Vittner Fined \$25 in Court

15 Day Sentence Suspended and Placed on Six Months' Probation

In Town Court this morning, arraigned on a breach of the peace count before Judge Raymond R. Bowers, the accused Frank Vittner of 20 North Street told the story of his most recent run-in with Mrs. Bonnie West of 222 St. James street, who had complained of the attentions paid her by Vittner. He was found guilty after a lengthy hearing and received a \$25 fine, a suspended jail sentence of 15 days and was placed on probation for six months.

The case had been continued from Monday's court session, and Vittner pleaded not guilty to the charge.

According to the story of the events leading to the arrest of Vittner as related by Prosecutor Raymond A. Johnson, the accused, after previous warning, went to Mrs. West's home early last Sunday morning and created a commotion which led to his apprehension later. Vittner had been in court last week on a similar complaint, but at that time the case was not called.

Close Margin For Schuman

French Premier Given Green Light to Go Ahead on New Cabinet

Paris, Sept. 1.—Premier Robert Schuman began forming a new French cabinet today. He got the green light last night from the National Assembly, but by a margin of only 11 votes.

The Assembly confirmed Schuman last night by a vote of 372 to 183, the weakest support yet accorded a French premier. He needed 311 votes for confirmation, but the margin of support was virtually the same in the National Assembly. Premier Andre Marie fell last Saturday.

The 181 Fall To Vote One hundred and one deputies either abstained from voting or walked out of the chamber rather than go on record. The bulk of the opposition vote came from the Communists, who hate Schuman. He broke up the wave of Communist-inspired strikes that almost wrecked France last year.

He boldly informed the deputies that he would resign if he became premier. He would propose a 100 percent increase in the price of bread, milk and tax boots sufficient to raise \$25,000,000 to meet a budget deficit. He advocated lower prices for meat and wine and certain tax adjustments.

Schuman's assembly support was not as strong as his own popularity. Radical Socialists, Independents and Socialists, he said, he was backed by the balance of power. It was the Socialists who knocked him out of the job 45 days ago in a dispute over the military budget.

Their decision to support Schuman was all that kept the "third force" of France in power. They dropped again from the center coalition, there are many who will favor a dissolution of Parliament and new elections. That is exactly what Gen. Charles de Gaulle and

Bulgarians Hit By Yugoslavia

Accused of Having Territorial Designs on Macedonia Province

London, Sept. 1.—Bulgaria today began the fourth Communist drive to draw critical fire from Yugoslavia.

Tanjing, the official Yugoslav news agency, said in a statement last night of having territorial designs on the southern Yugoslav province of Macedonia. It accused the Bulgarian Press department of giving rise to "speculations of the present leaders of Bulgaria toward Macedonia."

Beard, who had made a study of city planning, financing and counting in New York, went to Tokyo in 1923, after a disastrous earthquake. To act as an adviser to President Geto, Japanese minister of home affairs.

He belonged to a number of learned societies, and at various times served as president of the American Historical Association, the American Political Science Association and the National Association for Adult Education.

Besides his widow, Beard is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Miriam Vagta, of Sherman, and a son, William, of Atlanta, who will be private at the convenience of the family.

Glass Making Address Topic
Rotary Club Members Hear Interesting Talk At Their Meeting
Henry Griffin, installation and operating officer for the Hartford Empire Glass company, was the Rotary club speaker last night. Griffin showed a motion picture entitled "Sand and Flame". Due to a mix-up in speaking dates, it was announced in Monday night's Herald that George Bagley of Catskill, N. Y., would appear last night. Bagley will probably appear at some future date.

"Sand and Flame" illustrated to the Rotarians many phases of the art of glass making. A sound commentary explained the interesting processes shown in the film. The art of glass blowing and the process of bottle-making were among the many operations shown. A surprising number of large and complicated machines are necessary to produce the common glass bottle. One of the most interesting processes shown in the film was that

of making safety glass. First, large sheets of ordinary plate glass are cut into small, easily handled sections, such as those used in automobiles. A piece of material resembling cloth is then cut into same size sections and sandwiched between two pieces of the plate glass. At this stage of the process, the glass is not transparent. The glass section is then lowered into a hot oil compound and subjected to great pressure, causing a complete chemical change in the cloth-like material inserted between the plate glass. When the glass section is removed from the oil it is transparent and the two pieces of plate glass have been transformed into one piece of safety glass. A few finishing processes, such as sealing the edges of the glass section, are necessary before the glass is ready for use in an automobile.

