Unique Wage Hike Granted Workers In GM Agreement

Formula Called 'New Approach to Living Cost Problem' by Company; Will Cost About \$75,000,000 Yearly; Hope Raised in Chrysler Row

Detroit, May 25.—(P)—General Motors Corp. granted an unique 11-cent an hour wage boost today to avert a strike of its 225,000 CIO production workers.

But GM called it "the new approach to the living cost problem" which had been set for Friday by the CIO United Auto Workers.

Not only was the without averted, but the settlement raised the cost of living for the 14-day-old strike of 75,000 Chrysler Corp. employees.

On the last of the past history, it appeared that the GM formula would set a 1948 wage pattern in the 1,000,000-man auto industry and other major industries.

Chrysler has agreed to remain in the UAW-CIO Wednesday. Their best previous offer for the year was six cents an hour.

Other members of the auto industry's big three, the Ford Motor Company, is scheduled soon to begin talking wages with the union.

Closed for 18 hours, the union was closed for 18 hours before the settlement was reached.

It brings the average wage in General Motors' 90 plants to about \$1.51 an hour, the UAW-CIO originally asked GM for a 25-cent an hour increase.

General Motors would not say whether the wage increase would affect its car prices.

The wage formula gives the GM employees a 11 cent an hour boost as of now.

Agree To Revision Sept. 1. However, the union agreed that on next September 1 the company may revise this figure upward or downward, but to show change pending on the cost of living by its cost index.

If costs go up, they will get a boost above 11 cents. If they go down, the company may cut the cent figure but not by more than five cents.

Heavy Fighting Again In Jerusalem Area; Arabs Ponder Truce

Washington, May 25.—(P)—Chaim Weizmann, Israel's provisional president, said President Truman gave him "some sort of hope" today the American government may lift its ban on arms shipment to the Middle East.

Weizmann, here as the official guest of the American government, talked with Mr. Truman for 30 minutes at the White House.

He related to a news conference afterwards that he told the president the lifting of the arms embargo is "essential for the safety" of the Jews fighting off Arab attacks in Palestine.

In answer to questions, he said he got the impression the president might request the United States to consider a United Nations request for a truce in Palestine.

The Jewish Air Force reported in an article by two Egyptian-born Jews captured in Jerusalem, that the Jews were being shelled by Arab irregulars.

Abdullah's Trans-Jordan Legion and Arab irregulars supported by Jewish guerrillas were reported to be fighting in the area.

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Minimum Wage Boost Requested By Truman

Also Asks Democratic Congressional Leaders to Push Federal Aid for Education

Washington, May 25.—(P)—President Truman today asked Democratic congressional leaders to press for passage of a bill to increase the minimum wage to 40 cents an hour for workers in the retail trade.

The president's request was made at a White House conference with Democratic leaders.

The Senate has passed legislation for \$200,000,000 annual Federal aid to the states for school lunch programs.

The House has not acted. There has been no action in either of the Senate or House on minimum wage legislation.

The present wage is 35 cents an hour for workers in the retail trade.

Senator Louis Brandeis of Massachusetts, assistant Democratic leader in the Senate and House respectively, told reporters after the White House meeting that the president "is tremendously interested in legislation raising the minimum wage from 40 to 75 cents."

Senator Charles McNary of Oregon, a Republican, said he would support the bill.

Senator William Jenner of Indiana, a Republican, said he would support the bill.

Board Given Phone Row

25,000 Long Distance Workers Involved; Hope to Avert Strike

New York, May 25—(AP)—A wage dispute involving 25,000 long distance telephone workers in 43 states was turned over to a presidential board of inquiry today in an effort to head off a nationwide strike.

President Truman brought the three-man board into existence last week under provisions of the Taft-Hartley law after talks between the union and the American Telephone and Telegraph company broke down.

The union, the CIO American Telephone Workers, has suspended strike plans pending outcome of the board hearings.

