German Rule Plan Ready

Allied Commanders to Meet Germans Tomorrow to Start Plan

Frankfurt, Germany, June 29.—(AP)—Top American, British and French occupation authorities worked out a plan here today for creating a new central government for western Germany.

Allied commanders said they would meet with German ministers tomorrow morning to set the plan into motion. The meeting will be open to both Allied and German newspapers. This was an indication that complete agreement had been reached on all controversial questions.

The plan for a central government was drawn up recently at the London meeting in London. The Russians rejected it and met in Poland last week with foreign ministers of other eastern European nations to set up a counter plan.

French Commander General L. Gen. Joseph Pierre Koenig, commander of French forces in Germany, was present for today's meeting.

quarter with \$71,000,000 worth of aid for European recovery shipments. That amount is about 56 per cent of the total amount originally set for shipments to Europe in the first three months of operations. Hoffman said the remaining 44 per cent will be carried over completely into the July-September aid for each country.

To Go Ahead on Food Shipments

Despite great improvement in European crop prospects, RCA intends to go ahead with planned food shipments in order to improve the European diet.

2. RCA does not intend to demand control over the American lines of policy, but will accept any such control as a condition of receiving their money.

However, Hoffman warned that if renormalized currency in any country threatens to wreck that nation's recovery, the American government "can refuse to invest the dollars of the American taxpayer."

Repeatedly, Hoffman emphasized that the United States intends to promote a partnership with Europe "without in the slightest degree intruding upon the national sovereignty of any nation.

We are seeking merely to help make each of the Marshall plan countries more prosperous, more independent, and more free of all need for outside economic assistance," he said.

Asked whether Yugoslavia might be brought into the Marshall plan because of present friction between Moscow and Maribor, Hoffman replied: "As far as I can read the news reports, there is no indication that Yugoslavia would remain very much in the Marshall plan orbit."

More Than Actually Spent

The \$71,000,000 set aside for European recovery shipments is much more than has actually been spent.

Actual spending, as shown by Treasury records, has covered the cost of RCA-approved foreign purchases totaling only \$37,624,444 up to this morning.

The latter figure reflects in part the necessary lag in handling international payments. But it will not approach the \$900,000,000 which President Truman has earmarked for European recovery in his January budget estimate.

The difference will contribute to the nation's expected record-breaking budget surplus for the fiscal year which ends tonight.

ECA also is behind schedule in making loans. All but four million dollars of the \$1.5 billion authorized for the program has been disbursed.

Though ECA scheduled loans totaling \$288,000,000 for the first quarter, it has loaned only \$100 million in a near announcement with two others at an advanced stage of negotiation.

To encourage private contributions to the recovery task, the government announced last night a mail subsidy on relief packages to western Europe and China. Subsidies on the reduced rates will be made available at every post office.

Health Officer Resigns On Eve of Taking Post

Greenwich, June 30—(AP)—Fear of being harassed by unpleasant group commission, has cost Greenwich the services of Dr. William Monroe, of Pittsfield, Mass., who was to have become the city's health officer tomorrow.

Dr. Monroe, who has been health commissioner of Pittsfield for many years, was appointed to the post last March. His salary here was to have been \$9,400. He leaves \$8,000 per year in Pittsfield.

In a letter of resignation submitted to the Board of Health yesterday, Dr. Monroe said he had decided not to accept the post here after reading an article in Greenwich Times, local newspaper. The article, Dr. Monroe, led him to believe he would be constantly harassed by unpleasant group commission. "To be placed in a defensive position at the outset of my services would certainly take away most of the joy of living," the doctor commented, adding "here in Pittsfield I am loved and needed, and therefore I think I should resign."

Critics of Board of Health, Ted Youdan, editor of the newspaper said that the article blamed by Dr. Monroe for his resignation was critical of the Board of Health but no criticism of the new health officer was included.

The Board of Health will hold a special meeting today to decide what action to take to fill the vacancy.

Rockville School Need Presses Here

Group Asks New Elementary Buildings Except on Maple Street

Rockville, June 30.—(Special)—Attorney Harry H. Lagg was named chairman of the special Town meeting held Tuesday evening in the Town hall and Town Clerk Kevin Elliott, read the warning.

The following report was presented by Chairman Rev. Forrest Manser for the committee of 12 named at the last meeting.

"At a special Town meeting held June 1, 1948, a committee of 12 citizens was appointed to make a study of the school needs of the Town of Vernon and report its findings to a Town meeting to be held four weeks later. The committee held a number of meetings, during which several plans were considered, consulted with the Building committee of the Board of Education, the First Selectman, and the Superintendent of schools and made a study of the recent report of a school survey made by the State Board of Education issued in March, 1948.

"A survey was made of elementary school children in the Town of Vernon showing numbers and locations of the present population. The following facts were ascertained as a result of this complete and detailed study:

"1. East school would need extensive and expensive repairs for continued use and still the town would have an old building on an adequate site. There are poor and dangerous playground facilities in the Northeast, Vernon Depot and Talcottville schools are very old, two of them being the best, having two, three and four grades in frames, respectively. Vernon Depot has no playground facilities.

"2. Vernon Depot is 117 years old and remains virtually the same as when built.

"3. The present elementary school facilities have served the town long and well and have more than paid for themselves.

"4. Crowded spaces.

"5. In the school year 1941-1942 the average daily attendance was 704 and the estimate for 1946-1947 is 875. This will utilize every space with additional seats needed in present rooms. Some rooms will have as many as 40-45 pupils per teacher where state educational standards suggest be 25-30 pupils per teacher.

"6. There is a large number of homes in the process of construction as well as contemplated ones. In respect for new homes with the completion of the Wilbur Cross Highway will accentuate the need for additional space. There is no room available for any additional children in our present inadequate facilities.

"7. Because of these serious defects and limitations of the present buildings as outlined our school authorities find it impossible to approach modern educational standards in curriculum, extra-curricular activities, recreational programs, health and safety of pupils.

"8. Because the children of the Town of Vernon deserve better facilities the committee unanimously reached the conclusion that with exception of Maple street school all existing elementary buildings are inadequate and recommend: That all schools except Maple street be discontinued for school purposes, and that two schools each with eight grades and kindergarten of a type similar to Ellington school be built in rural Vernon and one in the Northeast section of Rockville. 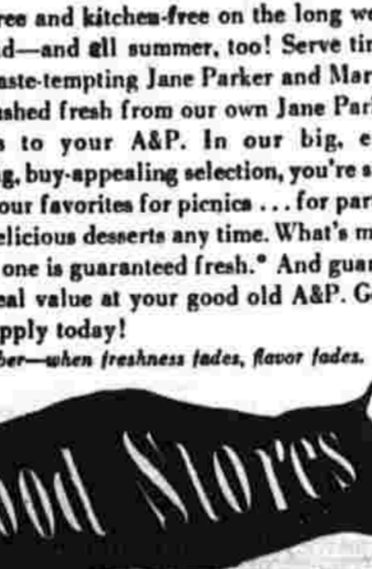
