Dewey Urges Help Be Given to Unite European Nations

Proposes Nine-Point Foreign Policy Aimed At 'Just and Lasting Peace'

En Route With Dewey to Cheyenne, Wyo., Oct. 1—(AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey called on the United States today—as the "decisive westward power"—to help unite European nations in meeting aggressive threats with but even-tempered resistance.

The Republican presidential nominee headed across Wyoming for a talk in Cheyenne tonight (9:30 p. m., e.s.t.), the westernmost speech of a two-week campaign tour of the west.

Proposes Foreign Policy He capped that campaign in proposals for a nine-point foreign policy he said was aimed at "a just and lasting peace."

The means by which he sought to achieve that goal will be, first, the strengthening of those forces which make for peace in the world, and second, a firm but even-tempered resistance to the forces of aggression wherever they are urged to break down the present structure of human freedom.

A crowd which overflowed the 5,000-seat Mormon tabernacle, filled two smaller closely built buildings and stood on the temple grounds applauded as Dewey said: "The best way to deal with aggression is to deal with them as strong equals and by doing so to restore their respect for us."

Rockville School Census In Rockville

Supt. Chatterton Reports on Conditions; Other News of City

Rockville, Oct. 1.—(Special)—Superintendent of Schools A. E. Chatterton has issued a report showing that enrollment in the Vernon Public Schools is 1,440.

The superintendent has issued the following statement:

"Due to the exceptionally large enrollment in Grade 1 at the East and Maple street schools we found it necessary to divide the primary building of the East School. Miss Mildred MacCallum, Palatka, has started the division of the class off and will be succeeded by Mrs. C. G. Stevens beginning October 4th. Mrs. Stevens is a teacher of some experience and comes very well recommended by all who know her.
