Shelling Town Reports False

Two Separate Investigations Made on Sandwich, Mass., Tales
Hartford, Aug. 18.—(P)—Camp Edwards, Mass., reports that the 42nd National Guard division artillery was shelling the nearby town of Sandwich which has been branded as false.
Two separate investigations were completed today on the matter. Both failed to find any evi-

dence supporting information from residents of the town that a shell had fallen close to their homes Tuesday afternoon.
One inquiry was conducted by the 43rd division artillery section and the other by regular Army officers of the camp's permanent headquarters.
According to information from the Sandwich Police department several calls were received by them saying that shells were falling in the township outside the camp area.
A team of inspectors was immediately organized and sent to the area where the shells were reported to have burst themselves in a swamp. No visible signs of the projectiles could be found.
Later the inspectors interviewed persons living in the section. Several said that they had heard "a shell go off with a louder report than usual." None actually saw a shell land in the area.
The 3rd division artillery record section announced that they had accounted for every shell fired on Tuesday and that to the best of their knowledge it would have been impossible for any projectile to land near the town.

Housing Talk By Directors

Various Opinions Expressed on Local Situation at Meeting
Representative Sherwood G. Bowers, who also is a member of the Board of Directors, received scant assistance from his colleagues on the Board last night when he sought to learn from them if there were any special housing or legislative ideas he might further at the special session of the General Assembly which convenes next week.
Noting that the session appears largely concerned with housing problems, Bowers asserted that he personally does not think that proposed bills, which would increase the amount of state guarantees for housing bonds "are worth the paper they are printed on."
The stand made by Bowers, a Republican, was taken to indicate that he is not impressed by the housing program ready for presentation to the General Assembly. Bowers like "to see something that would really get money for houses" instead of further guarantees of bonds.
He was joined in this view by several directors and by General Manager George H. Waddell, who said that he has rather hoped that something might be worked out on a subsidy basis similar to the "50-50 proposition, half state and half town money" with which Greenhaven was built.
However, Waddell said that he does not now favor any such tradition unless they are working out on a subsidy basis here for local residents. Waddell said, "but it doesn't look as if this is any temporary condition. Our five or six temporary houses are going to be used longer than that term, the way things are."
He pointed out that although there is much building activity for the most all of the houses built are being sold to persons from out of town. "A little building for local people, and practically no rental housing for anyone is being put up here, it was asserted.
After some discussion, Bowers asked, "well, what do you want me to do?" which drew from Mayor Eugene H. Brien a reply that "you're asking us to tell you an answer in five minutes that nobody else has thought of."
Desperate Need Here
There was further discussion with Bowers stressing the great need here for houses which people can afford to buy. He said that he felt that special attention, if more housing is provided, these to be sold "when the town goes out of the housing business."
"If we can't go in there and have some idea of what we're going to do," Bowers observed.
There was some further comment, most of it to the point that the rental housing need here "had hardly been touched so far."
Representative Bowers received no suggestions on legislation.

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Board Takes Action To Remove Griswold

Directors Vote 4 to 2. Backing Charge Made by Martin at Last Meeting

By a four to two vote last night the Board of Directors, instructed General Manager George H. Waddell to write Hayden L. Griswold, member of the Town Planning Commission, appraising Griswold the Board intends to remove him from his office.

The motion, made by Director Richard Turkington and seconded by Director Sherwood G. Bowers, contained also what Martin said he thought was a sufficient "charge" against Griswold for process of removal under terms of the charter.

Martin charged that Griswold could not properly continue as a member of the Board, as he had not worked as an engineer, on which he might later pass as a public official.

Protested Vigorously. The resolution brought sharp and vigorous protest from Director Harold Turkington, who held that Griswold's integrity was being questioned without provocation, and from Director Raymond E. Hagedorn who stated that it will probably be impossible for Director Turkington to secure any further assistance from consultants in engineering on the barriers it was erecting.

The vote on the resolution found Directors Martin, Bowers, Lappen and Russell in favor and Directors Hagedorn and Turkington opposed. Director Alden Bailey, who was present, did not vote.

After his official notification, Griswold may request either a public or private hearing before the Directors can oust him. There has been indication that he may contest the ouster all the way.

