Syria Watches Moscow Talks

Outcome May Influence Decision on Bringing Crisis Before Council

Lake Success, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Syria is watching the Russian-Soviet talks in Moscow with interest to see whether or not to bring the situation before the Security Council.

Paris (AP)—A Syrian delegate, said the outcome of the present talks in the Kremlin might influence Syria's final decision. He challenged the Big Four powers—France, Britain, the United States and Russia—last week to bring Berlin before the Council. He said it would be more honorable for them to do so than for a smaller nation to have to take such a step.

Watching talks closely
He said now that he did not know the final action his government might take on the Berlin question but that they were watching it "with great interest."

Another delegation on the Security Council also is keenly interested in the progress of the Moscow talks.

The Colombian delegate, Dr. Roberto Urdaneta, said about a month ago that the issue of the blockade of German capital goods should be brought to the Council but so far he has not taken any action.

It was disclosed earlier that Trygve Lie, U.N. secretary-general, was calling the attention of the Council's attention to the Berlin situation. He could do this under a U.N. charter provision which says the secretary-general can make up any situation he feels might threaten peace.

He consulted the British, American and French delegations. He was advised by them that they preferred now to try to settle it among themselves.

Situation Seems Growing Before U.N. Some delegates have expressed belief, however, that the Berlin situation eventually will be before the U.N., perhaps at the General Assembly meeting in Paris Sept. 21. If so, they say, they expect the U.N. Security Council will be called on to take up the matter.

Hartford, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Chairman Eugene S. McLaughlin says that the Public Utilities Commission "will not interfere in any manner in contract between public service companies and their employees."

The commission's position was made known in answering the request of A.P.C.-organized trolley men and bus operators that the commission delay acting on applications for three Bridgeport bus companies to sell their franchises and some of their equipment to a fourth company.

McLaughlin indicated however that the PUC would reserve decision on the applications until the Mediation board had reached its decision, and said that the companies and the union may then present their claims to the PUC if they relate to the merger proposal.

Body of Kjar Is Recovered

Was Passenger in Sea-plane that Crashed in Columbia Lake

Columbia, Aug. 3.—(Special)—State police and local residents, crapping in Columbia lake, the body of Richard Kjar, 18, of Hartford, recovered today at 11 a. m. Kjar was a passenger in a Luscombe seaplane that crashed into the lake yesterday afternoon. It is believed he was thrown out, and unable to swim, drowned before rescuers could reach him.

The State Police Rescue Squad from Colchester barracks had gaged unsuccessfully for the body all yesterday afternoon. There were no waves within bearing distance of the crash.

The pilot, Paul F. Jarvis, 20, of 234 Collins street, Hartford, was critically hurt in the crash, and today was on the danger list in Windham Community Memorial hospital, Williamsville, with a fractured skull and possible internal injuries.

The men were brothers-in-law. The plane, according to lake shore residents, had landed on the lake some time previous to the crash while the occupants were swimming. On taking off, it was thought to have encountered a low tide and was unable to take off from an altitude of about 100 feet.

The plane crashed to surface Guy Beck of Columbia and its engine, which was damaged by a summer resident, dove down and succeeded in loosening the safety belt of Jarvis and bowing him to the surface. Kjar was not found. The plane was destroyed in a crash at 1:10 this morning and by 1:30 all four had been brought in.

Details of Truce Discussed Today

Jerusalem, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Details of the Jerusalem truce and the Holy City's future status were discussed today by Count Folke Bernadotte and Dr. Bernard Joseph, newly appointed military governor of the Jewish sector of the city.

The meeting between Joseph and the United Nations Palestine mediator took place in a Jewish Agency conference room. U. N. representatives and members of the local Jewish community attended.

While the conference took place, inter-ethnic sniper shots had been from the old city where black smoke could be seen rising from a burning oil store.

One Jew was reported killed by a sniper about a half hour before Bernadotte and his staff crossed into Jewish lines.

Bernadotte arrived in the Holy City yesterday in his Red Cross plane from Amman, capital of Trans-Jordan. During a three-hour visit in the old city he conferred with Arab Legion Commander Brigadier John Glubb Pasha and Arab leaders.

