Great Britain Fears War Near, Says Author

English Writer, Speaking Here, Declares Country in Serious Mood at Present Time

The Catholic church in its fight against Communism is fighting a hand of cranks, declared Arnold Lunn, English author and lecturer in his address before more than 200 persons at the Hollister street school last night.

"I don't believe the Russian will start a war," Lunn declared to force its way through the corridors to Berlin. "The decision is made to push through there might be local shooting in the corridors but I don't believe it will spring into war."

"To go back to the Napoleonic wars: At their ending the peace treaties were worked out by the aristocrats, the rulers of both England and France, being of that class. As a result the peace imposed on France in many ways was a model of humanity and restraint."

The "Mission To Moscow"
 Viewed within the context of
 our existing foreign policy, the
 "Mission to Moscow" affair is a
 tremendous blunder on the part of
 President Truman.

Our existing foreign policy, as
 most recently revealed in the
 "White Paper" described in the
 Moscow conference last summer,
 consists in refusing to negotiate
 with Russia. Against this policy,
 President Truman suddenly pro-
 posed negotiation.

Our existing foreign policy labors
 to establish the premise that
 the present world struggle is not
 merely between Russia and the
 United States, but between Russia
 and all other nations. We have
 had considerable difficulty in per-
 suading the rest of the world of
 this, but we have, at the present
 time, come close to binding other
 nations to us as allies. We have
 had difficulty bringing them to
 our theory that negotiation should
 not be attempted, but they have
 been following our diplomatic
 lead. Now, suddenly, President
 Truman proposed to leave
 them out in the cold while the
 United States undertook direct
 negotiations with Russia.

Our existing foreign policy is
 based on a theory of bipartisan
 unity at home. When, last Thurs-
 day, President Truman had al-
 ready arranged for time on the
 national radio to announce the
 "Mission to Moscow," there had
 apparently been no consultation
 of Republican foreign policy lead-
 ers. President Truman was look-
 ing for a personal triumph which
 might have had, as a pleasing by-
 product, an effect upon his own
 political chances.

All these facts of blunder being
 so, there is some melancholy con-
 sideration to be derived from the
 fact that, for the first time, Pres-
 ident Truman was blundering in a
 good and right direction.
 Somehow, for the first time, he
 had succeeded in escaping from the
 tight and sometimes senseless
 what minister military domination
 of his foreign policy which has
 been in existence since Admiral
 William D. Leahy first succeeded
 in putting Secretary of State
 Byrnes on the side. Somehow,
 momentarily, President Truman
 had escaped from the policy of
 toughness unlimited.

Perhaps it was partly the fact
 that, getting out around the coun-
 try in his campaigning, he es-
 caped for a moment from the mili-
 tary atmosphere.
 Perhaps he read the American
 "White Paper" on the Moscow
 Conference, and came to the in-
 evitable conclusion, which was
 that American diplomacy had
 spent six weeks saying "no" and
 nothing more. Perhaps he remem-
 bered, in connection with that,
 that the first Moscow Conference
 of Secretary of State Marshall's
 office had been merely a demon-
 stration of Mr. Marshall's success-
 ful determination to say "no"
 more often and more consistently
 than the Russians had ever said
 it.

Perhaps Mr. Truman had a
 momentary glimpse of the truth
 about this country's foreign pol-
 icy, which is that it is much
 more afraid of making peace than
 it is of making war.
 In any event, he made his tem-
 porary escape. It was a blunder-
 ing type of escape, and he has
 soon been caught and clamped
 back into his cage, where he will
 continue to be a clumsy little yea-
 man for the foreign policy of no
 peace.
 There will be a great deal of
 publication over the fact that he
 has blundered, and he has been
 forced back into submission.
 It will be, and it is, thoughtless.