Action on the Griswold matter came with presentation to the Directors of a communication from Griswold asking for more details on the Board's previous request that he resign.

Griswold stated that the request that he resign contained "no reason for this action" and he asserted that in "all fairness to my family, clients and myself" he could not take action until charges, if any, were lodged against him.

Directors opposing action against Griswold later indicated that they still can see no "charge" brought against Griswold. He has been accused of no specific act, they recalled, that would force his dismissal. Griswold, it was noted, has served over three years without finding of fault against him, during all of this time practicing his profession of engineer.

The majority, however, agreed with Martin that Griswold's private practice conflicted with his public duties.

Table Action On Holman

Directors Delay Move On His Decision to Quit Post

"We may have to show cause in the Griswold matter," Hagedorn said. He continued that recently, when Holman had sought to retire from public life, "some of us as town officials beseeched him to continue and help us out. I think much more thought and consideration should be given to this matter," Hagedorn said.

When the motion to accept the resignation was put to vote, Hagedorn's plea prevailed, and the motion was lost with Mayor England not voting, and Directors Lappen, Bowers and Martin favoring it. Director Carl Hultine was absent.

To Await Griswold Action. The move to table action until disposal of the Griswold matter followed.

Later, after the Board had discussed Griswold's refusal to resign, and had voted to oust him, Director Martin moved to take the Holman resignation from the table.

Director Bowers stated that it was his understanding the vote to table was until such time as the Griswold question was fully and finally decided. The motion was then withdrawn.

Local Man Describes Present Day England

Henry Escott, Just Returned, Tells How London Put on Her "New Look" for Olympics

London has put on her new "look," according to Henry Escott of 266 High street, west, local insurance and real estate man, who has just returned from the Olympics in Wembley and a stay of two weeks in England's capital city, climaxing a tour of the British Isles since early June.

Mr. Escott was present at the opening session and was fortunate in having a seat near the royal family, King George and Queen Elizabeth, Princess Margaret Rose and Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh, whose wife, Princess Elizabeth was absent. Her Majesty, dressed in a glistening blue dress and off-the-face matching hat, appeared smiling and gracious as always. The opening day was warm and pleasant but rain and cool weather prevailed after that.

About Town

Mrs. Frank Mann of Rockville has resigned, dated as effective August 10, was presented to the Directors officially last night.

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The local man toured both the English and Scottish lake regions, visited Coventry which suffered so severely during the war; he also stayed at Shakespeare's birthplace at Stratford-on-Avon, at numerous castles and cathedrals, and was enthusiastic over Edinburgh and other places in Scotland.

Mr. Escott happened to be in Glasgow, Scotland, for a pre-celebration of "July Twelfth," on Saturday the 14th, by the Orange-men, and was in Belfast, (which some people call the Glasgow of the north), where he saw the numerous statues and memorials in the metropolitan area were cleaned and the facade of public buildings, hotels and private homes have been painted or otherwise renovated, although in some sections, Mr. Escott says, there are acres of ruins of orange lines, which have been removed and no rebuilding has as yet been undertaken because of the shortage of labor and materials.

The local man said he took with him only one pair of shoes, and while he traveled mostly by bus so that he could better view the country side, in London, he walked so much on his sightseeing jaunts he was almost on his uppers and had to have the shoes re-soled.

Talks About Food. He visited the houses of Parliament, Westminster Abbey, St. Paul's and Yorkminster Cathedral, where he was able to attend an Episcopal conference. He saw the "Changing of the Guard" viewed the royal palaces and parks, and was on the go every waking minute. At the hotel where he made his London headquarters and usually ate his breakfast, the menu invariably consisted of toast, tea or coffee, fried herring and a small piece of cake or a bun. Sugar may be had but candy is rationed. Eggs are becoming more plentiful. The English people like roast beef for their Sunday dinner, and if they are able to obtain a small roast it must last into the week, when they may buy a piece of corned beef, and for the end of the week, fish; fats are still almost unobtainable.

