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Expect Hurricane. To Miss Mainland If Course Steady

Weather Bureau Says Strong Winds Will Be Felt Along Coast Tonight; Wind Velocity At Hatteras, N. C., Increases to 30 Miles

Hatteras, N. C., Aug. 31.—(P)—A tropical hurricane moving up the Atlantic coast will miss the mainland entirely if it keeps its present course, the U. S. Weather Bureau said today. The bureau warned, however, that strong winds would be felt along the coast tonight.

Wind velocity here increased to 30 miles an hour at mid-morning. The forecast for Maryland and Delaware called for strong north-east winds late this afternoon and tonight, and fresh northeast winds along the New Jersey coast tonight.

Grady Norton, chief forecaster for the Federal Service, said conditions were favorable for the storm to continue its northeast path and remain at sea.

"I feel reasonably sure it will remain offshore as it passes up the seaboard along the Middle and North Atlantic states," he said. He added that a strong high pressure area moving across the Great Lakes region would help keep the storm at sea.

East Southeast of Hatteras. A weather bureau advisory placed the hurricane at 10 a.m. 110 miles east southeast of Cape Hatteras, moving north-northeastward about 12 miles an hour and apparently accelerating in forward movement.

The advisory added "its intensity remains unchanged with strong winds around 100 miles per hour at center. Gale force an area nearly 200 miles in diameter. Ships were advised to direct their course to the north and west, avoiding the lowering of all storm warnings south of Cape Hatteras."

Meanwhile, the Naval base at Norfolk, Va., said about 50 ships of all descriptions had put to sea or sought safety in Chesapeake Bay. The vessels included the battleship Missouri and the cruiser

Pickets Jeer At Workers Stand Aside as 400 Enter Strikebound Indiana Plant Today

Evansville, Ind., Aug. 31.—(P)—Pickets jeered but stood aside as 400 workers entered the strikebound Bucyrus-Erie plant here today. Close by were 140 National States troops, heavily armed and ready to quell any disturbance.

Plant officials said they expected more workers to report during the day. It normally has about 1,600 workers engaged in the manufacture of road and construction machinery.

National Guard Alerted In addition to the state troops on duty, several National Guard units had been alerted to stand by. The strike began last July 26 after the company refused to deal with the union on the grounds it was "Communist-dominated." Last week the company obtained a restraining order against mass picketing and announced it would re-open the plant today.

Foremen attempted to enter the factory Saturday to prepare for the re-opening. They were resisted by pickets and a near riot ensued in which several persons were injured. Disorderly conduct charges were filed against 27 pickets.

Col. Robert Rosow, state police superintendent, and Charles Kern, state labor commissioner, were here to survey the situation. They were summoned to the scene by telephone observers to watch units alerted after the conference.

Outlook "Not Good" Colonel Rosow described the outlook for peaceable opening of the plant as "not too good."

The restraining order against mass picketing was issued by Circuit Judge Nat H. Youst. Both he and Sheriff Bart Munn were present at state night in keeping with order after Saturday's local union president appealed to Governor Albert J. Eberhardt, state labor commissioner, to send state police here. His message said: "The company on Saturday organized its foremen into zoon squads led by professional thugs"

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Military Governors In Germany Confer On Berlin Problems

FCC Decision Seen Control Of Thoughts Spokesman for Nation's Broadcasters Criticizes Ruling Involving Atheistic Programs

Washington, Aug. 31.—(P)—A spokesman for the nation's broadcasters told a congressional committee today a recent FCC decision in a case involving atheistic programs constituted "thought police."

The witness was Don Petty, general counsel for the National Association of Broadcasters. He testified before a special House committee investigating the Federal Communications Commission decision.

Called Unconstitutional The FCC ruling which Petty criticized as unconstitutional was issued in 1946 at the request of Robert Harold Head of Palo Alto, Calif. Scott had demanded that licenses of several radio stations be revoked because they refused to grant him time to argue against the existence of God.

The FCC ruled that the stations had no right to refuse to grant time to atheist speakers. Petty said the decision amounted to "government control" of religious broadcasting.

He argued that the decision violated the first amendment to the constitution which guarantees free speech and the right of religious freedom. He said the decision amounted to "government control" of religious broadcasting.

