

Holy Land's Aerial War in New Fury; Artillery Roaring

Egyptian Planes Bomb Tel Aviv as Bitter Battle Being Fought For Highway; Israeli Air Force Attacks Main Base at Gaza Cairo, July 13.—(AP)—Aerial warfare mounted with new fury in the Holy Land today while Arab and Jewish artillery blazed away in the bitter battle for the Jerusalem-Tel Aviv highway. Egyptian planes bombed Tel Aviv shortly before noon. The Israeli Air Force attacked the main Egyptian base at Gaza in southwest Palestine last night. Jews bolstered their position at the eastern end of the Jerusalem-Tel Aviv highway by capturing Subs, a strongpoint just below that vital artery five miles west of Jerusalem. An Israeli government source said Egyptian 100-pounder guns blasted Jewish sections of Jerusalem last night. The Arab Legion joined in the attack with mortar and shell fire, and the Jews replied with artillery fire on Arab positions near the Damascus gate to the old city. The Jews, holding the vital bastions of Lydda and Er-Ramle on the Jerusalem-Tel Aviv highway, launched an attack on Beit Nuba northwest of Latrun and met resistance from Arab Legion forces. Latrun blocks Jewish efforts to carry a decisive battle to the outskirts of Jerusalem. Israeli front dispatches reported two counter-attacks by mechanized Arab columns against Lydda. Guns hammered away around the rocky approaches to the Judean hills within sight of Lydda and Er-Ramle, which the Jews captured after two days of fighting. A Jewish government informant in Tel Aviv said there was every reason to expect a new Palestine truce, possibly Saturday. But in Amman, Abdel Rahman Azam Pasha told a reporter his meetings there with Israeli, Syrian, Lebanese and Trans-Jordanian officials were to intensify the Arab war effort. Azam Pasha said: "There is no question of a truce. We discussed closer coordination of Arab forces in the field and a speed-up of the drive against the Jews." The Syrian and Lebanese premiers are in Amman for separate talks with King Abdullah of Trans-Jordan and Azam Pasha. An informant associated with (Continued on Page Four)

Drop on Meat Costs Unlikely

Near Future Outlook Offers Slight Hope for American Consumer Chicago, July 13.—(AP)—With livestock pouping out new price records every few days, no immediate drop in the high cost of living on meat was seen today. Both private trade experts and the Agriculture Department agreed the near future outlook offered slight hope for the consumer. If anything, prices probably will go higher later this summer, they said. The prospect for lower prices next year was called encouraging, although largely hinged on the hope of a bumper corn crop this autumn. Equal All-Time Record Hog prices at Chicago yesterday equalled their all-time record of \$30.50 a hundred pounds. A new record of \$30.25 was made at East St. Louis, Ill. Other midwestern markets rang up prices at about all time peaks. Pretty much the same story was told in cattle and sheep. East St. Louis had an all time record for choice steers at \$38.75. Steers at Chicago touched \$40.00, equaling the July record set last week. Lambs also were bringing the highest price for any July in history at \$32.00. In Sioux City, Ia., a load of 64 steers averaging 1,011 pounds sold for \$35 per hundredweight to set a world record for a single sale of feeder cattle. The gross price paid for the 64 animals was \$25,324.10. George Dressler, secretary of National Retail Meat Dealers Association, said the normal summer falling off in demand for meat had appeared this year but wasn't big enough to make up for the shortage in meat production. Retail Prices "Probably Highest" "Prices probably are the highest on record at retail shops," Dressler admitted. As far as consumer resistance was concerned, Dressler said some housewives backed away from high prices but others went right on buying regardless of what the price was. H. M. Conway of the National Livestock Producers association, one of the private trade experts who warned of the current meat animal shortage last April 30, saw little improvement in the present situation until September. 50 Face Court As Terrorists

Vatican Charged With Abetting Defendants On Trial in Croatia Belgrade, Yugoslavia, July 13.—(AP)—The Croatian Supreme court heard charges against 50 accused "spies and terrorists." The indictment charged the Vatican with abetting the defendants and British-American occupation authorities with harboring them. The mass trial opened yesterday in Zagreb. Chief defendant is Ljubomir Milich, former Ustachi commander, accused of responsibility for the deaths of more than 200,000 persons during the German occupation. Part of Group of 95 The accused are part of a group of 95 whom the Croatian Interior Ministry said had been picked up by Security police as they entered Yugoslavia during the past year. They are accused of setting out to disrupt communications, plunder warehouses and cooperatives, destroy the Yugoslav five-year plan and finally to overthrow by armed rebellion, with outside help, the existing order in Yugoslavia. The indictment said the defendant were under direct command of the former puppet dictator of Croatia, Ante Pavelic, who is reported still at large. The documents declared the accused "with the help of agents of foreign espionage and trustees of the Vatican, started forming terrorist groups." Vatican Clerics Accused The charges said two priests—Augustin Jurstich and Krunoslav Draganovich—had paved the way for organizing the group in Rome. The document accused Vatican clerics of aiding in espionage work and hiding members of the group monasteries. 20,000 Civil Servants Go On Walkout

