Vote For Charter Revision
 The other day we noted, with interest, that the United Nations Little Assembly seemed to be kidding over the traces by its adoption of recommendations on the use of the big power veto in the Security Council which would seem to require actual amendment of the United Nations Charter. It was likely that these recommendations would have to lead, at the Paris session of the UN General Assembly next fall, to at least a discussion of the possibility of calling a General Conference of the United Nations for the purpose of considering amendments to the UN Charter.

Now the small nations who have been debating the procedure of the Little Assembly have done a little more than kid over the traces. They have indulged themselves in a mild sort of rumormongering. They did this, Friday, by adopting a resolution which reads as follows:
 "Whereas the deficiencies observed in the present functioning of the United Nations require due consideration, the interim committee recommends to the third regular session of the General Assembly to consider whether or not the time has come to call a general conference as provided under Article 109 of the Charter."
 This resolution was adopted by a vote of 19 to 7, the 19 including nine Latin American countries, five Middle Eastern, in addition to the United States, France, Britain, Norway, Canada, India, and the Union of South Africa.
 China and nine other countries abstained from voting.
 So, on the preliminary line-up as revealed in the Little Assembly, there is as yet no clear indication that the General Assembly itself would see the vote necessary for an actual calling of a charter revision conference formally registered. Under Article 109 it takes a two-thirds vote in the General Assembly, and the Security Council to call such a charter revision conference. In other words, the little nations can do it, if they ever close their own ranks. They themselves were still divided in last Friday's vote, but not too seriously divided, as is illustrated by the fact that few of them indulged in outright opposition to the resolution, choosing instead the noncommittal route of abstention from voting.
 The veto-throwing big powers were, of course, considerably out of step with a change of their own, and the United States representative in the Little Assembly deplored the action, predicting that it would have most unfortunate consequences. But it is to be doubted that any demonstration of sentiment for strengthening the United Nations can rightly be classified as harmful; to the contrary, it is healthy and hopeful.

A Folky Campaign

Picture Tells The Problem
 A news photograph from the harbor of Haifa, in Palestine, presents the world's present day problem in the simplest and most graphic of terms.
 It is a picture which showed the American crew on an American destroyer in Haifa harbor engaged in the process of raising a United Nations flag, symbol of the fact that this American destroyer was on United Nations Palestine troops duty.
 The significant thing about this flag-raising is the question which probably has already suggested itself to the minds of our readers.

Where, on an American destroyer, does the United Nations flag go?
 The picture shows it being raised "under" the United States flag. That means this is a United States ship second; a United Nations ship first.
 The problem thus graphically illustrated is that to make the United Nations flag worthy of top position, and to make ourselves willing to accord such a flag top position.
 Actually, such a position would already be in accordance with the actual role of our destroyer in Haifa harbor. That destroyer was not there to serve the national interests of the United States. It was there to serve the much larger interests of world law and peace. Actually, if in charge of such protocol dared do it, the United Nations flag should already fly on top, while our destroyer is engaged in this non-nationalistic mission.
 But it is not going to be as easy as that. Millions of ordinary Americans, who may, at the moment, even think it would be some form of sacrilege to allow any flag of any kind whatsoever to ever, ever, ever to take precedence over the Stars and Stripes, will have to think and feel the thing through, until they realize, for themselves, that no higher glory could come to the Stars and Stripes than for it to be flown in the service of a cause higher than that of any individual nation. Some day we are all going to realize that the Stars and Stripes has never meant so much to us, or caused such a swelling in our hearts, as when we see it truly and proudly dedicated to the highest ultimate service in mankind, in which the principles of freedom and peace in our own design illustrate are not merely the privilege of one group of men, within their own national borders, but the hope of all men everywhere.

The Dutch Veto
 The routine news story on the recent Dutch election carried the statement that the central issue in the election had been that of policy toward Indonesia. But it did not tell or interpret what the significance of the election result was in regard to Indonesian policy might be.
 The Christian Science Monitor, in a dispatch from its Hague correspondent, attempts to correct this lack of information and interpretation. After all, American readers, being told that an election is fought on a certain issue, would like to have some inkling as to which side of the issue won.
 According to the Christian Science Monitor article, the election result has been one of new shadows on the prospects of any semblance of Indonesian independence, even independence in the Dutch Parliament, which have favored at least dominion status for Indonesia have failed to gain the strength necessary for ratification of the amendment to the Dutch constitution which would permit such a policy. If they try to bargain for strength with other parties that may involve concessions which in themselves cast out everything except a polite fiction of Indonesian self-government. This situation, at home tends to weaken the position of the Dutch negotiators in Indonesia, who have been negotiating on the assumption that the constitutional amendment would be adopted back home.
 Thus, a domestic revival of Dutch imperialism seems to be threatening the war time promises of Queen Wilhelmina, who clearly offered dominion status to the Dutch colonial possessions. This seems to offer some support to rumors that one of the reasons for Queen Wilhelmina's retirement from the throne is protest against reputation of the war time promise she made in good faith.
 If this trend in The Netherlands continues, there can be only one result in Indonesia. It will be a new rebellion and war, made perhaps more tragic and bloody by the fact that the Dutch have, under the United Nations treaty, gained time to improve their own military position.
