Printers Accept Wage Increase

Terminal Seen Air Field Use
Head of Trucking Company Advocates Brainard Field as Site
Hartford, June 28.—(AP)—Establishment of a large truck terminal at Brainard field has been proposed by a Connecticut trucking company which has been proposed by a Connecticut trucking company.
The proposal was caused when a Rockville resident who had been in a night automobile accident was taken to the hospital. He stopped his car near the intersection on Spence street, and lay down on the grass.
"We suggest," he said, "that a portion of the field be made available to accommodate a large truck terminal built in such a manner that sections of the terminal can be rented out to trucking companies."
City Will Lose Revenue
Noting that the city will lose revenue from the field after the terminal, local officials, the American Airline, moves to Bradley field in Windsor, said to Bradley Hartford should invest a "substantial" amount in the terminal.
His plan calls for the city to construct the terminal on present airport property. The airport itself would be used for other types of traffic, including commercial airlines.
Through such a terminal, the city could explain the situation to traffic congestion, attributed to trucks, and be eliminated downtown and in other areas of the city.
He explained further that large fleet operators would drop their freight at the terminal and allow small fleet operators to deliver and pick up freight at the various local streets and business districts.
"You will find," Mr. Geane told the city manager, "that where you have a specific service, the service can be accomplished more efficiently in a trucking terminal than in a street or parking area."
At the same time, the company would be able to eliminate the need for a large fleet of trucks, which would reduce the number of trucks on the roads and the amount of traffic.
The plan also provides for a truck terminal to service this area.

The fire, of undetermined origin, broke out about 6:30 p. m. last night on the structure, located on Highway 90, the main route of Mississippi going east to a fractured link Bay St. Louis with Henderson Point.
Shortly after the blaze was discovered, the drawbridge—one and one-quarter miles from the Bay St. Louis bridge—was raised. A special fire brigade kept that portion of the span wetted down.

Salaried Employees All Given Increase
Waterbury, June 28.—(AP)—The Scott's Manufacturing Company, one of the largest manufacturing concerns in the state, today announced an eight and a quarter per cent raise in all salaried employees paid weekly, and in the hourly rates of all manufacturing employees not affiliated with the union.

To Master Our Own Fate
 25.

To give you the feeling of atom-
 to death—that is one of the more
 highly developed talents of the
 leaders of United World Federalists.
 And it would be a good thing
 if more ordinary people should
 have and let into their own con-
 sciousness the realization that
 what will come, unless they stop
 it, will be the unparalleled de-
 struction of mankind. In an atom-
 war, perhaps the most tragic
 punishment of all would be to be
 a survivor.

We also like to keep on asking,
 however, how it would feel to live
 in a federated world.

We think that only in a federat-
 ed world can mankind regard a
 sense of control of its own des-
 tiny, a sense of goal, a sense of
 constructive order.

There was a time when man-
 kind was capable of feeling con-
 fident of its own destiny within the
 framework of a purely national
 structure. We in this country
 for instance, have long had the
 feeling that we were the special
 masters of our own fate.

Today we know that whatever
 we do in this country, it is with-
 out security unless it is part of
 a similar stability, security, and
 progress elsewhere. We can no
 longer control our own destiny
 merely by exerting our own influ-
 ence as citizens within our own
 closed democratic process.

We cannot hark back to the
 days when Americans had full
 control of American living, of
 the American destiny. We must,
 if we are to regain such control
 over our very own lives and
 fate, step forward into the
 more troubled arena of world
 decisions which really control us
 as being made.

Once we, and all other nations,
 were slow moving molecules mov-
 ing in a very large space. We
 could chart our own course very
 much as if we were alone within
 that space.

Now, in a modern world, that
 space allotted to the nations has
 been compressed. The inevitable
 result has been that we move
 faster, in closer and more fre-
 quent collision with one another,
 with more injury and force
 against one another, and that
 we can chart no course of our
 own which does not take into
 account the movement of the
 other molecules, or nations. So,
 unless we can provide some order
 and rhythm to the movements inside
 our test tube, it will blow up.

It is precisely the knowledge
 that, no matter how wisely and
 well, we happen to plan our own
 course, our actual movement is
 really at the mercy of this fur-
 our test tube maelstrom which
 gives us all our feeling of help-
 lessness. By this helplessness, all
 of us are beginning to sense the
 truth, which is that you cannot
 bring peace and order to this
 tube through any amount of ef-
 fort or concern with the course
 of one nation, even our own. Only
 the exertion of some one stand-
 ing independent on all the sides
 molecules can hope to produce or-
 der and safety. Only a larger citi-
 zen's privilege, the privilege of
 influence on the whole test tube,
 and not merely on one of its ra-
 ing units, can restore to normal
 human beings a sense of control
 over their own destiny. Only when
 the ordinary citizen is able to put
 his finger on some one magnet
 which exercises some pull and in-
 fluence upon all the particles in
 the test tube will be again feel
 that there is some order and sense
 and security in this world.

