State Limp From Heat

Faces 'At Least 24 Hours More' of Hot Humid Weather.

Connecticut, limp after 48 hours of unremitting record heat which brought death to at least five persons, today faced "at least 24 hours more" of hot humid weather.

Cooler weather was forecast for Saturday and the rest of the week-end. Yesterday, as the official temperature soared to 100 degrees and the unofficial readings stood at 110 degrees and more, three persons were drowned and two died of heat stroke.

Six Others Hospitalized

At least six others were hospitalized in Waterbury, New Haven and Hartford as heat victims.

At Trumbull, Mrs. Margaret Budwinski, 27, and her 18-month-old daughter, Karen, drowned in a sandpit pond where they had gone to escape the heat.

The child's body was found floating on the surface of the pond. Her mother's body was recovered by Richard Blauvelt, 20, of Monroe, by diving for it.

Philip Grace, 11, drowned while swimming in the Chamber of Commerce pool, at Wallingford.

Mrs. John Costello, 68, died at Waterbury hospital an hour after she had collapsed from the heat in her home in that city.

Does on Site

In New Haven, Biagio Valente, 80, collapsed and died on a street, and Medical Examiner Marvin M. Scarborough said death was the result of heat prostration.

Manufacturing plants, offices and business houses in all communities closed at least part of the day yesterday to permit their workers to escape the heat.

At New Haven the official temperature was 97 degrees; at Meriden it was 100 degrees. At Waterbury, the Republican-American reported a thermometer atop its building registered 104 degrees, while at Satan's Kingdom in New Hartford the mercury rose to 112 degrees.

In the sun at New Haven the temperatures were highest with 110 degrees being recorded at Tomlinson bridge which carries U. S. Route No. 1 across the estuary of the Quinnipiac and Mill rivers.

Unable to Close Bridge

Here the heat was so intense that firemen were called to cool off the bridge so it could be closed. The heat had so expanded the steel structure that operators were unable to permit the passage of a boat, it could not be closed.

In Bridgeport temperatures ranged from 94 to 112, and the Sirocco division of United Aircraft in nearby Stratford released its 4,000 workers at 2:30 p. m. Late afternoon and night shifts in many plants were cancelled.

In the Hartford area some 30,000 workers were released when the temperature reached 99 degrees, and Gov. James C. Shannon ordered the State Capitol closed at 3 p. m.

The governor said that if the heat wave continues, the state offices will be closed at noon today for the week-end.

Sanford Appointed Alumni Secretary

New Haven, Aug. 27 (AP)—Charles Hamilton Sanford, Jr., of Syracuse, N. Y., has been appointed executive secretary of the Yale Alumni board, according to an announcement issued jointly today by President Charles Seymour and Clifford R. Beard, chairman of the Alumni board.

Sanford has long been active in Yale Alumni affairs. He prepared for Yale at Phillips academy at Andover. During the day there he was president of the Yale club of Central New York and has been a member of the Yale Alumni board for the past ten years.

During the war, Sanford spent three years in the U. S. Army with headquarters European theater of operations and held the rank of major. For his work he received the bronze star and the French reconnaissance medal.

Sanford succeeds Russell L. Bradley who is now affiliated with the National Conference of Christians and Jews in Geneva, Switzerland.

Rockville, Aug. 27 (Special)—Gunnar Peterson, executive secretary of the Tolland County Y. M. C. A. and director of Camp Woodstock for the past two years, has resigned his position. He will leave in September for Syracuse, N. Y., where he will teach a camping course and outing program at the University of Syracuse.

Polio Epidemic Seen Declining

Raleigh, N. C. (AP)—Health authorities believe the state's worst polio epidemic is declining but caution still was the watchword today as school openings were postponed and other public events cancelled.

There have been 1,721 cases reported this year—35 short of doubling the state's most severe previous epidemic. Fatalities have reached 87.

Paul Reid, school controller of the state Board of Education, said school openings are being postponed generally in most parts of the state. In the northeastern section, where few cases have been reported, the schools will open as usual.

The annual Debutante ball, scheduled for Raleigh Sept. 10-11 was postponed until Dec. 29-30. This year, 135 North Carolina girls were participating in the mass coming-out party.

Holbrook Gets Utilities Post

House Speaker in 1947 General Assembly Appointed by Shannon

Hartford, Aug. 27 (AP)—Frederick H. Holbrook, House Speaker in the 1947 General Assembly, has been appointed to the State Public Utilities Commission.

Holbrook's appointment was announced yesterday by Governor James C. Shannon. The governor said he had decided several weeks ago to give the appointment to the Madison representative but held off the announcement so that Holbrook could preside at the

pointment in effective until the end of the next General Assembly next June. It was expected that the Assembly will confirm him to serve out Sharpe's original term ending July 1, 1950.

