Investigator Robert E. Stripling turned to reporters with one more question and an answer: "Who was lying? I don't know." In a formal statement, Hiss called Chambers a "self-confessed liar, spy and traitor" and asked: "Indeed, is he a man of sanity?" To a direct question from Representative William (R-Calif.) Chambers replied: "I have never been treated for mental illness."

Says Hiss Lying
And as Hiss shook his head slightly from side to side, Chambers said: "Mr. Hiss is lying."

He said Hiss told a story that was at least 80 per cent false. Yet his voice broke and tears flooded his eyes when he called Hiss one of his best friends. "I don't hate Mr. Hiss," he said. "We were close friends."

"I have testified against him with remorse and pity, but in the moment of historic jeopardy in which this nation now stands, no help me God, I could not do otherwise."

Just before he stepped down from the witness stand, Representative Mundt (R-SD) got in another question. Mundt asked whether Communist cells still operated within the government. "Unquestionably," Chambers answered. "They are still functioning. They will continue to function until they are rooted out."

Tennessee and his own state of Wyoming.

He credited labor with a vital part in helping Rep. Estes Kefauver, who has been friendly to the Truman administration, win the senatorial nomination away from Senator Tom Stewart.

In Wyoming, O'Monroy said labor's turnout caused the Democrats to register a higher vote to elect their primary than the Republicans.

Bricker said the AFL leaders' decision to back Mr. Truman was expected, adding that it "doesn't mean anything."

"These leaders aren't going to be able to control their members," he said. "They are going to be able to control the party for the use of their own ends."

Harrison didn't say which AFL union president might walk out, falling in line for the Truman-Barker ticket.

Yokes in Disagreement
But Dan Tobin of the powerful Teamsters union let it be known he would never support Dewey, a statement by Green that the AFL would never support Dewey. Tobin's union supported the late President Roosevelt in 1944.

The report this year was Dewey's candidacy at a tea-stern dinner in Washington that year that led the New York governor to make of the views in what previously had been a Democratic stronghold.

sions" to Tito and the majority of the Yugoslav people.

It was the latest episode in the contact between Tito and the anti-Communist Romanians (Communist International Information Bureau). This situation organization split with Tito and his lieutenant in July, charging them with a hateful policy toward Soviet Russia and with deviating from the Marx-Lenin philosophy.

Has Sided With Communists
Romania has sided with the Communists, in which Mrs. Faulker is a leading spirit.

The note said state officials and the press and radio of Romania "have of recent months been attempting to depict Yugoslavia as being a country which has supposedly separated from the anti-imperialist front."

It added that Yugoslavia has been pictured as a nation "supposedly degenerating into a bourgeois state, in which there allegedly is no democratic order, in which anti-Soviet propaganda is being conducted."

The note said these statements "are being corroborated by such disreputable methods of spreading untruths, as for example, the allegation in the paper Romania's secretary of state, Mr. Marshall."

Tanjing noted the note, saying that all this adds up to a campaign against Yugoslavia and her people which contradicts the Yugoslav-Romanian treaty of friendship, cooperation and mutual aid.

Hartford Unit Not Affected

Hearings Proceeding as Usual at Immigration Service Office

Hartford, Aug. 26.—(P)—Hearings at the Hartford office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service have been little affected by the ruling that such hearings were illegal under the administrative procedures act of 1946, it was learned today.

A spokesman at the local immigration office said today that hearings were proceeding as usual. He added that no counsel had questioned the legality of the hearings since the adverse ruling handed down May 3 by Federal Judge T. Alan Goldberg at Washington.

Reports from the nation's capital, however, indicated that the long-pending campaign of the Immigration and Naturalization Service to expel people from the country on grounds of Communist infiltration and that it looks like the confusion may continue for a long time.

When Judge Goldberg ruled that hearings probed over by immigration inspectors were illegal he ordered it not to go on any further in departing Gerhard Eisler and four other alleged Communist until it had changed its methods and started over.

This is the same Judge Goldberg who fined John R. Lewis and later upheld Lewis' pension fight for miners.

Repealing Jobs Officials
His ruling in the deportation case jolted immigration officials.

French Assembly Delays Elections

Paris, Aug. 26.—(P)—The National Assembly postponed today local French Council elections scheduled for October. The action was considered a tactical setback for Gen. Charles de Gaulle's Rally of the French People (RFP).

The RFP leaders had hoped to precipitate a national election by winning sweeping victories in the October balloting to choose departmental general councils. The councils are roughly similar to county commissions or boards of supervisors in the United States.

The Assembly, however, quashed this hope by voting 266 to 166 to delay the elections indefinitely pending a reorganization of the departmental system. A government spokesman promised the reorganization would be accomplished at the time for elections in May.

