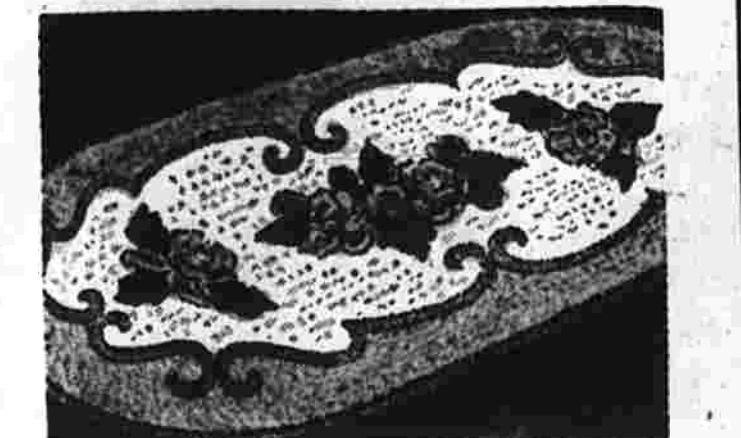

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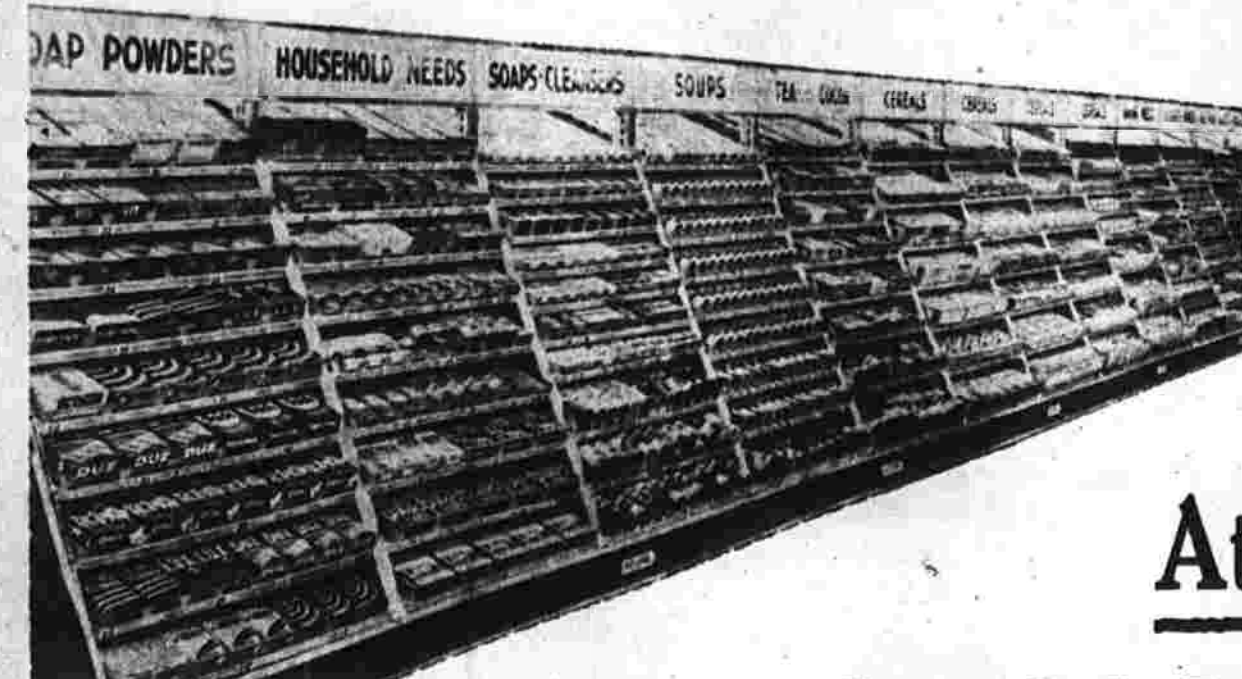

Terror Campaign
Unleashed by Tito

Bucharest, Romania, Sept. 29.—The Communist bulletin said today Yugoslavia's Premier Marshal Tito has unleashed a terror campaign against Communist sympathizers.

An article by Slavko Nikic reported arrests of Communist sympathizers in Belgrade. It also reported the removal of office and disappearance of Vukobratovic, Montenegrin republic deputy chairman, and its minister of trade and supplies, Education Minister Niko Pavic, and Industry Minister Blazo Ristic.

In another article, Hilary Mice, a member of the Central Committee of the Polish Communist party, said the fight against well-to-do peasants in Poland must be intensified.

This must be done, he said by buying the crops of poorer peasants at good prices and by taxing heavily the kulaks (rich peasants). Mice accused the kulaks of opposing these measures fiercely and trying to disorganize the country-side.

Dewey Urges Help Be Given to Unite European Nations

Proposes Nine-Point Foreign Policy Aimed At 'Just and Lasting Peace'; Sees Need for 'Firm But Even-Tempered Resistance'

En Route With Dewey to Cheyenne, Wyo., Oct. 1.—(AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey called on the United States today—as "the decisive world power"—to help unite western Europe in meeting aggressive threats with but even-tempered resistance.

The Republican presidential nominee headed across Wyoming for a talk in Cheyenne tonight (9:30 p. m. e.s.t.), on occasion of his scheduled speech at a two-week campaign tour of the west.

Proposed Foreign Policy. He capped that campaign in Salt Lake City last night with proposals for a nine-point foreign policy he said was aimed at "a lasting peace."

The means by which we seek to achieve that goal will be, first, the strengthening of those forces which make for peace in the world, and second, a firm but even-tempered resistance to the forces of aggression wherever they are seeking to break down the present structure of human freedom," he declared.

Predicting Democratic Victory. Predicting the Democrats "are going to win," the president said, "the United States must stand for a 'just and lasting peace' and a major address at Cheyenne, W. Va., at 8:30 that is, e.s.t., will be given."

More than a dozen platform speeches led up to his scheduled address at Cheyenne. He spoke of the Jefferson County school district of the 1948 campaign.

He said the school district was a "small example of the kind of thing we need to do in the world."

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Russia Charges War United States' Aim; Hints A-Bomb Made

Pledge Given Berlin Will Get Food and Coal

Residents Heartened by Pledge They Will Have Adequate Stocks Carried to City by Planes

Paris, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Russia today of seeking war and said the Americans have no monopoly on the atom bomb. In a violent attack on U. S. atomic policy, Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Dewey, the Republican candidate for president of the United States, stated that the United States has exclusive monopoly of the atomic secret, as he put it. Mr. Dewey attacked the U.S.S.R. and concluded by quoting from an American press agency.
