Manchester Voting

In the 1944 Presidential election, over 85 per cent of the voters of Manchester exercised their franchise. That was the highest percentage of votes cast in any Connecticut community of comparable size.

Obviously enough, the one thing this proves above all others is that Manchester is characteristically a community of intelligent, responsible citizens. We say that not with bombastic local pride, but with thankfulness that we are privileged to live and work in a community which practices such high citizenship.

Now, perhaps such a citizenry would travel through fire and high water to cast its vote. But we think the statistic in question offers at least some evidence that Manchester's present system of voting does not present insuperable obstacles to the voting process.

We do not think there is any great inconvenience in Manchester voting today. The results seem to prove that there is not. Yet, at the same time, we can foresee a future time when more voting districts will prove a necessity. Our complaint against the proposal up for a town referendum vote next Wednesday is not only that it is premature, but also that it is misguided and impractical in its actual drawing of the district lines.

What the report said, in effect, was that we should arm ourselves, but that armament would really do little good. So we are proceeding to arm ourselves.

At Scarsdale the other night, addressing the Scarsdale chapter of United World Federalists, Mr. Finletter offered an analysis of our position, and it was a good one.

He said it would be "a tragic consequence" if, in our current program, we happened to forget the primary objective, which is, after all, peace.

Mr. Finletter described our present policy as an attempt to play a double-barreled game. "This double-barreled policy," he said, "is extremely difficult. It is not easy to say to someone that you are getting ready to knock his block off and at the same time ask him to sign a partnership with you. And yet that is exactly what we now have to do."

"We are not carrying out this double-barreled policy now. We have become obsessed with the barrel which is aimed at military security. We must change this imbalance immediately. The possibility of not doing this—of continuing to concentrate exclusively on the defense side of our policy—will be disastrous."

Mr. Finletter has given an all too accurate description of the trend of our foreign policy. Despite his hope for balance, the leaders and executors of our present policy have become completely absorbed with the purely military side of our policy. They are capable of visualizing war, of preparing for war, of making war. They are not capable of visualizing peace, or of making peace.

They specialize in toughness. They have lost sight of the original justification for toughness, which was supposed to be to create conditions for peace. There is no future visible limit on the toughness they are creating. They are on one track, which leads down a dead end street, where war is the only thing waiting for them and for us.

So far as they are concerned, peace is the forgotten objective. They are meshed in the fatal dynamism of war. That is the problem which faces the American people today.

The story told by the Senate Committee is as follows: During the war, our government paid over the sum of \$88,469,000, taxpayers' money, to King Ibn Saud of Saudi Arabia. These gifts to him paved the way for his granting of oil concessions to the Arabian-American Oil Company, which is a combination of four giant American oil companies.

While these companies were in process of buying their concessions with taxpayers' dollars, they promised that they would, when they began operating, supply the United States Navy with oil at 40 cents a barrel. But after they had obtained their concessions, and when the Navy desperately needed the oil, they advanced their price to \$1.05 a barrel, even though, at the same time, they were charging only 90 cents a barrel to a French company.

Woman Loses Life in Blaze

Wife of Superintendent Of Norwich State Hospital Victim Today
