Change in the Situation

As Walter Lippman points out
 this morning, two of the elements
 of automatic compulsion toward
 higher and higher prices have
 disappeared from the Berlin
 situation.

The Berlin trouble began, the
 Russians made up their mind that
 they had at least an equal right
 to the right to force us out of
 Berlin, when we began making
 our plans for the partition of Ger-
 many, the creation of a western
 German state, and a western Ger-
 man constitution, and a western Ger-
 man capital.

Now the western Germans have
 apparently knocked our plans out.
 They have refused to establish a
 western German state; they have
 refused to begin preparing a con-
 stitution; they have refused to
 sponsor a public referendum to
 ratify our plan of a separate west-
 ern German government.

Americans can be pardoned if
 they have been slow to realize
 this rather important develop-
 ment. For, strangely enough, the
 German refusal was reported to
 the American people in headlines
 which hid the reality of the situa-
 tion by pretending that the Ger-
 mans had accepted our propo-
 sitions.

The situation is, however, that
 they rejected them, although with
 politely veiled diplomatic lan-
 guage, and that if we now persist
 in trying to create a western Ger-
 man state, we shall have to do
 it over the objections of the Ger-
 mans themselves.

The conclusion which Mr. Lip-
 pman draws is this:
 "Now that the Germans have
 refused to do the very thing which
 the Russians object, the struggle
 over Berlin is being waged over an issue which has
 not been totally dissolved. For
 the Germans have walked out on
 us. We are left with a bitter and
 dangerous struggle in which the
 main bone of contention—a west-
 ern German state—has been re-
 moved."

Fortunately for us, it seems
 we are going to be kept from the
 mistake of partitioning Germany.
 The second development concern-
 ing cause and tension from the
 Berlin situation, is the Russian
 offer to feed Berlin. Some west-
 ern sources scoff at this offer, but
 as the New York Times pointed
 out yesterday, it is only the Rus-
 sians who will be unmasked if the
 offer proves insincere. And as
 Mr. Lippman says today, we have
 not been and are not fighting
 "for the right to feed Berlin."

If our own plan for western
 Germany is dead, we have every
 reason to make our next move
 to Moscow one in which we are
 willing to talk about the problem of
 Germany as a whole. It is, in
 fact, one way for us to get out of
 the spot of the failure of our plan
 for western Germany. It is a way
 to thus tacitly abandon our pro-
 gram for a separate western Ger-
 many, we regain our moral right
 to stay in Berlin. And perhaps
 the resultant negotiations can
 lead to the happy event in which
 everybody gets out of Berlin and
 out of Germany, and the great
 victors make peace with Germany
 and therefore, to a large degree,
 with themselves.

Purge and Purge
 One headline said: "Purge Re-
 ported Ordered by Soviet in All
 Satellites."
 The other headline said: "13
 U. S. Communists Indicted in
 Anti-German Plot."
 The two stories belonged to-
 gether, even though the Soviet
 purge is reported to be a purge of
 individuals who actually have
 held some power in the Soviet
 system of things, while the

American purge is a purge of in-
 dividuals who have no real power
 in America and are never expect-
 ed to have any real power here.
 Russia, of course, has always
 been a land of purges, in which,
 for centuries, those who dared de-
 part from the Czarist line or the
 party line have suffered persecu-
 tion and punishment for their be-
 liefs. A purge by Russia is not
 new.

A purge by America is news. It
 is news because it is only in very
 rare instances that we weaken
 our faith in our own institutions
 sufficiently to indulge ourselves
 in punishment of those who do
 not admire and respect these in-
 stitutions.

 a physical examination to qualify
 for reinstatement.

Scoboria Waives Residence Ruling
 Hartford, July 22.—(AP)—Glendon
 A. Scoboria, state personnel
 director, today announced that
 the residence requirement has
 been waived for the examination
 for principal immunologist. And,
 in addition, the closing date for ap-
 plications has been extended to
 Aug. 15.

The duties consist of directing
 routine work and special studies
 on the immunological properties
 of human blood. Candidate must
 have at least eight years of em-
 ployment in this field or must
 have a doctor's degree in im-
 munology or genetics, plus one
 year of that type of employment.
 The annual salary range is \$31,
 900-\$4,620 with temporary adjust-
 ments.

700 Employees On New Scale

State Department of Education Raises Effective July 1

Hartford, July 22.—More than 700 professional employees of the state department of education are going on new salary schedules effective July 1. Many probably will receive more money right away and all are scheduled to receive higher maximums.

The new schedules have been approved by the State Personnel board. The board, the State Board of Education indicated that the total take-home salary would be what it asked for when the last schedules were adopted on Feb. 18, 1948.

It is impossible to determine just how much is involved in the increase because of the uncertainty of the new schedules. The personnel board has placed the old personnel on the new scale.

The personnel board, however, conceded that there are exceptions in the interests of justice. It is expected that some will be worked out by Acting Education Commissioner Flint E. Engstrom and his staff with the new schedules.

Cover Four Large Groups. The new schedule covers, for the most part, four large groups of professional educators, namely: college facilities, central office and rural supervisory personnel.

In approving the new schedules, the personnel board is considering the \$180 cost-of-living adjustment voted by the last legislative session. The cost-of-living adjustment is being made temporary increase allowed by the late Governor McCoskey.

The personnel board is also considering the \$180 would be added to the new schedules rather than the \$180 cost-of-living adjustment. This request was turned down.

In its budget proposal for submission to the 1949 General Assembly, the personnel board is making its salary request on the basis of the new schedules, plus any adjustments or the state's financial situation.

Way Schedule Works. Here is a way the new salary schedule works out in some cases: A junior instructor in a vocational school with a minimum of \$4,238, the latter to be attained through five steps of \$180 each.

The personnel board calls his salary range \$3,780-\$4,680 before adding \$180 and \$120 to the State Board of Education asks in this case a salary range of \$4,238-\$5,138, plus temporary adjustments.

As the Teachers College, there are schedules for professors, assistant professors, instructors and assistant instructors. Instructors now will be paid \$3,180-\$3,900.

The salary schedule also provides for several classifications also for central office staff members. An associate consultant in vocational education is classified at \$4,680-\$5,400. Basic salary is considered by the Personnel board to be \$4,238-\$5,138.

Money to finance these salary increases will be taken from the State board surplus which is found largely in appropriation for veterans' education. The salary schedules allowed by the Personnel board were approved with few exceptions in a study by the Connecticut Expenditure council, made at the request of Governor Shannon.