Meeks Completes Work for State

Hartford, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Everett V. Meeks, former dean of the Yale architectural school, has left the state's Real Assets division where he served as an architectural consultant.

Comptroller Fred R. Zeller said today that Dean Meeks had finished his job with the division, which was checking on plans for the state's current building program.

Mr. Meeks had been employed by the state on a fee basis and spent several days a week in that work.

Dawson Death Case Continued

Norwich, Aug. 3.—(AP)—The Norwich police court today continued until next Monday the case of John F. Dawson, 49, of New Britain, charged with manslaughter in connection with the death of his wife, Helen, 50, in a hotel room here Saturday.

Dawson, an electrical engineer, was charged with murder after he posted \$2,500 bail yesterday, was in custody here and charged with manslaughter. The first patient arrived at the Manchester Memorial hospital at 1:10 this morning and by 1:30 all four had been brought in.

Discovered by Taxi Driver
Maurice Bunnell, a driver for the City Cab Company of Manchester, was returning from Colchester where he had taken a passenger early this morning. He had made the turn from Route 94 into Route 85 when he noticed a car in the ditch. Slowing down and lowering the window he heard a cry for help. Leaving his taxi he investigated.

The four occupants had been thrown clear of the car. One of them, Leo Foran, was unconscious, and David Robbins was in a semiconscious condition. The only building nearby was a vacant school building. Mr. Bunnell returned to his taxi and immediately drove to the nearest farmhouse where he was unable to awaken the occupants. At the second house he called by he was able to rouse the people. He was taken to a call by pull through for help from the State Police and his taxi returned to the scene of the accident.

Hebron Leader Taken by Death

Hebron, Aug. 3.—(AP)—State Rep. Fitch N. Jones, 66, died today at St. Francis hospital, Hartford. He had been in ill health for some time but was removed to the hospital only yesterday.

Jones, a Democrat, represented this town in the General Assembly for the last two sessions. He also was third selectman here and at one time was a member of the Board of Education. He was a farmer by occupation.

Survivors include: his widow, Mrs. M. Foster Jones, and a daughter, Mrs. Helen Porter, both of Hebron, two grandsons and one great-granddaughter. Funeral plans are incomplete.

Whitfield and Mckenley Seek Second Olympic Win

Olympic Stadium, Wembley, England, Aug. 3.—Two men long have a chance to win two gold medals in track events at the 1948 Olympic games—and their ambitions collide squarely. They are Al Whitfield, United States Army Air Force Sergeant who is the new 800 meter king, and Herb Mckenley, the Jamaican who is the new 200 meter champion. They meet in the 400 meters, which reaches the finals on Saturday. They are the only men left in track who can become double winners in 1948.

It is a coincidence, each is a co-ordinator in the 1948 Olympic games. Whitfield's victory in the 800 meters in 1948 equaled the world record of 1:49.8 set by Tom Hampton of Great Britain in 1922. Smith took the pole vault at 14 feet, 1-1/4 inches after failing twice at that height. In his first attempt he cleared 12 feet, 6 inches. In his second he cleared 13 feet, 6 inches.

Starting the fourth track competition, the modified team point totals, based on 10 for first place and 5, 4, 3, 2, 1 for the rest, showed the United States far ahead with 35 and Sweden next with 22.

Oregon is known as the "Valentine State" because it was admitted to the union on St. Valentine's Day, 1859.

Whitfield's tingling victory in the run over a superb 800 yard yesterday started him on his way to Olympic heights and gave him a new Olympic record of 1:49.2. Then came the courageous 400-meter pole vault of Guinn Smith, the University of California student who was told only two months ago an injured knee carriage would force him to stop competition. This victory brought to five the number of United States champions in men's track and field.

Sweden, Belgium, Australia, Italy and Czechoslovakia have one each. Fourteen more events remain to be run off.

"We are winning everything we thought we would, and we are doing some things I didn't think we could do," said Coach Dean Cromwell—overlooking in his gleam American embarrassment at losing the high jump.