The worth of the glass is tested by dropping a steel ball on the surface of the glass from a specified height. The safety glass breaks when the ball hits it, but the glass does not splinter into flying pieces that are so dangerous. The glass cracks but the splinters tend to remain within the frame of the glass and reduce the chances of injury caused by flying glass. More than 172,000 forest fires occur annually.

300 Arrested After Checks
More Than Thousand Reports of Defective Equipment on Trucks
Hartford, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Ten-day-long road checks of trucks in Connecticut since last April resulted in more than 300 arrests and more than a thousand reports of defective equipment. It was announced here today. The results were made known in reports from the Interstate Commerce commission, the Public Utilities commission and the state police to the Highway Safety commission.

Practically all arrests were made for failure to comply with Public Utilities commission regulations and a majority of those arrested were out-of-state "gyppy" operators. It was stated. Such trucks operate independently and sometimes take sub-contract work from larger fleet operators. The Highway Safety commission explained. A majority of the arrests were for operating without a PIC license plate and for failure to file certificate of insurance with the commission. It was said.

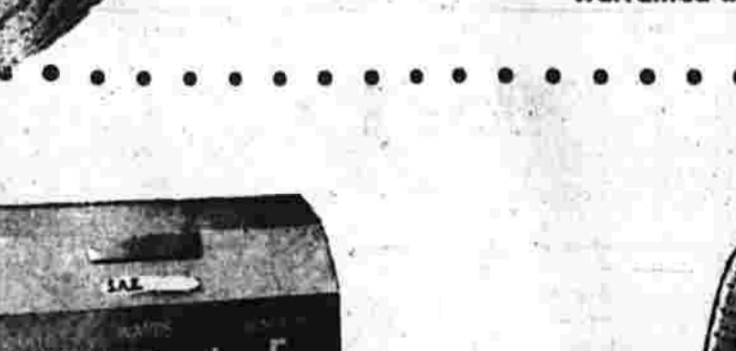

Local Resident Invents Safety Razor With A Light

Anyone who has ever had trouble getting a clean shave should read every word of this article because it concerns a Manchester man who had the same trouble—and decided to do something about it. Walden St. John of 38 Maple Street often noticed in a post-shaveing mirror-check that a few stubborn hairs escaped his razor. He thought, design a razor with a built in light! Then even the smallest hairs could be seen before it could duck in the shadow of a nose or ear.

Simple in Construction The razor itself is remarkably simple in construction. Made of aluminum, it has an overall length of six inches with a 2 1/2 inch handle. The shaving head is a standard size and takes a regular double-edge blade. It has an anodizing and coloring process. The finished product is colored gold.

The light is provided by two standard pencil cells, 1.5 and 1.5, and slide into the handle. The bulb is located in an opening just below the shaving head. Two shaped openings on each side of the handle allow the light to project a fan-shaped area of light on the skin being shaved. The light, explains St. John, eliminates any shadows and allows a clean, thorough shave.

Shav-rite has already been nationally advertised through a New York paper and has been on the market for two weeks, stated St. John. He is at present in the midst of organizing a nationwide sales force to take over the selling of Shav-rite. Salesmen already have been sent to Hartford, Connecticut, Louisiana, Colorado, Pennsylvania, New Hampshire and Maine, and St. John expects to have many more Shav-rite representatives spread over the country in the next few weeks.

St. John recently received display cartons for the new product. The attractive red cartons which hold several of the razors contain photographs showing the Shav-rite in use and will soon appear in retail stores in Manchester as well as throughout the country.

Shav-rite advertising is built around the slogan "shav-clean, shav-rite with shav-rite." St. John stresses that even before a well-lit mirror, it is often difficult to get a clean shave. The regulation shaving head makes it possible to transfer the head of any standard razor to the Shav-rite factory.

Women have already shown quite an interest in the Shav-rite, added St. John, and he said that the razor will probably be produced in different colors soon to make it more appealing to the women. St. John, a veteran himself, says that the Shav-rite should be especially appealing to servicemen since they must often shave under rather primitive conditions.
