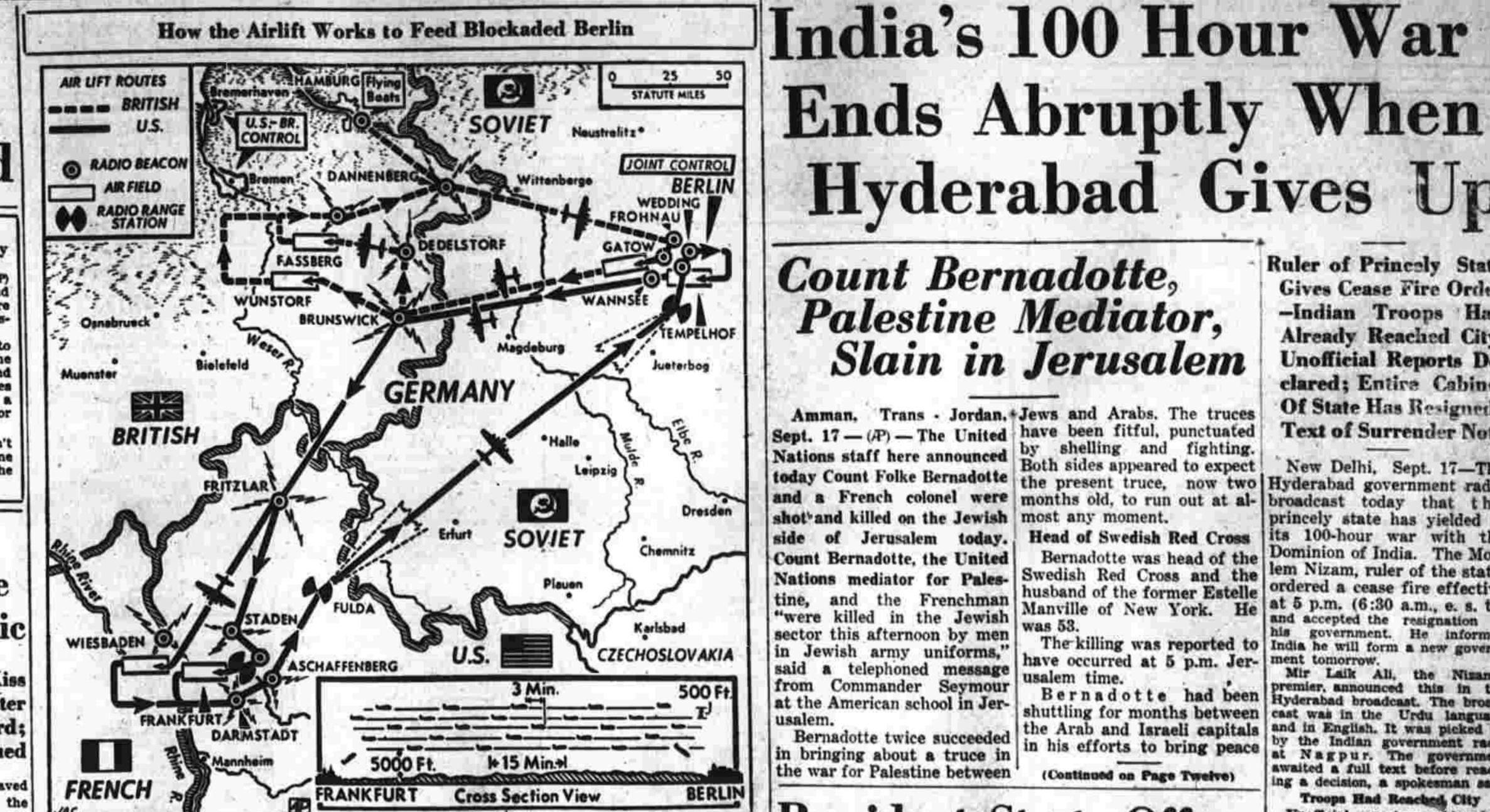

Lakes death reduces the number of living ex-governors of Connecticut to seven, all of whom served after him. They are Charles A. Templeton of Waterbury, Hiram Bingham of Washington, John H. Trumbull of Plainville, Wilbur L. Cross of New Haven, U. S. Senator Raymond E. Baldwin of Stratford, Robert A.