The British shilling, usually equivalent to our quarter of a dollar only buys 20 cents worth. However, at one hotel he was able to get a room and fair meals for the equivalent of \$2.80 a day. Clothing is even more of a problem and many of the men in the middle class are obliged to wear shabby clothes. Suits cannot be purchased with the coupons allowed for a year as other articles of clothing are needed and the greatest economy is practiced in buying. Materials, too, are of a much coarser weave than before the war.

Born in England. Mr. Escott was born in Moseley, near Manchester, England. He was only seven years old when he came with his parents to this country, and has a hazy recollection of the Main street of this town. Like its near neighbor, Manchester, textile industries prevail. He remembers his uncle who lives there but the cousins he never saw before.

Strange Coincidence. It is a coincidence that Mr. Escott, who sailed on June 3 on the "Green Tiger" of the U. S. Line for England, visited Moseley Council soon after his arrival and met the mayors of Moseley, Mrs. F. Dyson, and also made a courtesy call on Mayores Mary Kings-

Labeling the president as "the biggest peacetime spender of all time," Hallett said the administration, "infected by radicalism and any way prey for Communist spy rings, viciously attacked Congress for cutting spendthrift budgets, for cutting taxes, for passing the stifling OPA controls."

Hallett said Republican housing bills had "generated a building boom." He mentioned aid to farmers and strengthened national defense. He dwelt, too, on the \$9,379,000,000 aid appropriated for foreign nations.

Saying Mr. Truman had "stoked the boilers of inflation that has brought its trail of high prices" with a government spending program, the G. O. P. leader concluded:

"The evidence, daily revealed, is abundant that President Truman is a confused, bewildered, perplexed man swamped by the tremendous responsibilities of the presidency."

Lydia is a fine girl on the part of Mr. Waddell and children who failed to make the trip to Columbia, where she is living.

The girl applied for an alien's emergency passport which was granted after "careful consideration," an Alien Commission source said.

The Foreign Office spokesman said that several times during 1946 the Soviet embassy asked the girl to go back to Russia and showed her letters from her father, a Soviet Army officer, asking her to return. She refused.

The embassy also asked the Swedish Foreign Office to make the girl return, claiming she was "kept prisoner" in Sweden. The spokesman said Swedish authorities took no action. He added:

"If she does not want to return, we cannot force her to do so. We found that the girl is in good hands, and has been so during her entire stay in Sweden."

On August 5 and again August 11 a Soviet consulate appeared at the home where the girl works to show her a letter from her father. The girl refused to see the Russian and later, when she saw the letter, she burned it.

Planning Curb On Evictions

Shannon to Ask Legislature to Declare Virtual Moratorium

Hartford, Aug. 18.—Gov. Shannon will ask the special session of the Legislature to declare a virtual moratorium on evictions of tenants.

Under a bill on which he was working today for presentation to next week's session, landlords will be able to evict only for nonpayment of rent or for acts of nuisance or damage by tenants.

Setting Up New Procedure

The governor is setting up new procedure establishing the Common Pleas court as the tribunal where execution of eviction judgments may be delayed.

All the tenants will be required to do one of two things: either sign a local court in to sign a prescribed form which will automatically go to the higher court without cost to the defendant.

If the Common Pleas court is not in session, any judge of the court may set on the application for the stay of execution.

Fish from Hilliard's Pond Now on Way to River

Fish in Hilliard's new pond, located east of Adams street, are now on their way to the Connecticut river. The gates to the pond were opened last night by some unknown person, allowing the water to escape and carrying the fish with it into the Hocumum river.

The pond is one of two ponds built by the E. E. Hilliard Company on Bigelow Brook to furnish water power for the woolen mills in Hilliardville.

The first pond is known as the old pond and is located on the south side of Middle Turnpike west. This dam went out in 1908 when it was undermined by muskrat. The water rushed into the new pond carrying out the dam there and sweeping down with such force as to wash away the stone arch bridge on Adams street and the rear part of the mill. This was repaired.

The mills and the ponds are now owned by the Ace Woolen Company. This company no longer depends upon water power. A spokesman for the company this morning said that they did not know when or where the gate was opened or who opened it. When the trouble was discovered the gates were closed and the pond is again filling up.

