\$100,000 Fire At Riverside

Admit Killing Taxi Driver

New York, July 14.—(AP)—A note scribbled by a taxi driver before he was slain in his cab has led to the arrest of a 27-year-old Negro charged with murdering him with an axe.

Assistant District Attorney Karl Groves said today that the note, which was found in the taxi, admitted the killing.

Road Builders Get Damages

Judge Troland Asserts State Liable in Giving \$61,313.78 Award

Hartford, July 14.—(AP)—The state cannot contract to relieve itself from liability for its own fraud, a Superior Court judge today said in awarding damages of \$61,313.78, with interest at six per cent from Sept. 25, 1947.

The DeLaso company, a New York corporation with offices at 228 Main street, Springfield, had contracted to construct a part of the approach to the new Connecticut river bridge. It is known as the Hartwood bridge, 7,400 feet in length and located in the town of Westfield. The company represented in the contract that it was a subsidiary of the DeLaso company. The company, on the other hand, was given permission by the General Assembly, to bring suit in its own behalf.

Final Report On Vet School

Principal Bailey Releases Figures on Educational Project

Following is the final report of the Veterans' Division of Manchester High School prepared by Principal Edward M. Bailey.

On October 2, 1945 the Manchester Board of Education took the following action:

Voted to approve recommendations of the committee; (1) that veterans attending the Hartford Veterans' School be approved, and that it is advisable to set up our own school for veterans, and (2) that special provisions for high school diplomas be granted to attendants of the school to entitle them to military service before graduation be applicable after this date only to those students who have not received military service.

Pursuant to this vote a few veterans enrolled at the Hartford Public High School. By December it was apparent that the number of veterans seeking educational would justify opening a Veterans' Division at Manchester High School.

This was done January 14, 1946 with the enrollment of 146 students. The first year, 1946-47, the enrollment grew quite rapidly, reaching a peak in September, 1946, at 185 students. At this time there were twenty-eight classes consisting of 381 students.