French Strike May Snowball Into Paralyzing Stopping Affecting Million Workers Paris, July 13.—(AP)—Approximately 20,000 French civil servants were called out on strike today in a movement which may snowball into a paralyzing stoppage affecting 1,000,000 government workers. The Executive committee of the non-Communist Workers' Force union called the strike because the government refused to grant certain employees a flat \$500 franc (\$12) monthly wage increase. Concessions Insufficient The committee said concessions offered by Premier Robert Schuman's cabinet in its meeting last night were insufficient. Workers affected are in the Interior, Justice, Public Health and Veterans ministries, and in prefecture and sub-prefecture offices throughout France. Those affiliated with the Workers Force are approximately two-thirds of the 30,000 persons employed in these administrations. Only a small percentage of France's 1,000,000 government workers have received strike (Continued on Page Four)

Strike Closes Electric Plant

6,000 CIO Workers Go Out; Two 'Branded Poor Security Risks' Philadelphia, July 13.—(AP)—Production ground to a complete halt today at the huge Lester, Pa., plant of Westinghouse Electric Corp., as 6,000 CIO workers continued a protest strike against the suspension of two members for "security" reasons. The stoppage began with a brief sit-down yesterday following a mass meeting of Local 107, United Electrical Machine and Radio Workers. It spread at subsequent shift changes to virtually all production workers and most of the office staff. The plant at suburban Lester is eight miles southwest of Philadelphia. Philadelphia, July 13.—(AP)—The huge South Philadelphia plant of the Westinghouse Electric company was shut down today in a protest strike of 6,000 CIO workers. John Schaefer, president of Local 107 of the United Electrical Radio and Machine Workers, said two men were "branded poor security risks" by the Navy and then "placed on a forced leave of absence and escorted from the plant." The two men—Frank Carner and Herbert Lewin—were employed in the Aviation Gas Turbine division of the Westinghouse plant at suburban Lester. Schaefer said they were "denied the right to work by unilateral action on the part of the Westinghouse company and the Navy department." Changes in Growth Rate Precede Attacks of Polio

Bialeskie Associated Press Science Editor New York, July 13.—(AP)—Discovery that certain changes in the rate of growth make children more likely to catch infantile paralysis was reported to the first International Polio conference today. The change that precedes polio is a slowdown in growth. Not just any slowdown, such as all children have from time to time, but the kind in which the youngster seems to be changing his basic body shape. Three Basic Shapes There are three of these basic shapes. One is chunky, another is long and lean and the third is the average, neither fat nor lean. In this study, made at the University of Minnesota, it was found that from the start in babyhood, a child is one of the three types, and is unlikely to shift to either of the other classes. The study was made on about 200 children who had infantile paralysis, about 200 of their brothers and sisters and 600 of their playmates. Among those who had polio, nearly 70 per cent had within the previous year or 15 months shown the growth change. They had (Continued on Page Four)

Truman Will Accept Barkley Nomination; Place Seen Clinched

'Strong' Race Issue Plank for Platform

Philadelphia, July 13.—(AP)—If Senator Alben W. Barkley of Kentucky is nominated as President Truman's running mate by the Democratic convention, who do you suppose has been lined up to tell him so? Senator Alben W. Barkley of Kentucky. A list of proposed committee assignments drawn up by the Democratic National committee today listed Barkley as "chairman of the Committee to Notify the Vice Presidential Nominee." Philadelphia, July 13.—(AP)—Sharp southern opposition to a tentatively approved civil rights plank today darkened hopes of Democratic party leaders of averting a bitter convention floor battle on this issue. Dixie leaders let it be known that the plank, described as a "strong" statement on the race issue, was "entirely unsatisfactory to the south." Philadelphia, July 13.—(AP)—Embattled Democratic platform drafters today skipped a point-by-point endorsement of President Truman's civil rights program. But, in a compromise move intended to re-unite the southern and self-styled "liberal" party wings, they wrote what some Truman supporters called a "strong" race issue plank. Phrased only in general terms it is reported to omit the far-reaching states' rights declaration angry Dixie delegates had demanded. The 4,600-word document, drawn by a subcommittee for action late today by the 108-member full platform committee, calls for repeal of the Taft-Hartley labor act and for an increase in the minimum wage from 40 cents to 75 cents an hour. Some of the drafters voiced confidence that the compromise will avert any floor fight when the platform goes before the National convention tomorrow for ratification. Others, however, were not so sure. One said the race plank was adopted "despite White House pressure for 'much more' on civil rights. President Truman was in frequent touch with the platform staff. Barkley Raps Rivals During His Keynote