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46 Arrested During Drive

Drug Better Than Cocaine

Discovery of New Pain Killer Reported to Chemical Society
Washington, Aug. 31.—(P)—Discovery of a new pain-killing drug many times more potent than cocaine was reported today to the American Chemical Society.

The society's 114th national meeting also brought word of the other still-experimental material:

1. A group of drugs which have produced temporary relief from high blood pressure in animals.

2. Another group of substances which have shown evidence of being able to combat blood clots in animals.

Described by Four Chemists
The pain-killing drug was described by four chemists of the Smith, Kline & French laboratories in Philadelphia.

It has the jaw-breaking name of 1,18-dimethylamino-ethoxy-4-(2-ethyl-5-hydroxyphenyl)-piperazine.

The chemists said it's so strong that in dilution as low as one-hundredth of one per cent, it produced local anesthesia in rabbits for cocaine and two minutes for procaine.

Development of the anti-high blood pressure compound was described by a group of chemists of the Wellman Laboratories, Tucker, N. Y., and the Wellman, Winthrop Research Institute, Resenseler, N. Y., and the Eli Lilly and Company, Kokonago, Ind.

Discovered by Accident
They said the drug—called "depressor"—was discovered by accident. They appeared as "impurities" on an X-ray film of a compound which had been prepared for routine testing.

The chemists said the compound was prepared in concentrated form, consist of two kinds of molecules.

Manchester Will Not Hit State

All New England to Escape If Present Course Continues
Hartford, Aug. 31.—(P)—Connecticut and New England—will not be hit by the hurricane roaring from south of Cape Hatteras, N. C., if the storm continues on its indicated course, the Hartford Weather bureau said today.

The storm, the Weather bureau said, was continuing to turn slowly to the north-northeast and indications were that it would pass out to sea tonight or early Wednesday.

Moderate northeast winds will be felt at Block Island early tonight, and probably will "freshen" during the night, the bureau said.

The storm was traveling at 8 to 10 miles an hour with winds of 15 to 20 miles velocity in a 50 to 60 mile radius of its center, the bureau reported.

From Boston, a report said that present low temperatures and low humidity made it "unlikely" that the storm would strike this area.

"Moderate" Sea Reported
Coast Guard headquarters at New London reported a "moderate" sea, and said that no small craft warnings had yet been hoisted.

They saw no danger if the present indicated course of the storm continued.

Planes of the Connecticut Air National Guard at Bradley field were released for flying today, but no evacuation plan was ready should the hurricane threaten this area.

Headquarters at Bradley field reported late this morning that if evacuation is necessary, fighter craft would be flown to Rome, N. Y., and bombers, transports and trainers would be flown to Elmira, N. Y.

Officials at New London Submarine Base said routine precautions were being taken and all leaves had been cancelled.

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Trinity Offers Teachers' Course

Hartford, Aug. 31.—Trinity College will offer four evening courses to prepare college graduates for certification as teachers in Connecticut. It was announced today by President G. Keith Funston.

The courses will begin September 20 in Trinity's evening extension program which offers both graduate and undergraduate courses for the benefit of Hartford area residents.

The education courses are history and philosophy of education, educational tests and measurements, educational and vocational guidance, and educational psychology. Registration for the courses now open.

Applicants should plan, declaring their intent to be a teacher.

Dr. Wallace Still, director of extension, said that the courses are designed to meet the needs of the area.

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Barbers in State Show Decrease

In 1938 there were 3,721 barbers and 2,064 shops.

Deaths of Fish Blamed on Heat

Milford, Aug. 31.—(P)—The strange deaths of thousands of fish which rushed ashore and gaped out their lives at Woodmont beach Sunday was blamed today by a government scientist.

Dr. Victor Loosanoff, head of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service laboratory here, said objects of war, ter samples indicated the fish "suffocated" from lack of oxygen in the sun-heated water.

Beach residents scooped up the fish by the bucketful when the invasion was in its height Sunday.

Dr. Loosanoff said, however, that he was advising against the eating of the fish since many of them were found to be in a "partially decomposed state."

