Holy Land. He announced his intention of trying to keep essential government services, such as the broadcasting station, in operation after the British leave.

The main shooting was in the southwest corner of Jerusalem, where Arabs have been sniping at the Jewish Mekor Haim settlement for the past five months.

No Actual Attacks

Scattered shooting also was also heard in the Yemin Moabe quarter, Haganah militia returned from the Katamon quarter, which they recently wrested from the Arabs. There were no actual attacks, only sniping and return fire.

The Jewish agency said it was lodging a protest with the United Nations Consular Trust Commission against rupture of the cease fire order.

Arabs accused Jews of opening fire with rifle shots from Mekor Haim at the Arab section of upper Bakaia on the Bethlehem road.

Little news reached Jerusalem today from snarled Bab el Wad gorge on the vital Jerusalem-Tel Aviv conveyer route, where the Jews are striving to reopen their supply lines to Jerusalem from the coast.

Fighting still is raging in the hills, but Haganah said the road itself is clear of resistance. Jewish sappers are clearing mines along the highway.

Fawzi Bey Kujukji took to the field at the head of his Arab volunteers today as they sought to regain control of the Bab el Wad area.

There were conflicting reports from the Judean hills on the status of Beit Mahser. Haganah claimed capture of the fortified Arab village on the Jerusalem-Tel Aviv supply line. Arabs contend they still hold it.

before the big Dodge main plant, told reporters "It looks like a union strike."

"This will probably be tough," he said.

Picketing was quiet. Union headquarters said the first workers out were those at the Dodge truck plant. They jumped the gun by 30 minutes.

The union already is raising a million dollar "kitty" to finance the walkout.

The executive board of the union met in special session about picket lines, were through Chrysler's Detroit plants.

Negotiations broke down Tuesday night on wage demands of the CIO United Auto Workers. The union asked its 30 cents an hour demand down to 17 cents without success. The best company offer was six cents an hour.

The Chrysler production workers in 14 plants average about \$1.50 an hour.

It was the auto industry's first major strike since November, 1945 when the UAW-CIO walked out at General Motors Corp. to begin a 113-day strike.

It was the first big strike at Chrysler since 1938.

Picketing began at one of the main gates of the Highland Park plant a few minutes before the 9 a. m. (a. s. t.) strike deadline.

There were no reports of any disorders.

Police Commissioner Harry Trow said he had been informed by the union that non-striking officers and maintenance help would be permitted to go in and out as heretofore.

Norman Matthews, head of the union's Chrysler negotiators, told a UAW-CIO meeting last night that "since Chrysler has forced us into the position of striking, we will give them the damnest strike they have ever seen."

General Manager Herman L. Wecker of the corporation, said that, despite the strike, the company is "still willing to discuss the situation and to arrive at a reasonable settlement."



### State Police Raid Carnival

Imitation freak and eight stand operators fined at Berlin

Berlin, Conn., May 12.—A "half man-half woman" turned out to be all man when a state police raiding squad visited a "men only" performance at the Coleman Brothers carnival here today.

The imitation freak was arrested on charges of giving an "indecent performance" at the state police officers said, and eight midway stand operators were taken into custody on gambling charges.

# Local Bridal Pageant Is Largely Attended

Center Church crowded as various gowns are modeled; description and history of each

As anticipated, the auditorium of the Center church was filled to overflowing last night for the Bridal Pageant of Group C, which Mrs. Elizabeth Davis is leader. The decorations were appropriate to the theme of the pageant, "The Bride and the Groom." The program was a beautiful spectacle and its success is due in large measure to the chairmanship of Mrs. Ernest Bengtson. Mrs. Ralph Brown, co-chairman, Mrs. Harold Belcher and Mrs. Ernest Wetlich.

At the close of the pageant the principals and guests were seated in the lobby with fruit punch and cookies at tables attractively decorated with lace cloths, spring flowers and lighted tapers.

The first gown shown, dated 1800, was loaned by Mrs. Elmer Bull. It was worn by her great-aunt, Miss Mary Finney, when she married Mr. Doane in her home about 1850 and last night was modeled by Miss Molly McBride.

The wedding of Miss Mary Mercy Sears and William G. Boston took place in the Phillips Congregational church of South Boston about 1860. Miss Susan Burr wore this gown when she quitted wedding her great-grandmother, Mrs. Esther Pickles, who was the Quaker wedding dress of her great-aunt Lydia Koll, who married Lincoln Lightfoot in Salem, Ohio, in 1841. There is no baptism and no communion in the Quaker faith and funerals and weddings are extremely simple affairs. In the case of weddings, a meeting is held at which the whole marriage party sits in complete silence for ten minutes or so, then the bride and bridegroom arise and, taking each other by the right hand, speak just one sentence each. The man says first: "In the presence of the Lord and this assembly, I do give thee, Lydia Koll, to be my wife, promising, with Divine assistance to be unto thee a loving and faithful husband until death shall separate us. This covenant I make in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, Amen." The bride replies: "I do give thee, William G. Boston, to be my husband, promising, with Divine assistance to be unto thee a loving and faithful husband until death shall separate us. This covenant I make in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, Amen."

The next gown was made during the Civil War in 1865, for Nancy Bailey, great aunt of Mrs. Herbert Sargent of Middlefield street. It was never worn as the bridegroom-to-be did not return from the war. It was locked away with the trousseau until 1933 when Mrs. Herbert Sargent became the owner and opened the trunk. This gown was worn by Miss Dorothy Spalding.

Dated back to 1873 the material of the next dress dated back to 1873 when it was worn by Miss Sarah Elizabeth Warner when she was married to John Hansen Fuller on September 3 of that year in Marlborough, Conn. The dress was remodelled by both Fuller, and worn by her as a wedding dress at her marriage to Calvin Mac Strickland on Sept. 28, 1894, in Malden, Mass. The hat was made in Boston. This gown belongs to Mrs. Victor Strickland, and was worn by Miss Joan Strickland. The hymn book she carried belonged to her great-grandmother

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er who was Miss Rena R. Rice and married to Henry H. Miller on Wednesday, May 10, 1947. Mrs. Miller was her mother's.

**Notes Clinics Operated Here**

**Head of Public Nurses Describes Them and Their Services**

The Manchester Public Health Nurses drive has been in progress since the first of May, and it might be well, at this time, to remind the people of Manchester of the various clinics run by the Association.

**Chest Clinic** Twice a month a chest clinic is held twice a month on Friday. This clinic has grown steadily, showing that the community is becoming more aware of preventative care, and realizing the value of detecting tuberculosis in its early stages.

**Tumor Clinic**, which until May, was held once a month, will now be held twice each month. This clinic is a consultation service started by local and Hartford doctors, with the Public Health Nurses in attendance, for patients referred by their family doctor. It is sponsored by the Connecticut Cancer Society. Any interested person may contact Mrs. Reed of the Information Center for Tumor Clinic, telephone 4123. A. and twice at the clinic rooms on Fridays. There the babies are weighed and checked by the nurses in charge, and the mothers given a chance to talk over their problems with the nurses. If a baby is found to need the care of a doctor, one of the hospital doctors is called.
