State Protests
Thornton Fee
 Appeals Value Placed On Land Taken for The Cross Highway
 Protesting the value placed on land of William J. Thornton by a state referee in proceedings incident to condemnation of land for the Wilbur Cross highway, and for asserted depreciation of adjacent gravel and sand banks owned by Thornton, the State Highway Department yesterday addressed the Superior Court in the case.
 The Highway Department, appealing the value set on the Thornton land damage by State Referee Alfred C. Baldwin, held that the payment should be no where near the figure of \$236,679 or \$518,411 set by the referee. The two sums were proposed by him, conditioned as to the manner of making the appraisal.
 Judge Baldwin considered that if the total value of all sand and gravel affected by the construction of the highway he figured, on the larger sum should be paid. It only certain parts of the land are considered as affected, the lower figure would apply.
 Memorial Award to the state is taking 5.9 acres of land, but the owner claims that the highway will divide his property in such a way that he will have no access to about 10 acres of it.
 Judge Baldwin made his decision on a premise that condemnation should be given to the productive value of the land in gravel and sand over a period of years. It was estimated that, excluding the 10 acres said to be made inaccessible by the highway, the sand and gravel may last for seven years. The value of the land, as represented by Assistant State Attorney General Bernard A. Koscilko, claimed that the value should be based on a comparative basis with other nearby lands, largely agricultural.
 The state offered payment of \$130,000 for the highway right of way.
 Thornton was represented by Attorney Meade Alcorn who asked that the value be determined by consideration of the value of the sand and gravel being taken over by the state, and also of that being made inaccessible by the building of the highway.
 The referee's appeal on an assertion that the state referee did not make a determination of value on a correct basis, and that the value of the sand and gravel, the alternative figures being left open for choice at a future hearing.
 The new highway traverses other parts of the land owned by other persons, but none of these is largely engaged in the sand and gravel business, or faces any such curtailment of business as is claimed by Thornton.

Sees Increased Street Danger
Chief Schendel Warns Autoists About Children This Summer
 The close of school has left Manchester with an increased pedestrian safety problem for the summer months, Chief of Police Herman Schendel warned today. Hundreds of children will daily be playing in town on lands on lands adjoining streets. While a large number will benefit by the public playground program, many others will do their playing close to heavy traffic areas.
 Chief Schendel warns that, in order to maintain Manchester's high safety rating, and for the sake of saving children from injury, motorists should at all times bear the conditions in mind.
 The accident map at headquarters shows that most mishaps occur on streets that are fairly congested with traffic, although a few serious ones have taken place where there is a heavy flow of traffic.
 To date, there have been only two accidents involving pedestrians in Manchester this year.

One stage of political develop- ment, from a place too long, be- comes the creator of war rather than the preventer of it. The condition of uncontrollable strife is in itself evidence that the time has come to move into a broader and more comprehensive political front.

The kind of World Law the United World Federalists propose, from the beginning of the world, is the inevitable final develop- ment of law. We can in no sense escape it, unless we destroy our- selves first. When we coined the phrase "One World" Wendell Willkie was the greatest realist of our times. Realists will reach for the only kind of law which can fit our kind of world.

Where Peace News Arise
 For the Washington alarmists there is more bad news—this time from Greece.

It appears that the Communist-led guerrillas are on the way to take up arms and that Russia and her satellites are going to let them fold.

There have been offers of peace from the guerrilla themselves and from the secretary of the Greek Communist Party, Bulgaria has informed the United Nations that it is ready to bring the Greek situation to a halt.

Such developments indicate that Russia and her satellites, who were once threatening to recognize the Greek guerrilla regime as a government, are now, far from any such step and are con- sidering, instead, the abandon- ment of all encouragement for the guerrillas.

Now it might seem, to ordinary minds, that all this is good news—that it represents a develop- ment American diplomacy should welcome. What is it, after all, but what we have said we wanted with regard to Greece?

But ordinary minds for some reason, do not share the Wash- ington approach. So far as Wash- ington is concerned, the fluttering of the peace dove in Greece is more very disquieting devel- opment, of one alarming unity with other manifestations of Rus- sian relaxation and peace-mind- edness.

