New Guarantee Offered Town

Manchester may secure a state-backed housing bond guarantee of over \$400,000 under the new guarantee allocation approved by special session of the Legislature last week, it was announced today.

The State Housing Authority has given out the list of minimum amounts towns may expect as construction guarantees under the assembly's \$30,000,000 addition to previous financial backing. The sum does not represent a state grant, but consists of surety that if the town enters into additional rental projects, state stands ready to make good losses under conditions of the act.

Favor Greenhaven Plan

So far there has been no indication that Manchester plans to undertake any projects under the new guarantee. Members of the Board of Directors have expressed the opinion that the most acceptable formula at this time would be for the state to match such funds as might be raised by the town for additional housing projects similar to the manner of financing Greenhaven.

In this area other towns which might receive guarantees would be Rockville, \$153,000; Willimantic, \$248,000; East Hartford, \$37,000; Glastonbury, \$135,000; Middletown, \$400,000.

Others listed are New London, \$618,000; Bridgeport, \$2,991,000; Hartford, \$3,223,000; Meriden, \$1,000,000; New Haven, \$3,267,000.

The guarantees will be made only in an amount which will create rental housing construction and sums not taken up by municipalities where allocated may be granted elsewhere.

Benes Virtually Paralyzed Now

Prague, Czechoslovakia, Sept. 2.—Doctors said today former President Eduard Benes has sunk deep into unconsciousness and is virtually paralyzed.

Benes, 65, has been unconscious since 5 a. m. Tuesday, and today a bulletin from doctors attending him said it was apparent he could not recover.

The latest bulletin said his lung action still is normal. The former president has suffered from hardening of the arteries for the past year.

The noon bulletin issued by the three doctors said there had been no considerable change in Benes' condition since the morning, except that he seemed to be weakening.

Added \$65,462.15 Interest Sought

New Haven, Sept. 2.—Columbia Manufacturing company of Hartford "billed" the government for an additional \$65,462.15 in interest payments in a Federal court suit filed here yesterday.

The interest, the company claims accrued on excess profits taxes for the calendar years 1942 and 1943, which the government refused to pay until the firm and its subsidiaries were liquidated.

Colts, one of the nation's leading treating manufacturers, says that the government refunded a total of \$3,874,208.44 in taxes and accrued interest on June 19, 1947, in two separate payments, one of \$2,753,399.57 and the other \$1,120,808.87.

The company says interest on the first amount was computed from April 28, 1945 to May 26, 1947, but should have started four months earlier, on Jan. 31, 1945.

On the second amount, the firm says interest was computed from the date of the refund, March 28, 1946 to May 26, 1947.

Couple Visit Son's Grave

Stamford, Sept. 2.—Mr. and Mrs. Ella B. Middletown were back in their Stamford home today after a pilgrimage to the long lost grave of their son, an American fighter pilot shot down over Germany.

The couple advertised in hundreds of European newspapers and distributed thousands of circulars on the continent in a three-year search for the body of their son, Capt. Ellis B. Middletown, 2nd.

The grave, marked "Unknown German Soldier" finally was located in the Reichswald forest near Kieve, Germany.

Mr. and Mrs. Middletown returned to the United States yesterday and immediately to Stamford.

Traffic Drive For All State

Hickey Orders Extension After Success On Boston Post Road

Hartford, Sept. 2.—State police today were intensifying a statewide crackdown on traffic violators similar to the drive which has been underway on Route 1 for the past three nights.

State Police Commissioner Edward J. Hickey, impressed by the decrease in accidents and motor vehicle laws violations resulting from the current 50-man patrol on the Boston Post road, yesterday ordered extension of the special coverage over the entire state.

"It is ordinarily our policy to put our entire departmental strength on patrol on holiday week-ends, but in an effort to keep Connecticut citizens out of accidents I requested station and division commanders yesterday to put their special patrols into action throughout the state and to keep them out until after the Labor day traffic period has diminished," the commissioner declared.

"Every member of this department, regardless of rank or regular assignment will be requested to give extra time to traffic work during this critical period," he said in his departmental order.

Can Obtain Cooperation

"Our work on the Post road has proved to me that public cooperation in obedience to motor vehicle laws can be obtained through strict enforcement," he added.

As a direct result of the drive begun yesterday, 180 men were on patrol throughout the state. They made a total of 88 arrests Wednesday and issued 261 warnings.

Meanwhile, on Route 1, Capt. Ralph J. Buckley, traffic division head, declared that the 50-man night patrol which was inaugurated Monday already has hoped to "greatly improve" the traffic situation there. In ordering the special patrol, Commissioner Hickey called traffic conditions along Route 1 "the worst in the state."

51 Arrests Made

On Route 1, 51 arrests were made Wednesday night, a drop of more than half from Tuesday night's 69 arrests. The three night total of arrests was 148. Warnings

Heaven of Christianity. They tend to concede all who do not share the political principles of the Christian party, not only against that party but against Christianity itself. But when all things have been given, it may still be desirable in some situations for Christians to organize in a political party for specific objectives, so long as they do not claim that it is the only possible expression of Christianity in the situation and so long as such a party guards against the temptation to continue after any valid reason for its existence has passed.

The report castigates Communism as a force that engenders new forms of injustice and oppression. It said capitalism had failed to meet human needs and had concentrated on materialistic production of goods and services, rejecting the idea which takes either as a panacea.

The report said one of the chief factors contributing to present ills is the concentration of power in the hands of a few. Capitalism puts emphasis upon freedom and promises justice will follow as a by-product of free enterprise. That, too, is an ideology which has been proved false.

Must Seek New Solutions

"It is the responsibility of Christians to seek new creative solutions which never allow either justice or freedom to be destroyed."

The church itself must accept its "share of responsibility" in the "contemporary disorder," the report said, conceding that the church often has failed to understand the forces which shape society and as a result were unprepared to deal creatively with social problems.

Communism in its modern totalitarian form makes use of the masses in many parts of the world," the report said. "The Communists recognize the work of God in the revolt of multitudes against the injustice that gives Communism its strength."

"Men to Stand for Values"

"Christians should realize that for many, especially for the many young men and women, Communism seems to stand for the vision of human equality and universal brotherhood for which they were prepared by Christian influences."

short for a B-29 landing. He beat the plane shot across the nose of the B-29 and landed in the water.

The Russian, said the U. S. A. P. report, "got very angry, shouting violently downward," then fired a shot across the nose of the B-29. The American plane captain ordered the B-29 to head for home.

For a time the Russian fighters were left behind, but they caught up with the B-29 off the coast of Korea and opened fire.

The Yaks scored a number of hits and one engine of the Super Fortress caught fire.

The American pilot ordered "flying gunners to withhold return fire," said the report, then instructed the crew to bail out before the imminent danger of explosion. Six men parachuted, but the others rode the damaged ship down to a landing.

Crew Held Incommunicado

For two days the Russians held the American crew incommunicado. Then a Russian officer, identified as Lieutenant General Aviation Prebrazhnikoff, apologized for the incident, and offered any help possible, including the use of Russian communication facilities.
