Murder Case Goes to Jury
Deliberations on Fate of Leveille Start After 40-Minute Charge

New Haven, June 25—(AP)—The 21st degree murder case of Walter E. Leveille, 26, of Meriden went to the jury shortly after 11 a. m. today.

The jury started its deliberations after a charge by Judge Kenneth Wynne which lasted about 40 minutes. During the trial, the state pictured Leveille as a robber-murderer while the defense pictured him as a man who killed in self-defense.

No Emotion Apparent
Leveille indicated for the slaying of Stanley Slavenski, 41, of Wallingford on June 7, 1947, at without apparent emotion yesterday as State's Attorney Abraham S. Ullman and Joseph Kolodziej, defense counsel, summed up the case.

Ullman describing the self-defense plea as "fantastic" contended that Leveille had conspired with Alfred Plessi, 28, also of Wallingford, to rob Slavenski, and that the elderly man met his death as a result of that plan.

Ullman's argument pointed out that \$515 of Slavenski's money had been found in Leveille's possession.

Plan to Honor Four Brothers
Lives Given in Separate Battles from Guadalcanal to Germany

Tremont, Utah, June 25—(AP)—The four Borgstrom brothers, who gave their lives in separate battles from islands of the Pacific to Germany, were together again today.

The sons of Mr. and Mrs. Alben Borgstrom separated Oct. 12, 1940, when the oldest enlisted in the Marine Corps. They had their picture taken together at a photo studio that day.

Today their bodies, home after honored secret from their temporary graves overseas, lay side by side in the crypt.

And tomorrow Gen. Mark Clark, Sixth Army commander, Gov. Herbert B. May of Utah, President George Albert Smith of the Latter-day Saints, Mormon church and other dignitaries will honor them in full military service.

Alben Borgstrom was killed within a few days after the attack on Pearl Harbor in December 7, 1941.

His brother, Roy, was killed with the Marines March 17 in the Solomon Islands.

Eric Borgstrom fell with the 8th Air Force in the European theater in France.

Charles Borgstrom's body was killed in Italy with the 8th Infantry division on June 22, 1945.

Sgt. Robert Borgstrom's body limped back to England from a raid over Germany Aug. 8 with his body in the rubble of a factory.

Pfc. Rulon Borgstrom, Rulon's twin brother, died 17 days later of wounds he received while the 8th Infantry Second division was attacking the Driffters.

Explains Reason for Bites
Col. Leonard R. Crow, commanding officer of the Sixth Army sector detachment at Guadalcanal, explained the reason for the solemn two-day rite.

"This is the only Gold Star family on record in World War II," he said.

He said the five Sullivan brothers, who all were in the Navy and were serving on the same ship when it was sunk, constituted a greater loss.

The convention gave a burst of applause to each, as he turned them abruptly to the speaker, Senator E. B. Baldwin of Connecticut, Gen. Douglas MacArthur, former Gen. Harold E. Stinson of Vermont, Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg of Michigan, and Gov. Earl Warren of California.

"There has been honest contention, spirited disagreement, hot argument," Devey said, "but let me be clear. You have given me moving and dramatic proof of how Americans, who honestly differ, close ranks and move forward for the nation's well-being, shoulder to shoulder."
At that point he deviated from his prepared text to say, "Let me assure you that beginning next Jan. 20, I will be in the team work in the government of the United States."

Devey said he is "free" and "unfettered" from any commitments and is "willing" to support the party platform unanimously adopted at the convention.

"It will be the heart of the message I will take to the country," he promised. "After the election, I will be the cornerstone of our Republican administration."

Following his convention speech Devey indicated that he will start his political campaign at the time the Democrats assemble here for their nominating session starting July 12.

In an informal talk at his convention headquarters in the room of the Bellevue-Stratford hotel, the governor thanked his supporters for their work and told them to take a good rest for a couple of weeks.

Then, he said, "start working harder than ever."

Two cabinet ministers resigned Wednesday, in protest against an Army attack on Irgun munitions ship in Tel Aviv harbor Tuesday. It is estimated 12 were killed and 40 wounded in the four-hour battle, which resulted in the Army ship being blasted and set afire by Israeli mortars.

Warns Survival Menaced
Following the resignations Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion warned Israeli legislators that the survival of the new Jewish state is menaced by Irgun. He bluntly condemned the "string of armed gangs" in Israel, which he said threaten "our entire war effort."

Ben-Gurion asked his Irgun followers not to fight Israeli soldiers while the state is "engaged in war with the Arabs and British," but he also has threatened to reply to force with force.

In a communique Ben-Gurion said he will lead a "concentration camp" which he expects Ben-Gurion will start erecting soon to participate in such a government.

Count Folke Bernadotte's headquarters in Rhodes announced last night that the United Nations mediator and his staff were "actively engaged" in outlining proposals for Arab-Jewish peace in Palestine. The third week of a four-week U. N. armistice starts today.

Conferring With Advisors
The announcement said Bernadotte had been conferring for several days with United Nations advisers as well as Arab and Jewish experts.