Holbrook was appointed state foods and drugs commissioner at the close of the General Assembly's 1947 session, a post paying \$7,000 a year. He will resign that office immediately in order to accept the Public Utilities commission which pays \$9,000 annually. Holbrook has served in the Legislature for many years and is also a veteran New Haven County commissioner. He operates a store in Madison.

Press Search For Murderer

Brooks Wanted on Shooting Charge in His Partner's Home

Princeton, N. J., Aug. 27—(AP)—Police today intensified their search for New York financier Henry Martin Brooks, 61, wanted on a murder charge in the shooting of his business partner, Joseph H. Laxton.

"Two other suspects" also were being checked by the Mercer county prosecutor's office in an effort to find the person who fired two fatal bullets at Watkins as he sat in a car parked in the driveway of the fashionable Princeton home, Wednesday night.

The search centered near Greenwich, Conn., where Brooks occupied a large home on a 12-acre estate on North street, and at Reading, Pa., where he was frequent visitor.

Brooks' daughter questioned their father about a Maine vacation when he heard of the murder charge against Brooks, she said.

They were questioned last night by Greenwich Police Chief John M. Gleason soon after they reached their home.

Brooks "kept most of his business to himself," the chief commented.

Greenwich police had a warrant for the arrest of Brooks should he return home.

\$50,000 Attachment Filed
Meanwhile, a \$50,000 attachment was filed with the town clerk against Mrs. Brooks by members of the New York firm of Carreau and Company, Wall street, claiming that she had returned Oct. 15, gave no cause of action.

Merger County Prosecutor Mario H. Volpe said Watkins, 54, a lawyer and investment banker, had obtained a \$72,000 judgment against Brooks on the grounds that he had made good losses incurred in several joint ventures. Brooks had made unsuccessful efforts to have the judgment set aside, Volpe said.

Murder Charge Filled
The prosecutor filed a murder charge against Brooks yesterday, explaining that he had been indicted at the murder scene.

Brooks' family and under investigation by the attorney general's office in New York state, Volpe added.

Members of the New York attorney general's staff yesterday

setled all records of the X-Pando Corp., of which Brooks was president and Watkins an officer. They also subpoenaed John and William Mason, assistant manager and secretary of the firm.

Assistant Attorney General John Trubian said he took the firm's records in connection with an investigation of securities activities being conducted by the attorney general's office. He declined to give details.

Trubian said Brooks last winter was called for questioning in an investigation into an attempt by a group known as 625 Associates to purchase a controlling interest in the Pullman-Bainbridge Corp. of Pittsburgh for a reported \$9,100,000. Brooks was president of 625 Associates, Trubian said.

Brooks, described by police as a heavy set with a small mustache, was reported driving a 1946 Lincoln Zephyr bearing 1948 Connecticut license tags "HMB."

Watkins' family said they were making plans for a family vacation home town of Winona, Minn., at an unannounced date. The slain man was a member of the family which owned the Watkins Pharmaceutical Co. in that city.

Chicago, Aug. 27—(AP)—The 1948 housing act, says the American Federation of Labor's Executive Council, is inadequate for the average worker and his family or the average veteran and his family.

The council, holding its quarterly meeting here this week, said yesterday the housing act contains a number of provisions to private builders and home-owners.

"The housing program may lead to additional housing for families in the upper and middle income brackets," the council said.

The council said it "particularly condemns the refusal" of the House rules committee "to permit the House of Representatives to vote on the effective Wagner-Ellender-Keating bill which has been adopted by the Senate."

Trinity Lists Special Course

Training in Administration and Military Management Offered

Hartford, Aug. 27—Specialized training in Administration and Military Management will be given to Trinity College undergraduates who enroll in the new Air Force Reserve Officers Training Program, it was announced today by President G. Keith Funston.

The specialized program was selected from among seven Air Force ROTC programs to participate with Trinity's traditional liberal arts curriculum. More than 100 freshmen and about 35 upperclassmen are expected to enroll for the program when college opens September 20.

Draft deferments will be given to the freshmen standing highest on an examination to be given next January. No quota of deferments for Trinity has yet been received. Upperclassmen are veterans of World War II who will be seeking Air Force commissions.

They are exempted from underclass military duties.

All Trinity students who can pass the Army "93" physical examination are eligible to enroll in the military course which leads to officer's commissions at the end of a four-year part-time training program. The college is appointing three Air Force officers to the faculty to teach military subjects.

Establishment of the Air Force unit completes an unusual record for Trinity in having served all three branches of the Department of Defense. An Army training unit was located at Trinity in World War I and a Naval V-12 unit during World War II.

The ROTC program will be one of 34 similar units in the First Air Force with a total quota-enrollment of 2,889 students.

Critically Burned in Blast
Madison, Aug. 27—(AP)—Mrs. Roger Vergnes, 27, of New York city, was critically burned yesterday when a gas hot water heater exploded in her summer home here.

The blast shattered a window in her home, and the flying glass narrowly missed her small baby who was in a play pen outside. Mrs. Vergnes was taken to New Haven hospital where attendants said her name was on the danger list.