Hurlay of Wallingford and Wilbert Snow of Middletown.  
Bingham and Snow served only a few days each. Bingham resigned to fill a vacancy in the U. S. Senate and Snow, a Democratic lieutenant governor, succeeded Baldwin when the latter went to the Senate late in 1946, shortly before his term as Governor expired.  
Lake, former president of the Hartford Lumber company, made an inconspicuous bow in politics in 1909 when he was elected a member of the Hartford board of school visitors. Two years later, however, he was elected a State Representative and in 1904 was elected to the State Senate.  
His first attempts to win the

gubernatorial nomination were in 1908 and 1910.  
His father, Thomas A. Lake, also had had a political career, serving as State Representative, State Senator, Republican State Central committee member and Collector of Internal Revenue for Connecticut.  
Lake's first wife, whom he married in 1885, was the former Eva Louise Sykes. She died in the early 1890's and subsequently he married the former Mrs. Lewis H. Gordon, who died shortly after their marriage.

**Reds' Charges Brushed Off**  
Gen. MacArthur Says There Is Little Sense in Answering Russians  
Tokyo, Sept. 17.—(AP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur today brushed off as "baseless" Russian charges that he was hampering democracy and labor unions in Japan. In a formal statement answering the charges in Washington of Soviet Ambassador Panyushkin, the allied commander told the Russians to practice what they preach.  
"There is an old oriental proverb equally understood by the west as well as by the east which says there can be 'no greater hypocrisy than to fail to practice what you preach.'"  
The supreme allied commander further told Japanese labor that its greatest danger "lies in its absorption and ultimate destruction by Communists who seek to exploit it to spread disorder, anarchy and revolution."  
"... We are the concept of Communism to prevail here. Japanese labor would be the first to feel its completely totalitarian oppression and control and the trade union movement would perish to be replaced by a handful of self appointed masters," he continued.  
"Making No Headway"  
"Communism," he said, is making very little headway in Japan despite frantic Communist efforts to achieve the contrary. Japan continues calm, stable and well ordered," he said.  
MacArthur reminded the Russians that "there is deep and natural sentiment throughout Japan at what is generally regarded by all Japanese as a basic disregard of human and moral values in retention in Russia after more than three years following their surrender of half a million Japanese prisoners."  
"These prisoners, he said, are employed under atrocious conditions

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# Allies Are Tightening Their Counter-Block Of the Russian Zone

Berlin, Sept. 17.—(AP)—The western allies tightened their counter-blockade of the Russian zone today to shut off the last flow of goods from western Germany to the east.

Imports were increased at crossing points along the length of Germany's frontier with the Soviet zone to halt any east-bound freight on the highways.

Meanwhile, German Communist leaders assailed the planners of a German government today, saying the Soviet zone today to shut off the last flow of goods from western Germany to the east.

The statement wound up with several militant slogans including: "Long live friendship with the Soviet Union."

At the same time the Soviet-licensed news agency ADN reported that the SED has set up a central control commission for the party in eastern Germany with similar control units for each district.

These control groups presumably are to be established to keep the party in line and prevent internal uprisings. They are in line with the Communist move to tighten control over party members throughout Europe.

Blas American licensed radio reported one of its German news reporters was released yesterday by the Russians. He had been arrested earlier in the day in the Soviet sector.

Meanwhile, in the Grafenwoehr area on the Rhine, American and British army units counter-attacked an unidentified "aggressor" army in a mock battle at High Bridge and American officers looked on.

In Frankfurt a U.S. Air Force spokesman said a survey had been made of possible sites for additional airfields to augment, if necessary, the Berlin airfield. Locations of the potential airfields were not disclosed.