It is hoped that these suggestions may be drawn up within a few days when they will be presented to the Arab League and Jewish authorities in Palestine, the statement said.

Arab League sources in Cairo said they had received a cable from the Arab delegation in Rhodes that Bernadotte probably will submit new peace proposals next week.

One dispatch said rebel machine gunners were found with bullet holes in the back of their heads. Earlier reports said the guerrillas were executing those who showed any sign of surrendering.

Admission Age Now Extended

Board of Education Tells of New Rules for Kindergartners
By vote of the Board of Education the admission age for kindergartners, set earlier in the year as September 1, will be extended so as to admit children born after that date in the order of their birth dated up to capacity under kindergarten accommodations.

For kindergartners with one teacher in charge this capacity in general is set at 35 pupils. In those kindergartens with a teacher and an assistant this capacity will be considered as 50.

At the same time, however, consideration must be given to the size of the kindergarten space, the facilities available and the number of children it can conveniently accommodate. After school capacity will be considered as 50.

Under this plan it appears probable that most of the children whose birthdays occur in September will be eligible for admission. Each school has a list of such children as reported on the school census taken last fall and will notify the parents of children eligible to enroll in kindergarten.

In case a family has moved into Manchester since the census was taken no such record is available and the parent may consult with the school at the time announced for registration.

School authorities recommended that the necessary preparations of vaccination, immunization against diphtheria, and other advisable health measures be made now so that the pupil will be ready if the opportunity develops for him to attend kindergarten.

Opportunity for registration will be announced prior to the opening of school in September. It is felt that this arrangement will provide kindergarten opportunities for so many children as possible under the crowded conditions now prevailing with children of kindergarten and primary age.

2 Landslides Cover Road

Sections of Franconia Notch Highway Under 20 Feet of Earth
Littleton, N. H., June 25—(AP)—Two landslides—dotted with big boulders and trees—closed a mile and a half down Mt. Lafayette in the picturesque White Mountain chain yesterday, leaving sections of Franconia Notch highway under 20 feet of earth.

State officials said early today that it had not been determined whether anyone had been trapped. One swiftly moving mass nicked the corner of the Franconia Notch Club shop, but none of the 20 occupants was injured. Seventeen automobiles were damaged in a half mile stretch between slides for some time before bulldozers cleared a path.

Sections of the larger slide, which covered 350 feet of high way, cascaded into a lake near the profile of "The Old Man of the Mountain"—a scenic attraction for tourists.

The lake rose so fast it threatened to flood the highway before it subsided.

James Montion, a State Forestry department employee, reported he was forced to whip his panel truck in reverse to avoid being hit by a boulder as big as the vehicle driver's small slide.

He said there was a long line of traffic ahead of him. He didn't know whether all cars engineers said it would take two or three days to clear 10,000 yards of earth for one-way passage through the larger slide. They said recent rains apparently caused the slides.

A rival CIO union, the United Electrical Workers, which now holds collective bargaining rights at the small arms manufacturing plant, was excluded from the ballot in yesterday's election by the National Labor Relations board.

The 28 dissenting votes were cast by workers who chose to be represented by no union.

The U. A. W. top officers have refused to sign the non-Communist affidavits required for NLRB certification under the Taft-Hartley act on July 2, and the management has refused to renew it because of the U. E. W. officers' stand against signing the non-Communist oath. In refusing to deal with the U. E. W., the company said it would be glad to do business with any American union chosen by the workers and certified by the NLRB.

The convention gave a burst of applause to each, as he turned them abruptly to the speaker, Senator E. B. Baldwin of Connecticut, Gen. Douglas MacArthur, former Gen. Harold E. Stinson of Vermont, Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg of Michigan, and Gov. Earl Warren of California.

"There has been honest contention, spirited disagreement, hot argument," Devey said, "but let me be clear. You have given me moving and dramatic proof of how Americans, who honestly differ, close ranks and move forward for the nation's well-being, shoulder to shoulder."
At that point he deviated from his prepared text to say, "Let me assure you that beginning next Jan. 20, I will be in the team work in the government of the United States."

Devey said he is "free" and "unfettered" from any commitments and is "willing" to support the party platform unanimously adopted at the convention.

"It will be the heart of the message I will take to the country," he promised. "After the election, I will be the cornerstone of our Republican administration."

Following his convention speech Devey indicated that he will start his political campaign at the time the Democrats assemble here for their nominating session starting July 12.

In an informal talk at his convention headquarters in the room of the Bellevue-Stratford hotel, the governor thanked his supporters for their work and told them to take a good rest for a couple of weeks.

Then, he said, "start working harder than ever."
Confident victory in November, Devey said he would start out next January by having a "housewarming" in Washington.

Devey said, "I will have to ask money from Congress to fund Communist in the payroll. There may not be any more appointed after Jan. 20."

On the night of the convention, Devey promised the crowd packed in the room of the Bellevue-Stratford hotel that he would be the most talented in the country to do the job of governing Connecticut.

"We shall establish a foreign policy that does not mean a rupture between us and our neighbors," he said.
