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Patients Pleased With Blue Cross

In a recent survey of replies from Blue Cross questionnaire returned from member patients, tabulation shows Manchester Memorial hospital totaled 435 replies, representing a 77.5 percent return of Blue Cross mailings. During this period replies from Blue Cross member-patients at all member hospitals totaled 18,112 or a 35 percent return of their mailings.

It is interesting to note the high percentage of satisfaction for hospital service received by the public at Manchester Memorial with a 97.8 per cent to lead the 94.78 percent figure for all member hospitals.

Hospitals in Blue Cross working together have made it easier for the public to pay their bills and statistics show the insurance has saved 38 percent of them in this survey from the need of hospital money for their hospital bills.

Death Rate Decreases

Hartford, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Figures released by the State Health Department yesterday show that the death rate in Connecticut has decreased 44 per cent in the past 47 years. The survey disclosed that the rate was 10.1 Heart disease and cancer now cause the largest number of deaths, according to the report.

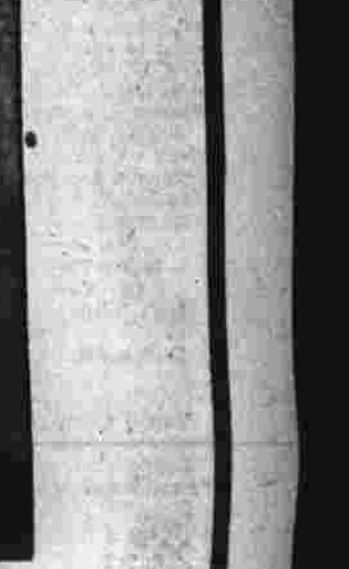

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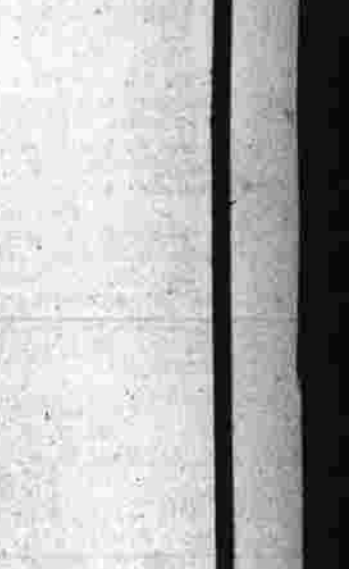

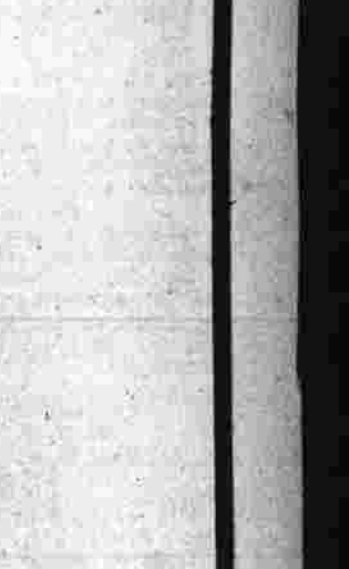

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Fire Destroys Tobacco Shed

Wapping Blaze Causes \$25,000 Loss; Shed Filled With Tobacco

A tobacco shed owned by Donald Great at the corner of Pleasant Valley road and Route 5 in Wapping was destroyed by fire early last evening causing a loss estimated by Chief George Egan...

The blaze was discovered by a passing autoist at about 6:30. He notified the South Windsor Fire department. The fire spread rapidly and swept from one end of the five acre shed to the other. The shed was filled with recently-harvested tobacco. The fire was visible for miles around and resulted in another alarm being turned in in East Hartford by a boy who thought that the fire was in that town.

The Manchester Fire department stood by waiting for any call of assistance but it was not until 7:30 that the fire was extinguished. The building alone as about \$6,000, partly covered by insurance. 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Russians Say Council Lacks Right to Hear Berlin Blockade Row

Foreign Ministers Meet on Low Flying

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Russia Challenged By Austin to Tel Atomic Curb Plan

Asked If She Is Ready To Agree to Effective International Control; Opens Western Powers' Drive to Answer Latest Switch

Dewey Awaits Dulles Report On Red Crisis

Described as So Confident of Victory He Will Not Alter Measured Campaign Pace

Paris, Oct. 4.—(P)—Warren R. Austin of the United States challenged Russia today to say if she is ready to agree to effective international control of atomic energy.

He opened in the Political committee of the United Nations Assembly, the western powers drive to answer Russia's latest switch in tactics in the atomic energy debate.

Flying from Paris to work, Austin said he hoped the time for throwing "old tonnage dead cats" is over. He added he hoped the delegates could get down to real work.

His answer to violent attacks by Russia's Andrei Vishinsky and the Soviet Union's Vyacheslav Molotov was that he would try to do nothing to make the atomic bomb.

Vanderberg to Speak Senator Arthur Vandenberg (R., Mich.) will touch on other aspects of Republican foreign policy in a radio broadcast tonight (8 to 9:30 p. m., e.s.t., CBS). While Vandenberg had no advance look at Washington's text, the two men have agreed to give their own views on the subject.

The Republican presidential nominee would not comment on his 14-day western trip.

But an aide said he regards his prospect as highly favorable before the election that he has no intention of altering his campaign course to trade punches with President Truman or any other Democrat.

Dewey has been discussing the issue with his western friends. He has been told that a "high plane" Democrats have contended that the G.O.P. nominee should not make any statement until after the election.

Takes Criticism in stride, the Dewey camp said it will continue its "atomic energy" program, which may begin next Monday in the Berlin-Hamburg air corridor.

After that the New York governor is expected to swing the southwest, taking in Oklahoma and Missouri, and wind up with an important speech in St. Paul Oct. 15.

President Truman invaded New York this week with an appearance scheduled in Albany Friday. Dewey is expected to appear in Pawling later in the week and would like to take in a World Series game in Chicago.

The possibility remains, however, that he still may be in Albany (Continued on Page Eight)
