Profit Shown For Railroad

May Report Reveals Net Income of \$1,091,538 During Month

New Haven, June 23.—(AP)—The New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad today reported a net income of \$1,091,538 for the month of May, 1948.

This, said the report, compared with a net income of \$322,552 in May of last year, which included a carry-back tax credit of \$250,000.

Gross revenue for the month amounted to \$14,464,494, the report said. An increase of \$1,222,527 over May, 1947. Freight revenue increased \$1,256,028, passenger revenue decreased \$155,178 and other revenue increased \$131,677, the report stated.

Operating expenses were \$10,469,476, an increase of \$290,762 over May, 1947, due primarily to wage increases, the company said. Tax accruals of \$1,045,000 were listed, an increase of \$285,000 over the same period last year. The road reported gross revenues for the first five months of

Hospitals Cost Figures Asked

Manufacturers and Insurance Company Decide Data Needed

Hartford, June 23.—(AP)—Connecticut manufacturers and insurance companies, engaged in a dispute with the state's hospitals over rates charged in workmen's compensation cases, want more cost figures from the hospitals.

Representatives of the insurance companies and the Connecticut Manufacturers association, whose employee-members pay for workmen's compensation insurance, met yesterday at the Acton Casualty and Surety company here.

To Ask Clarified Figures
A spokesman announced they had decided to ask hospital representatives to "clarify" their cost figures "in the hope that a satisfactory rate could be determined."

The controversy over rates charged for care of patients under the state workmen's compensation law came into the open recently when the Connecticut Hospital Association announced that its members were increasing charges to insurance companies. The association contended that the insurers had been getting below-cost service at the public's expense.

The hospitals had been charging \$4.75 per day for the first week and \$6.25 daily thereafter, plus extra charges for special services. Beginning June 1 one of the hospitals began charging at their regular ward rates, ranging from \$5 to \$15 daily.

The insurance companies and manufacturers contended that "insufficient information had been submitted by the hospital association to determine a fair rate of charge."

A prediction that the controversy might be settled at a compromise rate of \$3.50 a day has come from Leo J. Noonan, state workmen's compensation commissioner for the Hartford district. The hospitals have said they would accept such a compromise.

In the event of a continued stalemate between the hospitals and the insurers, it was expected that the case would be arbitrated by the workmen's compensation commissioners.

Blame Pedestrians In Most Crashes

Hartford, June 22—The second greatest cause of one-car accidents is collision with pedestrians, and in about 75 per cent of them the pedestrians are at fault. A Highway Safety Commission survey of accidents during the last five years in Connecticut shows collision with fixed objects as the cause of 12,319 accidents and 12,315 auto-pedestrian accidents. Not all auto-pedestrian crashes are auto accidents, but the instances where more than one car were involved were negligible.

About 85 per cent of all one-car accidents are caused from collision with pedestrians. During the five years there were 6,432 auto-pedestrian accidents causing 599 fatalities and injuring 8,854 more. In most one-car accidents the driver alone is at fault, but the reverse is true in auto-pedestrian crashes. In such accidents, pedestrians were found at fault in 6,966 cases. They resulted in 351 deaths and 6,373 injuries. Drivers at fault in pedestrian accidents totaled 4,484 with 205 fatalities and 2,385 injuries.

Honor System Pays Off At Dr. Strant's Restaurant

Can the public be trusted? Does the honor system pay? It can and it does, according to Charles W. Strant, local dentist and owner of a restaurant located near the University of Connecticut.

Dr. Strant uses a rather unusual system. Customers approach the food counter and order whatever meal they desire. They place their food on a tray and sit at one of several tables to eat their meal. When they have finished, they go to the cashier and tell her what they have had. There is nothing to prevent them giving an inaccurate list of what they have eaten, and for that matter, they can even walk out without paying at all. But this seldom if ever happens, says Dr. Strant.

When the restaurant was first opened, Dr. Strant had planned to use the meal ticket system. But the volume of business was so great that this was found impractical and so the present system was started, though not without some misgivings. The honor system, however, has turned out very well, said Dr. Strant.

"A nice group of people come in my place," said Dr. Strant, and he illustrated with a story of the college student who came in and had a full meal. After telling the cashier what he had eaten, including milk and pie, the student left. About two minutes later he returned and rushed up to the cashier saying, "Say, I forgot to tell you, I had ice cream with my pie."

Dr. Strant still has a stack of meal tickets, but he doesn't think he'll be using them.

English Visitor Here Compares Manchesters

Justice W. B. Martin

Tells Differences of the Similarly Named Communities in Interview

How does Manchester, Conn., compare with Manchester, England? What does Manchester, U.S.A. look like through English eyes?

Justice William B. Martin supplied the answers to these questions in a Herald interview this morning.

Mr. Martin, being the son of a Manchester, England, family, is a familiar visitor to the city of the English Midlands, where he has spent much of his life. He is currently in town on a business trip.

England's Manchester is in the midst of a period of reconstruction, said Mr. Martin. Being the hub of the English textile industry, Manchester took a terrible bombing during the war and the difficult and tedious job of reconstruction has just begun.

One of the main points of contrast between the two towns, Mr. Martin pointed out, is the lack of trees in Manchester, and the abundance of wide, well-kept parks in the American town.

Mr. Martin is impressed by the neat, orderly arrangement of the streets in this town. The number of greens and the general cleanliness is very attractive, he said.

There are no trees, streets in Manchester, England, since in one of the old-city industrial areas.

This is a land of plenty compared to her rationed sister across the sea. There are more cars here than in the whole town of Manchester that has a population of nearly one million.

The American system of education, Mr. Martin is superior to the English system in buildings and curricula. The English system is not required to go to school after the age of 15.
