Yale Scientist Criticizes Handling of Patients With Heart Disease
Hartford, May 20.—A Yale scientist asked for "more harmony in the hospitals" in the interests of patients suffering from heart disease.

Dr. Louis H. Nahum, associate professor of physiology at the Yale School of Medicine yesterday told members of the Connecticut Dietetic association here that heart patients are suffering from "heart-free" diets far from three to six grams of salt each day because of present day routine in most hospitals.

Dr. Nahum, a heart specialist, declared that sufferers from heart disease are capable of securing no more than two grams of salt daily.

'Roommate Compatibility' Survey Made by Student

Hartford, May 20.—Miss Doron, a graduate student working for a master's degree in education at the University of Connecticut, has completed a survey of what she calls a "roommate compatibility" survey.

The results, set down in the thesis for the degree, were culled from answers to some 26 questions she asked of 145 girls living in Sprague dormitory.

The questions had to do with such "living-together" factors as religion and cleanliness, religious and economic background, extra-curricular activities, and sense of humor.

Cause of Most Friction
She says that "lack of similar interests, whether social or academic," is the cause of most friction.

Excess Salt in Many Foods
The excess salt, she said, is "contained in many foods, such as bread, butter, margarine, and 'Alo.'"

Dr. Nahum added, "A patient may receive salt in the diet in the form of sodium chloride, such as bicarbonate of soda. Thus by direct means salt diet affects are upset."

The dietitian also heard Dr. Charles Kaufman of New London describe the so-called "rice diet" as "simple and reasonable."

Saying he has been on this diet himself for a year and a half, Dr. Kaufman asserted that the best option of money in the best way we have against high blood pressure and its resulting complications.

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**Selling Trend Change Seen**

Expert on Marketing Assures 'High Pressure' Method on Way Out

Hartford, May 20.—A Connecticut University expert on marketing says that "high pressure selling" is on its way out.

John S. Alexander, associate professor of marketing at the Connecticut University School of Business, told the fifth annual conference here yesterday that the "trend is to low pressure selling."

Burton Bigelow, a New York sales management consultant, said he disagreed emphatically, assuring that "I myself am much more afraid of no pressure selling than I am of high pressure selling."

Alexander defined low pressure selling as "working with the customer instead of on him." High pressure selling, he said, is selling "on the basis of one's enthusiasm and personality" by a species of hypnotism on the customer, and often of the salesman himself.

Bigelow defined high pressure selling as "any act on the part of the salesman which tends to take the buying decision away from the buyer."

"As long as the salesman tells the truth," Bigelow declared, "he is not doing 'high pressure' selling."

Arthur L. Seale, sales promotion manager of General Electric's Appliance and Merchandise department, stressed what he called "the necessity for believability" in selling today.

"We've got to tell the honest-to-goodness stark truth" in present day selling, Seale declared.

Hartford, May 20.—A New York dental surgeon has given his approval to thumb sucking by children.

Dr. Henry H. Hart, addressing yesterday's opening session of the three-day annual convention of the Connecticut State Dental Association, said that "children have as much right to suck their thumbs as adults have to smoke."
