later he agreed to a manpower expansion to 600,000 but held fast to the 55-group force plan.

He contended that expansion beyond 550,000 would require corresponding increases in the size of the Army and Navy to support the operations of the Air Force with transportation, supplies, dress of supply lines and other aid.

70-Group Force Needed

But Secretary for Air Symbion, in a recent appearance before the House Armed Services committee headed by Chairman Andrew (R., N. Y.), was asked if a 70-group force was needed. He answered: "The House has proposed a 55-group force. The pending defense appropriation bill which would provide for a 70-group force."

They matter settled until yesterday when Forrestal went to the Senate Armed Services committee headed by Senator Gurney (R.-I.D.). He proposed what amounted to a compromise—a 54-000,000 three-year program for defense, with the keynote on air power.

He still disagrees with the 70-group idea and proposed instead 58 groups. The four groups he would eliminate are not essential to peacetime forces. Two would be light bombers and two would be tactical bombers to support front line ground action. Two would be troop carrier groups, used for quick transfer of ground troops to critical areas.

Administration legal authorities are understood to have advised the White House that nothing in the law prevents the president from using his constitutional powers as commander-in-chief of the armed forces.  
The position of the administration therefore is said to be that Mr. Truman has the right to send troops wherever he may consider it in the nation's interest to do so.  
In addition, the administration is prepared to argue in effect, that the United States has assumed duties which are inescapable.  
Reorganizing Obligations  
Undersecretary of State Acheson held a news conference yesterday that when Austin made his statement to the U. N. he was in effect, recognizing obligations which this country already has under the charter.  
As a political matter, however, administration policy makers appear to have decided that the best course to follow, if troops are sent to the U. N. is to place the issue before Congress with an appeal for prompt appropriation.  
A crucial question immediately arises as to how Congress would react. Rather than consider it to be whether the president has the authority to send troops to the U. N. is to take any effective action before the British yield their authority over Palestine on May 15.  
According to present American proposals before the U. N., several nations are expected to vote against the plan.  
3. Arab and Jews must agree to stop fighting.  
4. The General Assembly must work out a trusteeship arrangement to take over from the British.  
5. The U. N. Trusteeship commission must agree upon a government for the Holy Land.

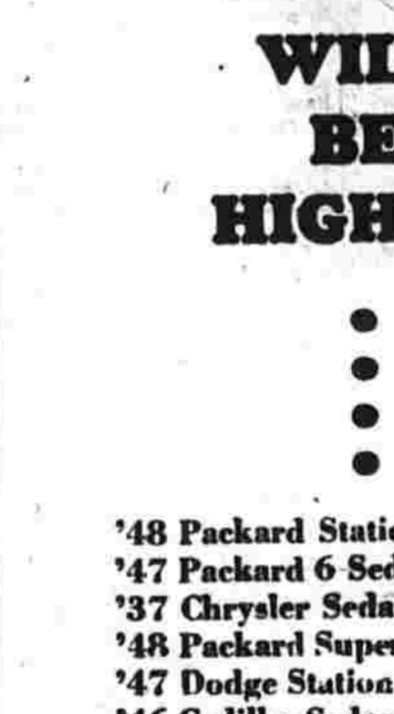