Changes Plans On Extension

State Considering Four Extra Floors for Office Building Addition

Hartford, Aug. 18.—(AP)—A seven rather than a three-story extension to the present State Office building is now being planned by state officials.

Comptroller Fred R. Zeller said today that architects are now reviewing plans to add four additional floors on the proposed extension.

Although the state now has only enough money for the three-story addition—estimated to cost \$1,000,000—the 40,000 square feet of the 1949 Legislature will be asked to make some \$1,000,000 more available. He said. The latter sum would cover the four extra stories totaling 50,000 square feet.

Early in September the state will advertise for bids on the three-story extension, plus alterations for the four additional stories. Mr. Zeller said.

"We could then start on the first three floors," he said, "and be prepared to award a contract

Would Develop State's Parks

Commission Seeking \$25,000 to Draw Up Plans for Program

Hartford, Aug. 18.—(AP)—The State Park and Forest commission wants \$25,000 with which to draw up plans for development of Connecticut parks.

The plans would be the first step in an anticipated development program to be financed from a 20-year, self-liquidating bond issue. The 1947 Legislature approved such an issue and placed a \$1,000,000 maximum on it.

Administrative Director Donald C. Matthews said today the State Finance Advisory committee will be asked to grant the \$25,000 at its meeting next month. Approval is expected.

The sum, Mr. Matthews said, will go largely into plans for Hammonasset and Sherwood Island state parks. This would include extension of parking lots and camping sites, as well as moving back the present boardwalk at Hammonasset.

The money would pay salaries and miscellaneous expenses connected with hiring of five men to draw the plans.

The self-liquidating bond issue, expected to follow, will be financed from fees collected at the parks. A move may be made at the 1949 Legislature to have money appropriated to cover special summer-time help at the parks—now paid from receipts. This would leave the income free for use in amortizing the bond issue.

Another false alarm was turned in last night from 1130 O'clock. It was turned in at 11:30 O'clock. It was responded to by three pieces of apparatus from Companies 1 and 2 of the South Manchester Fire Department. Arriving at the box no fire was found and the recall was as soon sounded.

The police, as soon as the alarm from that location was heard, figured that it was false and dispatched two cruisers to attempt to catch the culprits but were unsuccessful. There have been more false alarms turned in from this box than from any other box in Manchester.

To Improve Oakland St.

Surface Water Trouble To Be Remedied in Near Future

As a result of a visit to Manchester yesterday by a representative of the State Highway Department and a conference held by him with General Manager George H. Waddell and Town Engineer James Sheekey the State will make improvements on Oakland Street.

For some time there has been surface water trouble caused by water flowing down Mill street onto Oakland street. During rains a large pool is formed in the vicinity of Edward street. The improvement will consist of the installation of a new 18 inch storm water sewer and manholes to be built at the corner of Mill and Oakland streets to carry water to the brook.

When this is done the road which now has a high crown will be scarified from North Main street to Tolland Turnpike and leveled off.

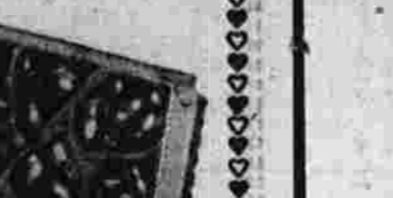

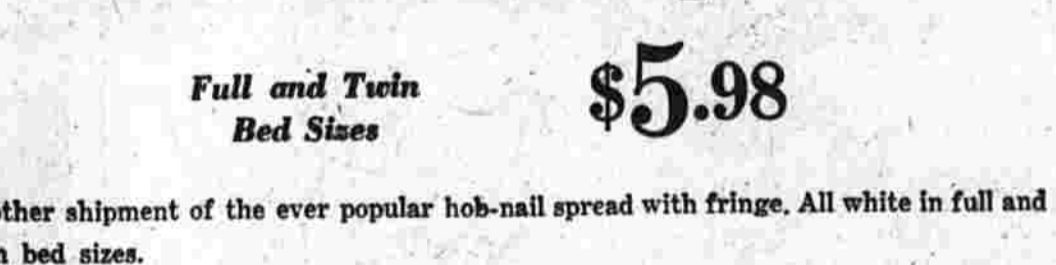