De Gaulle's party polled 40 per cent of the vote in municipal elections last year, but that was the first in which it participated and so has no representation, as such, in the Assembly.

Disease Hits State's Maples
New Haven, Aug. 26.—(P)—The Connecticut Agricultural Experiment station here reports that maple dieback, believed to derive from a fungus, is causing damage to thousands of Norway, sugar and red maple trees in this state. The disease is usually confined to the small limbs on the lower half of older trees, and station experts recommend pruning as a means of control.

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New Haven's Record Best

Highway Safety Commission Issues Report For First Half Year

Hartford, Aug. 26.—(P)—The Highway Safety Commission, reporting today to the National Safety Council, said New Haven has the best record of the larger Connecticut cities for the first six months.

The Elm City is second only to Wichita, Kans., in the 100,000 to 200,000 population group. Two traffic fatalities were charged against the city for the first half year as compared with five for the same period last year. The death rate, based on population in one, Hartford ranks ninth and Bridgeport 13 in the same population group. Although Hartford has established a record for traffic fatalities—four days, four traffic deaths were charged against the city during the first two months of the year. Scranton Plan Seen Success

Scranton, Pa., Aug. 26.—Two years ago this mine scarred city wallowed in a mire of declining business, population and faith in the future. Today, because its citizens refused to let the ghosts take over, Scranton has boosted its population and owns 11 new industrial plants, each of them either leased or spoken for by new industries. The buildings were built with bonds bought by box-makers, miners, janitors, bankers, newsmen and the other 104,000-odd citizens big and small. And the industries the new plants have attracted have helped to swell the population of Scranton and surrounding Lackawanna county to 300,100, making the figure well over the 300,000 mark for the first time since pre-war days. Scranton fell into evil days when anthracite, king of Lackawanna valley, tumbled from his throne. World War II didn't improve conditions. More than 50,000 residents left Lackawanna county before the war ended. But let Willis W. Jones, general secretary of the Scranton Chamber of Commerce tell the story: "In March, 1946, a small group of businessmen got together to talk about an economic blood transfusion for Scranton. Out of that and subsequent meetings were born 'Scranton Plan, Inc.' and 'The Scranton Lackawanna Industrial Building Co.' The plan called for a \$2,000,000 defense plant from the government for less than half the price. The plant, under the leadership of America to turn out B-29 wings during the war, is now headquarters for the new plan and Murray, with a five-year lease, is producing stoves, kitchen cabinets and sinks. One of the Scranton-Lackawanna Industrial Building Co. bonds, also four per cent, came the money to build new plants. All but three of the buildings have been completed and occupied. But the other three under construction either have been spoken for or are getting the once-over from out-of-town industries. Into Scranton with new payrolls have rolled the W. L. Stop-Gap Plan Becomes Law

White Expects Flood Of New Applications For State Guarantee

Hartford, Aug. 26.—Gov. Shuman's stop-gap housing program promising 4,000 new rental units in the state became law today.

Gov. Shuman, state housing administrator, now expects a flood of new applications from towns and cities for local projects whose bonds the state is guaranteeing.

The \$10,000,000 state guarantee under which 1,231 units are now being built or planned has been boosted by \$30,000,000. The new amount can provide about 3,000 more dwelling units at an average cost of \$10,000 per four-room unit.

Signs All Six Bills
Governor Shuman signed all six bills rammed through both houses

of the legislature which adjourned at 7 p. m. Wednesday, after seven hours of partisan wrangling. Top-heavy Republican majorities voted down a too costly and unfeasible a seven-year, subsidy plan of Charles E. Bowles, Democratic candidate for governor. It promised 50,000 new units in seven years, 14,000 of them by means of state subsidies.

Seen "Changing Program"
The governor at a press conference, described the housing situation as a "changing program" that might present entirely different problems which the 1949 General Assembly convenes for its regular session.

"The situation then may require an entirely different approach. We will meet each situation as it arises," continued the chief executive. "I am not opposed to any assistance that may be necessary to conduct my study of the housing situation as long as it exists and will base my future action on this study and such surveys as it may require."

The largest houses in the southern United States may reach four feet or more in length.

Col. Robert P. Taylor, deputy staff chaplain, headquarters, Air Materiel command, Wright-Patterson Air Force base, Dayton, O.

Bowles Denies Party Change

"It is a crime to be a Republican," the former national OPA chief rejoined.

"Have you ever been a Republican?" the reporter persisted.

"My father was a Republican," Bowles replied.

"The question was repeated, and Democratic candidate then said: "To my knowledge I have never been a Republican."

"Have you ever been registered as a Republican?" the reporter asked.

"I have no comment," said Bowles.

Later, the Democratic nominee issued a statement in which he said: "In the 1930s I was active in business and took no part what ever in politics. I do not know what the Old Saybrook caucus list says, but I do know that I voted four times for Roosevelt, that I attended the National Democratic convention in 1940 as an alternate delegate and that I was a Democratic presidential elector in that year."

