Horse Owner Faces Court

Poor Season of 'High Mame' Connected With Alleged Defalcation

Danbury, Oct. 7.—The poor season which the horse "High Mame" had this summer on eastern trotting tracks has a direct connection with a \$10,000 alleged defalcation at the Danbury National bank, says the FBI.

Donald F. Devine, 28, owner and driver of "High Mame," was arraigned before a United States commissioner yesterday on a charge of stealing that sum from the bank, where he was employed as a commercial tiler.

Lost in Unsuccessful Bet John J. Gleason, special agent in charge of Connecticut FBI offices, said Devine made a statement that he took the money from the bank in various sums beginning last July, and lost it in unsuccessful bets on his home.

The Roosevelt raceway on Long Island was one of the tracks where Devine and "High Mame" appeared several times last summer, Gleason said.

Held on \$5,000 Bail At his arraignment before Commissioner Earl W. Smith in Bridgeport, Devine waived examination, Commissioner Smith ordered him held to \$5,000 bail for appearance in Federal District Court.

Devine was discharged from the Army Air Force as a sergeant in February, 1946, and had been employed by the bank since shortly after that. He lives here with his wife and two sons, one four years old and the other born only two weeks ago.

Burton R. Sherwood, the bank's attorney, said a surety bond protected it fully from any loss.

Fire Damage An Increase

Chief Foy Advises on Hazards in Homes; Town Observing Week

Spiraling costs of fire in the United States gives added importance to the current observance of National Fire Prevention Week.

Chief Albert B. Foy of the South Manchester Fire department said today, Fire Prevention Week, October 3-9, is being observed locally by essay contests and demonstrations in various schools.

Stating that fire's costs about 10,000 lives and \$700,000,000 a year, Chief Foy pointed out that these figures are increasing instead of decreasing.

Fire, nearly all of which could have been prevented by simple acts of caution, cost the nation \$54,706,000 in property loss during June, latest month for which figures are available.

This represents an increase of 7.6 per cent over June, 1947, indicating that fire losses are still going up.
