Approximately 4,000 troops of the 43rd Division from Connecticut, Rhode Island and Vermont

will start their two weeks field training at Camp Edwards, Cape Cod, August 14, it was announced today by Major General Kenneth F. A Step Back From The Edge

If the trend the great powers had been following at Berlin had continued a few more days, the Russians would have been attempting to shut off air traffic into Berlin and we would have been attempting to send an armored train through to Berlin. These are the most possible acts in the game of force and bluff we were playing. Either one, of course, could easily have meant war.

Instead, the great powers have turned to diplomacy. They are talking in Moscow instead of intensifying the fight in Berlin.

To a degree, we are back where we were that day morning, when they were the first news that the United States had sent a note to Moscow, suggesting an adjustment of the differences between the two powers, and Russia had accepted that idea.

We are now doing, in Moscow, what we might have done then. We are engaging in preliminary diplomatic conversations to find out whether further and more important diplomatic meetings are possible. We are trying to find out whether Russia really wants to negotiate.

Presumably, we are ourselves carrying some proof of our own willingness to seek a settlement. We are, for instance, ready to engage in those general talks on Germany which we refused only a few days ago. What the world is edging toward, cautiously, and for the first time since the war itself ended, is some general settlement which will place peace rather than new war in the ascendancy. It may be, if we get it, an uneasy peace, which will completely satisfy no one. But the great powers now have compelling reasons to seek it. All of them have, at Berlin, come close enough to war to get a good new look at it, and realize, for themselves, that there can be nothing in war for anybody. They should, at Moscow, be in sober, compromising mien. For they have just risked more than civilization can afford, and if they fail to be reasonable with one another at Moscow they will be risking it again.

Which is First?

One United Nations correspondent sees the issue on disarmament summed up in the following question: "Should disarmament precede international trust and security or follow it?"

The western powers, at Lake Success, have taken the attitude that there can be no disarmament until the world has become a diplomatic world. It is in that attitude that they have dispatched the United Nations Commission which was studying the question of disarmament. They see the world troubled by power politics and armament rivalries today. That makes it, by their logic, no time to try to agree on disarmament. As physicians, these diplomats would never try to heal the great world disease of armament and war until the disease has itself receded—if it will recede of itself.

The Russians, with their sincerity continually questioned by the western powers, have been saying something quite opposite. They say, very simply, just about what Maxim Litvinov used to say back in the days when Russia was preaching universal disarmament in the League of Nations. He said that "The way to disarm is to disarm."

Whatever the present intentions of the Russians, however much they may be merely exploiting an opportunity to spread idealistic propaganda, we think the truth of the words themselves is evident.

If there is international tension today, the most certain and fruitful way to relax and cure that tension is to make sure that nobody is permitted to use force in the course of that tension. It is true that armaments are an evil, and a cause of evil in themselves. But we must not forget that we make sure that private individuals are not permitted to settle their own differences by force and conflicting ambitions. Not when a gang of outlaws is on a rampage, do we sit down and decide that we must wait until they cool down before we try to take their weapons away from them.

"The way to disarm is to disarm." Perhaps the Russians don't mean it. But it would still have been something if the western diplomats, instead of being so eager and willing to assume that the Russians don't mean it, should have taken the time to talk their weapons away from them.

One thing is certain. It is that the western position, that of waiting for the millennium in order to disarm, will never be put to the test. For, so long as there are arms in the possession of nations, there will be no millennium.

Face-Saving Shadow Left

A casual reader of the headlines would get the impression that the American plan for a separate government in western Germany, which caused the Berlin crisis, is going full speed ahead. That is what our own leaders say, for publication.

It is true enough that some thing is going ahead. But it is not the establishment of a new and separate government for western Germany. That was the program last June. But what is going forward now is an elaborate program of face-saving for all parties concerned.

We are saving our own face by pretending that although the Germans rejected the central elements in our plan for a separate government in western Germany, we are still going ahead with such a thing. The Germans are helping us save our face by pretending that they are accepting our proposals, even after they have rejected the most essential provisions involved. And the Germans are saving face, of course, by making it clear that the western German government they are accepting is no government at all.

Practically speaking, it has now been agreed by all concerned that there will be no "commitment" assembly or "provisional constitution" set up for western Germany. What there will be amounts to nothing more than a little group working together of the government already existing in the

Dinner to Be Given Walsh

What is going on, then, is that everybody is going through the motions of setting up a western German government which is not a western German government at all. Why, then, do we continue with this elaborate farce? Primarily we do because of the question of face and prestige, and because we do not want to admit openly that our own program has proved a failure.

But the fact remains that this program, which began the present crisis in Germany, is now nothing more than a legal shadow and a face-saving pretense. It is something we ought to be glad to toss into the hopper of an all-European settlement, if we get the chance.

Bridgeport, Aug. 2—(P)—The Connecticut chapter of the National Committee for Democratic Action today urged Connecticut Democrats to give the gubernatorial nomination to Chester Bowles, asserting he could win the most far-sighted and Democratic ticket.

A statement issued by the State ADA Executive board through its chairman, John A. Everett, called Bowles "the most far-sighted and practical leader in Connecticut."

"Bowles' leadership has been recognized by the two biggest issues facing the people of Connecticut today—prices and housing," Everett said. "Within the past few days President Truman recommended major portions of Bowles' program to the special congressional session, and Governor Shannon has indicated the probability of a special legislative session to spur public and private housing and control evictions, as recommended by Bowles and the ADA."

Bowles and Thomas J. Dodd of Lebanon, are the leading candidates for gubernatorial nomination to be made at the Democratic State convention Aug. 13 and 14.