 Frankfurt, Germany, Sept. 17.—A U. S. official disclosed today the life sentence of Isak Koch, widow of the former commander of Buchenwald concentration camp, has been commuted to four years. The sentence was commuted because Koch was not clear on the charge of food poisoning at Buchenwald. Koch was arrested in 1945 and sentenced to life imprisonment. She was released in 1949.

**Marshall On The UN**  
 Secretary of State George C. Marshall, addressing the Federal Bar Association in Washington the other day, at a time when heightened conflict which seems outside the reach of all reason was raging throughout the world's diplomacy, selected the United States as his topic. "The most urgent requirement of our age," said Secretary Marshall, "is the establishment of a world order securely based on the rule of law."  
 He regarded the United Nations as the instrument through which the establishment of such a world order must be brought about. A genuine spirit of tolerance and understanding, he told the Bar Association, "combined with patience, determination and hard work, and applied through the United Nations, can advance us toward the goal of a peaceful community of nations governed by a system of law respected by all."  
 Setting this goal, and regarding the United Nations as the route through which it must be achieved, Secretary Marshall said two things which should both be given importance in public thinking about the problem of world government.  
 First, although Secretary Marshall obviously recognizes that the goal of a "world order" is not yet within sight, he would take no light view of the accomplishments of the United Nations to date. The functioning of this organization are already complex and valuable in many ways which are often obscured by the pressure of outside headlines and controversy among the great powers. He urged more popular understanding of what the United Nations has been achieving, in most difficult circumstances.  
 Second, Secretary Marshall pronounced himself encouraged by the fact that all some critics of the United Nations Charter in this country is devoted to one end — that of strengthening the United Nations so that it can have a better chance of becoming the route toward that world order Secretary Marshall himself advocates.  
 Adhering to the United Nations on one hand, while endeavoring to strengthen it with the other, thus seem to be the Marshall formula for progress toward his goal of a peaceful community of nations governed by a system of law respected by all. That is also, incidentally, the same goal, and those are the same methods, of Ben Gold's Federalists.

The hope of such witnesses, following the party line, is to embroil the issue of Communism itself, in Russia's sole desire, with regard to the Italian colonies, is to prevent England and the United States from establishing Third World War positions in these colonies. Russia now favors principle because she thinks principle might keep England and the United States from making a territorial grab.  
 Russia now adopts the right principle merely because Russia thinks that it is one way to keep her power rivals out of a strategic military position. Russia knows that the Italian colonies are beyond her own reach as spoils of war. Otherwise, she would probably already have taken them. Her present effort is merely to keep us from taking these spoils for ourselves.  
 This is the morality of the world's great nations on public display, in three any one, in any nation, who really thinks it is good enough to permit civilization to continue? Is there any one who doubts that if the great bulk of mankind wishes to pursue its own instinctive good goals it must find some means of imposing upon the actions of groups of men, which are known as nations, the

 He is that rarest of individuals, a Communist who, when called before a Congressional committee and asked the stock question in the current series of Red investigations, "Are you or have you ever been a member of the Communist party?" replied in the affirmative.  
 Mr. Gold may not, of course, remain a Communist for long. For he has violated the party line. That, as applied to these Congressional investigations, dictates a shift in policy. He has refused to answer the question, and his refusal to answer, the witness refuses to answer on the ground that he might be incriminating himself, although it is no crime to be a Communist. The hope of such witnesses, following the party line, is to embroil the issue of Communism itself, in Russia's sole desire, with regard to the Italian colonies, is to prevent England and the United States from establishing Third World War positions in these colonies. Russia now favors principle because she thinks principle might keep England and the United States from making a territorial grab.  
 Russia now adopts the right principle merely because Russia thinks that it is one way to keep her power rivals out of a strategic military position. Russia knows that the Italian colonies are beyond her own reach as spoils of war. Otherwise, she would probably already have taken them. Her present effort is merely to keep us from taking these spoils for ourselves.  
 This is the morality of the world's great nations on public display, in three any one, in any nation, who really thinks it is good enough to permit civilization to continue? Is there any one who doubts that if the great bulk of mankind wishes to pursue its own instinctive good goals it must find some means of imposing upon the actions of groups of men, which are known as nations, the
