

Can Destroy Strongholds

Azzam Pasha had just returned from conferences in Amman, Trans-Jordan, on the war against Israel. He said the Arab forces now are in a position to detroy Jewish strongholds in and around Jerusalem, and thus administer a crushing defeat to the Jews.

"We could have taken Jerusalem earlier," he said, "but we did not want to sacrifice more men when we are sure of the ultimate result following complete encirclement of the Jews in Jerusalem."

The Arabs were reported shelling Jewish positions in Jerusalem throughout Wednesday night. Indications were that the Arabs planned to tighten the encirclement of the Jews in the modern city after wiping out the small