"I confess that I am disturbed that the Republican party is now trying to claim me. I thought I had made it clear by this that there are certain important disagreements between us."

Maynard discussed Bowles' party affiliations during a debate before the General Assembly on his special session on housing yesterday.

He said the names of Bowles and his wife remained on the Republican caucus list in Old Saybrook through 1950. The following year, Mr. and Mrs. Bowles moved to Essex where they registered as Democrats, Maynard said.

Manchester is to have another industry. This was revealed this morning by the filing of a deed from Max Furman, principal owner of the Ace Woolen Company to Morris Fazzani of East Hartford. Fazzani is the owner of the Old Colony Furniture Company of East Hartford and the Old Colony Furniture Manufacturing Company of Glastonbury. The sale price is given as \$125,000.

One of the largest real estate transactions in Manchester in many years. By the conditions of the deed \$25,000 was paid in cash yesterday. An additional \$100,000 in cash is to be paid on December 29, 1949. The balance is to be paid at \$20,000 for the first two years in equal monthly installments. Grandson of FDR Paralysis Victim

Los Angeles, Aug. 26.—(P)—The late President Roosevelt's grandson, Curtis (Buzzy) Boettiger, is in a hospital suffering from poliomyelitis.

The 18-year-old son of Mrs. Anna Roosevelt Dall Boettiger by her first husband, Curtis Dall, was stricken last night and taken to the county hospital's communicable disease ward in West Hollywood. He was to be transferred today with 100 other poliomyelitis patients to the Naval hospital at Coronado.

The lady's physician said his condition is "not serious but definitely a mild case of polio."

Buzzy's grandfather was stricken with polio in the 1920s and although he recovered, was crippled and walked with a cane. In his latter years Mr. Roosevelt frequently used an invalid's chair.

Tanker Rescues Drifting Couple

New York, Aug. 26.—(P)—Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin P. Carlin, who started around the world in a converted Army amphibious truck, have been picked up by a tanker and are drifting in the Atlantic for ten days.

The couple now is bound for Halifax, Nova Scotia, on the tanker New Jersey instead of for the Azores, their first planned stop. The tanker rescued the Coast Guard last night that had picked up the seafarers 270 miles from New York. There was no mention of what was done with their craft.

The last previous word of the Carlins was on Aug. 11, shortly after they sailed from here. At that time a Navy destroyer sighted their craft about 150 miles at sea.

Army Will Give Special Course

Hartford, Aug. 26.—(P)—Army officers of the National Guard and the organized Reserve with rank sufficient for command or staff points will have the opportunity to attend a special course for two weeks this fall at Fort Banks, Wintrop, Mass.

The school will be the first of its type in the First Army area and will give a special command and general staff college course. Qualifying officers must have held seven years commission and be under 35 years of age. Aside from other qualifications for holding high command positions, the course will meet again in the summer of 1950, following which diploma will be awarded.

Captured Russians Willing to Be Spies

Nuernberg, Germany, Aug. 26.—(P)—Before the Stalingrad campaign, captured Russians were urged to work for the Germans as spies against their own people, an American war crimes court was told today.

After the debacle of Gen. Friedrich von Paulus' Sixth German Army, the turning point in the eastern war, the Soviet government changed their attitude and stubbornly refused such assignments, the court was told.

This was brought out in a trial brief submitted by Alexander G. Hardy, against Walter Schellenberg, former commandant of Gestapo Chieftain Heinrich Himmler.

Schellenberg, on trial for war crimes, was the instigator of "Operation Zepplin" in which the Russians were trained to act for the German spy corps.

The operation entered into Schellenberg's trial because of what happened to some of the Soviet spies. The prosecution introduced evidence to show that the Russians, after their missions were accomplished, were taken to Auschwitz and killed.

Naval Reservists Now Top Million

Washington, Aug. 26.—(P)—For the first time in its peacetime history the Navy has more than 1,000,000 Reservists signed up.

With a 1949 goal of 1,170,000, the Navy announced today its latest official count showed 1,020,000, all most one-third of them officers.

Only members of the Organized Reserve who enrolled before the war are eligible for draft exemption. Most of the Navy's million-plus are enrolled in the Volunteer Reserve which does not hold wealthy titles and is not exempt from compulsory military service.

Ailing Captain Rushed Ashore

Vineyard Haven, Mass., Aug. 26.—(P)—Taken ill at sea, Capt. Raymond Titus, of Stonington, Conn., was rushed ashore to the Marine hospital today by the Coast Guard.

A picked boat from the Gay Head station took Titus, Edgartown, and landed him at Oak Bluffs for transfer to the hospital. Hospital officials said Titus' illness had not yet been diagnosed, adding that he was under observation.