When our State Department takes its hair down these days it confesses that it is very much frightened of this present period in which the Russians are show- ing signs of relaxing their pres- sure. Ordinary minds, again, would think that American policy had been designed to persuade the Russians to relax, and that there- fore any such development should be related with some jubilation and hope. But, for Washington, peace news is bad news. We may get the impression that our dip- lomats and military leaders would have a vast step of relief if Rus- sias would clearly reopen the cold war, and even make it hotter. They find it easier to visualize a plan for war than to visualize a plan for peace. And that con- dition, unless it is corrected, may be very tragic.

A Mussolini Budget?
 The people of Italy, to our great pleasure and gratitude, voted for peace and democracy.

So doing, they gave Italy's mid- dle of the road democratic gov- ernment an opportunity to prove that it could answer with deeds and policies, and not merely with fine promises, the deep and seri- ous need of the ordinary people of Italy for an improvement in their welfare. The Italian government, most observers concluded, had to produce long promised social re- forms, or offer the Communists another and better opportunity later on.

This new government—the gov- ernment, incidentally, of a coun- try which was on the losing side in World War II—has now sub- mitted its budget for the new fiscal year. In a country crying for economic revival and social re- forms, the largest single item in this budget is one of \$380,000,000 for the reviving Italian military. By comparison, only \$360,000,000 is provided for reconstruction and public works, only \$155,000,000 for education, only \$72,000,000 for relief, and only \$34,000,000 for the stimulation of economic recovery.

One would have thought, from its experience, that Italy would be sick of war. And so think the Italian people are sick of war. But the government, perhaps aided by American suggestions, is heading toward Mussolini's path of glory once again. Since in Italy, as in Greece, the rich find ways of escap- ing taxes, leaving them all for the poor people to pay, it would be a fair assessment if such a pro-

What Kind Of World Law?

 The United World Federalists believe in enough world law to guarantee peace.

What kind of law would that have to be?

In simplest terms, it would have to be law which, like all federal law, ranked over individual state laws, and which would be enforced by its own legislative, executive, judicial and enforcement agencies.

In a world federation, each nation would have to let the world law in its own sovereignty down to the point which would permit the successful operation of those limited world laws necessary to pre- serve the peace.

There could be no nationalistic veto of whatever world law was adopted.

It would have to be a world law, most United World Federalists think, which would be capable of reaching individuals. The theory is that it is not nations, nor hard- ly ever the majority of the people in a nation, who start wars, but rather that there are always cer- tain individuals who are respon- sible for a nation's course toward war.

The idea that these individuals must be reached and prevented from their attempted operations is relatively new—as new as the pioneering and revolutionary Nuremberg code under which we tried the German leaders individ- ually as war criminals, holding them individually responsible for the war they planned and started. The blood of innocent humanity has been shed.

Even the provision of enough world law to guarantee peace and to guarantee likewise the pro- gressive development of condi- tions in which peace will be dy- namic and healthy would be, as we shall see when we study the proposed World Constitution, an unexpectedly complicated busi- ness.

But, although it may be compli- cated, it is, after all, merely the next logical stage of the develop- ment of law. Law, from the be- ginning of time, has been the um- bell which has been continually expanded to cover an ever wider and wider area. First it kept peace within the confines of one tribe. Then it brought law and order to one village. Then it brought towns and cities together and finally established peace within nations.

In each advance, one old politi- cal boundary was passed and out- dated and diminished, so that men within a new and larger area would live at peace with each other. This has all been logical, common sense, inevitable. It is the procedure men have always followed when they acted intelli- gently for their own security.

But now, for too long a time, mankind has been stalled on the edge of its next logical advance. It has passed so long that its present form of political organi- zation—that of the nation—has ceased to represent the security it originally hoped to attain, and has become, instead, the symbol of mankind's insecurity. The same thing would have happened before if the towns and cities had held out too long against joining in higher political organizations, and these higher political organiza- tions had held out too long against the formation of nations.

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Jury Decides Finn Guilty
 One-time Stamford Bellhop Will Be Sentenced Monday
 Lake George, N. Y., June 18.—John G. Finn, 23, of Stamford, Conn., found guilty of ab- siding a New York city nurse shortly before she was drowned last Aug. 1, will be sentenced Monday (10 a. m.).