Chicago, Aug. 31.—(P)—The nation's traffic deaths for the first seven months this year totaled 16,390, four per cent below the 17,073 for the similar period in 1947, the National Safety council said today.

There were 2,700 traffic fatalities in July, the council said, as compared to 2,780 in July, 1947, a drop of three per cent.

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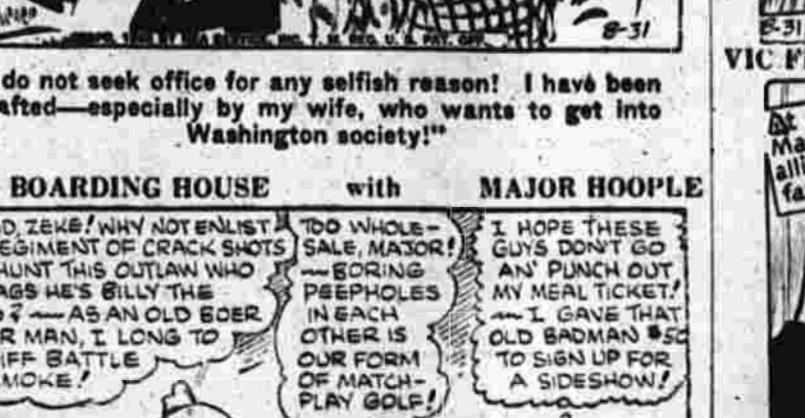
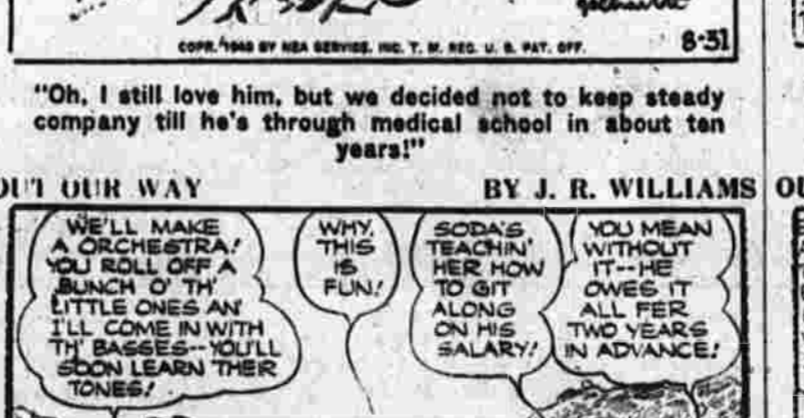
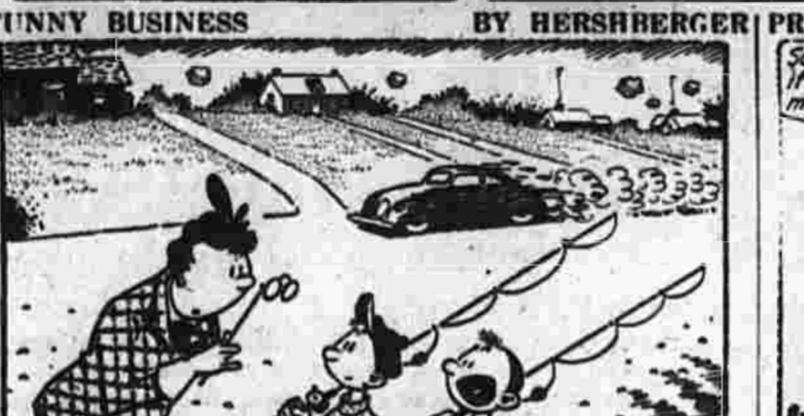

Women Get Top Rating For Credit

Survey by Federal Reserve Board Indicates Females Are Better Risks Than Men

Washington, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Women are better credit risks than men, a survey by the Federal Reserve board indicated today.

Men's clothing stores wrote off a "bad debt" of 66 cents out of each \$100 worth of credit last year, the survey showed. A reporter they don't know why this Reserve board office told a credit manager of some Washington stores brought these figures:

1. When men buy clothes on credit, they usually do so because they actually need them to pay. On the other hand, many husbands don't give their wives a lot of cash to carry around, preferring for them to buy clothes when the family budget allows a cash payment.
