Electric Rates Increase Asked Conn. Power Co. Petition to Add Fuel Charge to All Bills

The Connecticut Power Company has filed with the Public Utilities Commission an application to include its electric fuel charge on the bills of all electric customers and to increase its rate for gas service and has requested that a hearing on both proposals be held at an early date.

Amount of Increase The Connecticut Power Company's proposed application to include its electric fuel charge on the bills of all electric customers and to increase its rate for gas service and has requested that a hearing on both proposals be held at an early date.

President's Statement In commenting on the Company's application to the Commission, Samuel Ferguson, President of the Company, stated: "Notwithstanding the fact that the electric fuel charge on all gas sales, as it is now proposed, will increase the cost of electricity to the consumer, it is necessary to increase the rate for gas service and to increase the rate for electric service to the consumer."

Rise in Expenses Considering the rise in fuel and payroll expense which we have experienced since 1946, the increase of about 2 per cent in gross revenue that will result from extending the fuel clause application to all electric bills and from the proposed gas rate increase, is relatively small. Camp Edwards, Mass., Aug. 20.—(Special)—Here on the sixth day of the encampment, the guardsmen would scarcely recognize the civilian soldiers of their own unit.

The new men are certainly getting a taste of real Army life. K. F. cleaning details, marches, cleaning up the barracks, and the Army life. It may be a little tough at first, but these boys are having the time of their lives. The work ends about 2:30 every afternoon, then swimming parties are arranged. ### Stench Halts Dredging Job

Westerly, R. I., Aug. 20.—(Special)—U. S. Army engineers have suspended dredging in a section of the Pawcatuck river because of a stench from the operations has offended residents and marred the point on nearby homes.

Residents in the Avondale section reported yesterday that a humid northwesterly breeze wafted offensive odors from riverbed mud dredgers deposited in a swamp.

Palm Marred by Sploches—They said the offensive pain of their homes had become marred by dark brown sploches. Dredging of the three mile channel was begun in mid-July, George Bradford, Boston regional engineer, said the remaining 400-foot undredged section of the proposed channel was about 10 feet deep.

Retired Naval Captain, Nelson W. Picketing, said the blotches were known as "Peruvian paint" by seafaring men whose ships had been similarly discolored by sulphur fumes from oil wells in Tampico, Texas.

He said that when sulphur fumes from the riverbed mud dredgers hit the house paint, it caused a lead sulphate deposit, which eventually will clear up.

Heart Attack Fatal—New Haven, Aug. 20.—(Special)—Raymond Longfield, 36, of Hamden, works manager for the MB Manufacturing company, died of a heart attack here last night. He was a native of Oxford, Md., and held an engineering degree from Cornell University. Surviving are his widow, two daughters, a son, and three sisters. Funeral services will be held here tonight with burial in Oxford.

### Hadden Assails Bowles Choice

Bridgeport, Aug. 20.—(Special)—At a Republican gathering here today, Hadden said, the Democrats "disgraced the wishes of the rank and file of their party, the overwhelming majority of their party, who, if not assailed, rolled and dictated to, would have assured Attorney Thomas J. Dodd as their candidate for governor."

Calling Bowles an "ambitious but frustrated bureaucrat," Hadden said:

"A lot of people are wondering just why it is that the Wallace party of Connecticut, a party that is under the dictatorship of a certain element, has been so willing, in fact, so eager to endorse the Democratic candidate for governor. He meets with the approval of the Communist-dominated Wallace party."

The attorney general, addressing a Republican City convention last night, at which delegates were elected for the G.O.P. State convention next month, predicted that Gov. James C. Shannon would not be nominated for another term, and said "the nomination will not be given to him because he has the financial ability to earn the thousands of dollars required to put on an advertising and selling campaign."

Bowles, reputedly wealthy, was in the advertising business in New York before he entered government service first as OPA administrator in Connecticut and then as national OPA administrator.

Normal for this period at representative stations are as follows: Boston and New Haven, 65; Providence, 70; Nantucket and Burlington, 67; Concord, N. H., 65; Portland, 65; Presque Isle, 62; Greenville, 61; and Eastport, 60.

Moderate amounts of rainfall averaging from three to six-tenths of an inch as a total will occur chiefly as showers late Monday and Monday night.
