Held in Death Of Her Baby

Unwed Mother Pleads Innocent to Charge of Manslaughter

Bristol, June 2.—An unwed mother accused of slaying her newborn baby and tossing its body into a sewer catch basin pleaded innocent to a charge of manslaughter in City court today.

The woman, identified by Police Chief Edmund S. Crowley as Catherine Noonan, 28, a department store cashier, was ordered held for a Superior court trial, Judge Frederick W. Beech, flood bail at \$20,000. Unable to post bonds, Miss Noonan was taken to the county jail at Hartford.

Chief Crowley said Miss Noonan appeared at his office headquarters last night about five hours after the baby's body had been found in a Bellevue street catch basin. He quoted the woman as saying she was the baby's mother and that she had placed its body in the catch basin.

Left to bleed to death, the baby had been garroted, his mouth stuffed with gauze and paper and he had been left to bleed to death, said Dr. Lawrence Frost, Plainville medical examiner, from an unsuccessful umbilical cord.

Dr. Frost described the death as a plain case of murder.

The medical examiner described the baby as completely normal in every respect, adding that he weighed between eight and nine pounds at birth. He stated that the body had lain in the catch basin for about five days before it was placed there shortly after birth.

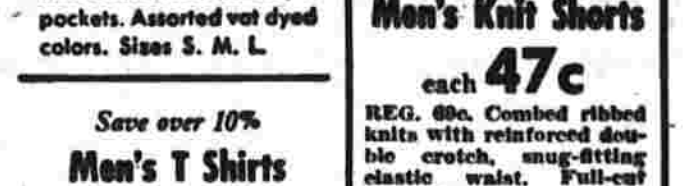

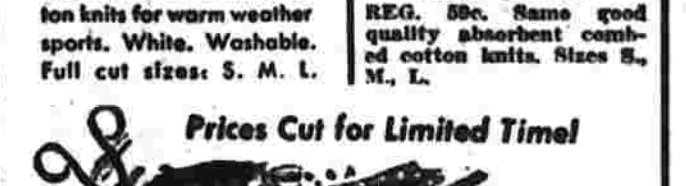
