### AFL Winner In Runoff

Victor in Contest at Bridgeport Brass for Bargaining Rights

Bridgeport, July 21.—Weeks of campaigning by rival unions at the Bridgeport Brass company plant here were ended today with the victory of the AFL charter union in a struggle for collective bargaining rights.

About 5,000 employees were eligible to ballot in an election yesterday which was supervised by the National Labor Relations board. A total of 2,904 votes were cast, with these results:

AFL charter union, 1,715 Progressive Metal Workers council, American Marine and Shipbuilding workers (CIO), 1,177. There were 18 challenged ballots, and 26 were declared void.

The election was a runoff-off to a previous election last June 25 in which neither of the rival unions obtained a clear majority.

Smelter Workers Barred Brass company employees formerly represented by the Mine, Mill and Smelter workers (CIO), but that union was barred from the ballot in both elections. Its top officers have refused to sign the non-Communist affidavits required for NLRB certification under the Taft-Hartley act.

Herman W. Steinkraus, company president, said that negotiations for a contract covering working conditions and wages would be opened with officers of the AFL charter union after they have been elected. NLRB certification of the new union is expected in the next five days.

The company's contract with the Smelter Workers expired June 30.

### Housing Lack Hearing Held

Decision on Special Session of Assembly Rests With Shannon

Hartford, July 21.—The decision on whether to call a special session of the Legislature to do something about the housing shortage still rested with Governor James C. Shannon today.

And the Republican chief executive, after listening to arguments for an immediate special session at a hearing yesterday in the State Capitol, gave no indication he had changed his mind.

Shortly before the hearing opened, the governor had told reporters that in his opinion it would be silly for the state to act on housing before it finds out what Congress is going to do in its special session starting Monday.

The State Veterans' Housing Council, which requested yesterday's hearing, was joined by spokesmen for the AFL, CIO and various civic organizations in demands for the special session of the General Assembly.

Several Proposals Advanced The governor heard a number of proposals advanced to "solve" the housing problem, along with descriptions of "catastrophic" conditions arising from the housing shortage and predictions that will "cause a sharp increase in juvenile delinquency."

Most of the speakers, about 30 in all, favored these two moves by the state:

1. Payment of a state subsidy to promote the building of low-rental housing.

2. A ban on evictions except for non-payment of rent or commission of a nuisance.

Needless to say, the spirit of those two youngsters made the gift as important and as appreciated as though the amount were a hundred times 55 cents.

### To Let Youths Sign for Year

Armed Forces Open Ranks for 161,000 18-Year-Olds Today

Washington, July 21.—The armed forces opened their ranks today for 161,000 American 18-year-olds to volunteer for a special one-year hitch and thus avoid a two-year draft later.

The volunteers may, up to a point, pick the branch of service they wish to join. But the new draft law limits the annual total of the special enlistments to 110,000 for the Army, 28,000 for the Navy, including 4,000 for the Marines, and 18,000 for the Air Force.

For the first four weeks, beginning today, the Army will accept 10,000 men; the Navy-Marine 3,000, and the Air Force 1,000. Enlistments will be conducted by regular recruiting officers and qualified youths will be accepted in the order in which they apply.

After that, one year's service will be confined to the continental limits of the United States—the 18-year-olds must spend from four to six years in an organized reserve unit.

The peacetime draft law requires that all male civilians, 18 through 25, must register, but none can be drafted until reaching the age of 19. Registrations will start Aug. 30, beginning with men of 20 and working down to the 18-year-olds who will begin registering on Sept. 31.

Selective service officials estimate it will be a month or six weeks before they can set up machinery to govern classification and determinations.

Some questions on operation of the draft may be cleared up today by Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, national selective service director. He scheduled a news conference for 1:30 p. m. (E. S. T.).

Aides said that thus far there has been no decision on the class or classes to be called up for induction first. Hershey hinted Monday that the 20-year-olds may be taken first. This was supported by President Truman's action yesterday in ordering men in that age bracket to start the registration.

The herpetologist had been curator at the Minneapolis museum for 12 years until 1937, when she moved here and started collecting snakes and other reptiles.

Foundries Hit By Iron Lack

Dwindling Supplies Now Threaten Reviving Armament Program

Hartford, July 21.—Dwindling supplies of pig iron for Connecticut foundries, as well as others in most of New England, threaten to slow down the reviving armament program in the industrial east.

Foundrymen, however, are not going to let their supplies melt to the vanishing point, a check showed today.

With the aid of all the New England governors, the New England council and their own business association, they are mobilizing for an attack on the shortage.

One of the first steps was a conference with Governor Shuman at 2:30 this afternoon to advise him of the seriousness of the situation and to solicit his aid in promoting a big scrap steel drive for the metal collection campaigns during the war years.

The New England governors, scheduled to hold a meeting of their periodic conferences soon will take up the matter also.

Council to Direct Campaign The New England council will direct the six-state scrap steel collection campaign.

Scarc for some time and growing scarcer, pig iron is an essential ingredient in the making of castings for machines and their products. New England foundries use about 400,000 tons annually.

The shortage took a turn for the worse recently in the blast furnace at the Mystic Iron works in Weymouth, Mass., because of a lack of iron supplies stored throughout the nation. This source has been filling between 40 and 50 percent of New England requirements.