Blasts Republican Party And Waves 'New Deal' Banner; Gets Rousing 28 Minute Ovation

Philadelphia, July 13.—(AP)—Senator Alben W. Barkley blasted the Republicans and waved the "New Deal" banner proudly last night in a thundering speech that lifted him close to the Democratic vice presidential nomination. The 70-year-old Democratic Senate leader was given a rousing 28-minute ovation at the end of his address keynoting the party's national convention. It was the first big outburst of enthusiasm from the delegates. Says Party Deserves Victory The Kentuckian said the Democratic party deserves victory this year because of its 16-year record of "devotion to the people's welfare." He was followed by Mrs. India Edwards, director of the party's Women's division, who sounded a battle cry against high prices, and Miss Frances Perkins, former secretary of labor, who called for a campaign "without mudslinging." Barkley solemnly mentioned the possibility of war and the efforts of the Truman administration to prevent it. "We have neither peace nor war," he said. "The world situation has reached a posture where intensity of feeling and spontaneity of conduct might easily precipitate armed conflict. Ewing Speech Bitter Blast

Democrats Lambaste Republican Rivals During Convention Today

Convention Hall, Philadelphia, July 13.—(AP)—Democratic convention speakers lambasted the Republicans with a new fire of blistering oratory today. The attack reached its bitterest stage yet in an address by Oscar R. Ewing, Federal security administrator. He told the delegates that the G.O.P. will wreck the social security program and keep none of the promises made at the Republican convention here three weeks ago. Similar blasts came in prepared speeches from Senator Brian McMahon of Connecticut, Rep. Michael J. Kirwan of Ohio, Mrs. Charles W. Tillett, vice chairman of the Democratic National committee, and Roy G. Baker, president of the Young Democratic Clubs of America. Ewing said the men who make the Republican promises and the men who write the Republican laws are not the same. "Feudal Four" Will Write Laws Gov. Thomas E. Dewey and Earl Warren will do the Republican talking and promising, he declared, but the Republican laws will be written by the feudal four—Taft, Taber, Martin and Halleck—whose thinking on almost every critical issue facing the country is nothing short of medieval. The security administrator said the Republicans promise to expand social security. They promised the same thing in 1944. He added, but they extended it backwards. "They put it in reverse. They passed a bill that took protection away from 700,000 workers. Will Not Lower Prices The Republicans promise to lower prices, he said, but they (Continued on Page Four)

McGrath Says President Has Not Closed Door On Others; Leaving It to Convention to Say Who Will Run With Him; Delegates Obviously in Mood To Turn to Senator Convention Hall, Philadelphia, July 13.—(AP)—President Truman put out the word today that the "will be most happy" to have Senator Alben W. Barkley as his vice presidential running mate. That appeared to clinch a Truman-Barkley ticket for the Democrats. "Announces Sentiment" Democratic Chairman J. Howard McGrath, announcing the president's sentiment, said Mr. Truman had not closed the door to others however and was leaving it to the Democratic convention to say who should run with him against the Republican team of Thomas E. Dewey and Earl Warren. But the delegates filing into this hall were obviously in a mood to turn to Barkley. They gave the 70-year-old Kentucky senator a 28-minute rousing demonstration last night after he made a fighting keynote speech. No Statement to Make Informer of McGrath's statement, Barkley told reporters: "I still have no statement to make as far as I'm concerned. "I'm not trying to be evasive but I've got to make up my own mind as to whether I would accept going under any condition, and I'm going to make up my mind while I am temporary chairman (of the convention). "After I get out from under that, maybe I'll have something to say." As keynote of the convention, Barkley is the temporary chairman. Barkley told reporters earlier that the president had telephoned him congratulations on his keynote speech but had said nothing about the vice presidency. Along with announcing the White House welcome mat is out for Barkley, McGrath told a news conference. It is possible President Truman (Continued on Page Eight)