It is because we hope that the
 United Nations will provide such
 magnet that the ordinary citizen,
 day after day, makes his pilgrim-

age to Lake Success. He isn't sure
 that it is. He doesn't know, yet,
 how to claim it and use it. He
 looks upon it with some wariness
 and hope. His heart leaps at
 the idea that it might be real.
 His mind says to itself: "Now
 suppose this was really it? What
 couldn't we do with this old world
 of ours?"

If any of us ever do live with
 the kind of United Nations the
 World Federalists want to build,
 the most important single devel-
 opment to us is going to be our feel-
 ing that we do possess some con-
 trol over our own destiny, that
 we have at last gained self-sovereignty,
 that the dignity and
 power of the individual has at
 last been realized, that having
 our own clear channel and process
 for exerting our will at last upon
 the course of mankind, we are no
 helpless, tragic pawns, but sov-
 ereigns all. The most basic of all
 our freedoms is the freedom to rule
 our own lives—the most precious
 of all sovereignties—the power to
 determine our own fate—can now
 be obtained only by this route.
 We do not possess them now. We
 have been, and are, the slaves of
 anarchy and tragic nonsense. Fed-
 eration can give us our emancipation
 and our attainment of the self-sover-
 eignty in which we will really
 feel ourselves masters of our own
 fate.

 Most of the Russian "viola-
 tions" of the Potsdam Agree-
 ment, as they are alleged by
 the Western Allies, consist of
 the refusal of the Russians to ac-

To Master Our Own Fate
 25.

To give you the feeling of atom-
 to death—that is one of the more
 highly developed talents of the
 leaders of United World Federalists.
 And it would be a good thing
 if more ordinary people should
 have and let into their own con-
 sciousness the realization that
 what will come, unless they stop
 it, will be the unparalleled de-
 struction of mankind. In an atom-
 war, perhaps the most tragic
 punishment of all would be to be
 a survivor.

We also like to keep on asking,
 however, how it would feel to live
 in a federated world.

We think that only in a federat-
 ed world can mankind regard a
 sense of control of its own des-
 tiny, a sense of goal, a sense of
 constructive order.

There was a time when man-
 kind was capable of feeling con-
 fident of its own destiny within the
 framework of a purely national
 structure. We in this country
 for instance, have long had the
 feeling that we were the special
 masters of our own fate.

Today we know that whatever
 we do in this country, it is with-
 out security unless it is part of
 a similar stability, security, and
 progress elsewhere. We can no
 longer control our own destiny
 merely by exerting our own influ-
 ence as citizens within our own
 closed democratic process.

We cannot hark back to the
 days when Americans had full
 control of American living, of
 the American destiny. We must,
 if we are to regain such control
 over our very own lives and
 fate, step forward into the
 more troubled arena of world
 decisions which really control us
 as being made.

Once we, and all other nations,
 were slow moving molecules mov-
 ing in a very large space. We
 could chart our own course very
 much as if we were alone within
 that space.

Now, in a modern world, that
 space allotted to the nations has
 been compressed. The inevitable
 result has been that we move
 faster, in closer and more fre-
 quent collision with one another,
 with more injury and force
 against one another, and that
 we can chart no course of our
 own which does not take into
 account the movement of the
 other molecules, or nations. So,
 unless we can provide some order
 and rhythm to the movements inside
 our test tube, it will blow up.

It is precisely the knowledge
 that, no matter how wisely and
 well, we happen to plan our own
 course, our actual movement is
 really at the mercy of this fur-
 our test tube maelstrom which
 gives us all our feeling of help-
 lessness. By this helplessness, all
 of us are beginning to sense the
 truth, which is that you cannot
 bring peace and order to this
 tube through any amount of ef-
 fort or concern with the course
 of one nation, even our own. Only
 the exertion of some one stand-
 ing independent on all the sides
 molecules can hope to produce or-
 der and safety. Only a larger citi-
 zen's privilege, the privilege of
 influence on the whole test tube,
 and not merely on one of its ra-
 ing units, can restore to normal
 human beings a sense of control
 over their own destiny. Only when
 the ordinary citizen is able to put
 his finger on some one magnet
 which exercises some pull and in-
 fluence upon all the particles in
 the test tube will be again feel
 that there is some order and sense
 and security in this world.