Russians May Get Tougher

3. After testing 56 kinds of clothing materials, the Agriculture Department's entomologists (bug and insect specialists) came to the conclusion that no cloth is steel-proof.

logic" as practiced before the war would appear to indicate that the new cabinet would be composed of Communists, Socialists and Radical Socialists. However, neither the Communists nor the Radical Socialists are in power for the time being. It is not clear whether the Communists share power with the Communists.

Schuman's government did not include Communists. It was made up of Radicals and Socialists as well as his own Popular Republicans. It quit cold when the Socialists voted against his defense budget.

Many experts now are talking about a "big ministry" cabinet which would include the parties in government plus other groups further to the right.

One difficulty in forming such a government rests on the fact that within the radical group and immediately on its right are supporters of Gen. Charles de Gaulle.

De Gaulle is supported by both the Socialists and the MRP and has himself often insisted that he would have nothing to do with any government under the present machinery which he considers unworkable.

Jacques Soustelle, de Gaulle's chief of staff, warned the general's followers in a speech yesterday that a "big ministry" would only be a sham.

Former Premier Edouard Herriot and Paul Reynaud were being mentioned as possible successors to Schuman. The French are searching for a strong government to speak for them in the four-power dealings they expect over the Berlin crisis.

Worried About Actions There are reports that the Socialists, who caused the fall of Schuman's cabinet, were worried about what they had done. Neutral observers said the Socialists had fumbled Schuman's government out of office in an attempt to secure more support from the voters.

The informants said the Socialists' move cutting Schuman's military budget constituted a gesture always popular with Leon Blum, the Socialist leader, was reported greatly distressed at the direction the minister took.

It was apparent that neither he nor his Socialist colleagues wished the government's collapse at such a time of world unrest. Also, it was reported that the Socialists were worried about what they had done.

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Parking Areas Plan Proposed

Greenwich Selectmen Make Public Draft of Proposed Ordinance

Greenwich, July 21.—Greenwich took another step today toward the establishment of so-called "center block" parking areas.

The selectmen gave the town the draft of a proposed ordinance which would give the town authority to condemn property in the center of blocks in the main business areas for municipally operated parking lots.

The ordinance was drafted by Town Counsel Orson L. St. John to implement a special act of the legislature giving the town the right to condemn property for off-street parking. It will be presented to the next town meeting, for which no date has yet been set.

The town meeting also will be asked to approve an appropriation to carry out the plan. This would suggest a \$100,000 appropriation already contained in the town's 1947-48 budget for the purchase and operation of parking lots.

Center block parking has been recommended by a number of traffic authorities, including the Yale University Bureau of Highway Traffic, as a means of relieving congestion, and has been adopted by a number of communities throughout the country.

Gives Report On Shortage

\$107,000 Embezzled by Dead Official of New Britain Bank

New Britain, July 21.—(AP)—A statement issued today by State Bank Commissioner Richard Poppe said that about \$107,000 had been embezzled from the People's Savings bank of New Britain by the institution's late president and treasurer, Paul Nurecky, who died on May 27. The main device used by Nurecky, according to the report, was the forging of false withdrawal orders on inactive accounts.

Accounts Fully Insured The statement was issued by the commissioner after an investigation into the accounts of the bank, an inquiry that began last month. The commissioner reassured depositors that their accounts are fully insured and are in no danger from the defalcations.

Rappor's complete statement follows: "The verification of depositors' accounts in the People's Savings bank of New Britain has revealed a total shortage of approximately \$107,000 in the funds of the bank. This amount is amply covered by the bank's surety bond and reserve accounts, and all depositor funds are intact and well protected. There would not have been any loss to depositors in any event, since all accounts are insured in full by the Savings Bank Deposit Guaranty Fund of Connecticut, Inc."

"The records of the bank and the investigations by this office and the state's attorney's office indicate that the funds of the bank were embezzled by its late president and treasurer, Paul Nurecky. The main device used was the forging of false withdrawal orders.

"Bank in Sound Condition" The People's Savings bank is sound and in a highly liquid condition, and the public may deal with it with full confidence. The board of the bank has taken prompt action to strengthen the management by changes in the managing and operating staff. The accounts of depositors continue to be fully insured by the Savings Bank Deposit Guaranty Fund of Connecticut, Inc."

A report made to the bank commissioner by the State Banking department showed that the People's Savings bank had total assets of \$3,104,732.17 as of Sept. 30, 1947.

The report listed deposits at \$2,819,599.28 and surplus accounts totaling \$177,632.89.

Nurecky was 55 years old at the time of his death. He was prominent in political, religious and business circles for many years and had been in ill health for some time.

Five On Downed Plane Rescued

Marcelle, France, July 21.—(AP)—Five of 13 crew members of a French Air Force Wellington plane were rescued today after a forced landing in the Mediterranean, the French Air Force headquarters for southern France announced.

Headquarters did not say that the remaining eight were definitely lost but merely that because planes had not yet sighted them.

Earlier the French news agency had reported that 20 were aboard and that all had been rescued. The plane, ferrying families of French soldiers from North Africa back to France, was forced down some 80 miles off the Mediterranean coast. It went out at 5:05 a.m. and French officials ordered planes and launches to the rescue.