The company, meanwhile, announced last night on the eve of the board's first session, that it had agreed to a 30-cent wage increase for its 250,000 employees.

All but two of the new contracts, the subcontractor said, are for three-year periods.

All but 2,000 of the workers are represented by units of the Communications Workers of America, an unaffiliated nation-wide union, which had demanded a wage rise, the company said. Extent of the boom was not divulged.

Spokesmen for the union were not available for comment. The A. T. & T. said the three-year contracts provide for two wage reopenings, improved working conditions, and up-grading of groups of workers.

The firm said that if a wage increase was forthcoming under the first reopening, the second reopening would not be sought for another year.

The settlements affected Bell system employees in New Jersey, Virginia, Maryland, Illinois, Wisconsin, Indiana and the District of Columbia.

In the long lines dispute the telephone union is seeking a 30-cent hour pay raise, a better pension system and improved contract conditions.

Ready, State Official, Dies

Deputy Labor Commissioner Ill Short Time; Local Resident Son

New Haven, May 25—(AP)—John C. Ready, state deputy labor commissioner in charge of factory inspection, died today at New Haven hospital after a short illness. He was 67 years old.

Born in New Haven Aug. 18, 1880, he was educated in the New Haven public schools. In his younger days he was well known as a baseball player and was called "Dutch" by his friends.

At the time of the railroad strike in 1922, he was chairman of the State Labor Committee of the New Haven railroad.

Ready was appointed factory inspector with the Connecticut Labor Department in 1931, and in 1938 was appointed deputy labor commissioner, the position he held at the time of his death.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Ready, and two daughters, Mrs. William Mitchell of Milford, and Mrs. Harold C. Fretwell, of New Haven; a son, John E. Ready, of Manchester; a sister, Mrs. Eugene Fretwell, of New Haven; and two granddaughters.

Burial will be in St. Lawrence cemetery.

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Decline Again In Chickenpox

Most Prevalent Disease In State For 30th Consecutive Week

Hartford, May 25—(AP)—For the 30th consecutive week, chickenpox is the most prevalent disease within Connecticut, according to the summary of reportable diseases issued by the State Department of Health.

Chickenpox cases dropped from 878 to 189 during the past seven days, but remained the most widespread disease within the state.

Most of the common reportable diseases were on the decline during the week just ended. Mumps cases dropped from 201 to 114, measles from 104 to 104, and scarlet fever from 23 to 23 cases.

German measles, diphtheria and streptococcal sore throat were also on the decline. German measles cases dropped from 17 to 17, diphtheria from 1 to 1, and streptococcal sore throat from 1 to 1.

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Infant Loses Race for Life

Victim of Rare Blood Disease Despite Emergency Transfusion

Winsted, May 25—(AP)—Death today at St. Francis hospital, Hartford, was the grim victim in a race for the life of a four-day-old Winsted baby.

The baby, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Paine of Winsted, died from a rare blood disease, hospital authorities said, after an emergency blood transfusion had given them hope for survival.

The baby was born last Friday at the Litchfield County hospital here. A hospital spokesman said the child was suffering from erythroblastosis fetalis, a disease of the newborn in which the RH factor in the blood destroys the red blood corpuscles. The only known cure, the spokesman said, was an immediate blood transfusion.

After an examination yesterday, officials of the county hospital decided the baby would have to be moved to Hartford for treatment. A 200 for transportation was dispatched to the Canaan state police barracks and Trooper Charles Cedar picked up the baby and his nurse at the hospital.

With his path cleared by radio dispatches, Cedar drove nearly 30 miles over the winding state highway to Hartford in less than 30 minutes to place the baby in the hands of physicians at the hospital.

Dr. Charles T. Deacon and Dr. Rupert von Trosch performed the transfusion at once and they reported the baby had an "even chance for survival."

The baby started to fail a few hours after the transfusion, however. Some Europeans throw fruit instead of rice at newswriters.
