Boston, Oct. 13.—Price cuts of from five to 20 cents a pound on 45 meat items became effective today in Great Atlantic and Pacific Food Stores in the six New England states and eastern and western New York state.

Beef, pork, smoked meats and poultry were included, with center cut pork chops cut back 20 cents a pound to sell for 79 cents.

Porterhouse and sirloin steaks were brought down from 99 cents to 89 cents a pound.

CIO Legislative Agent Propounds Questions For Governor Shannon

Waterbury, Oct. 12.—Gov. James C. Shannon today was asked to tell how he stands on the Hart-Hartley law.

Mrs. Margaret Driscoll, legislative agent for the State CIO-Council, pointing out that Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, Republican presidential candidate, favors the law "without a single specific reservation," issued a statement in which she propounded a series of questions to the Gov. candidate for governor.

The statement:

Republican Presidential Candidate Dewey has come out for the Hart-Hartley law without a single specific reservation. All of organized labor, both CIO and AFL, are opposed to the Hart-Hartley law for reasons which Governor Shannon, a former union legislative agent, should understand.

Questions Asked

In the light of Dewey's action, does Governor Shannon still maintain the pretense that the Republican party is friendly to labor?

Where does Governor Shannon stand on this law? Shannon back Dewey's support of a law which gives the employer the right to replace strikers seeking a bread-and-butter wage increase permanently with strikebreakers?

Does Governor Shannon support a law which allows strikebreakers to vote for the bargaining agent in a plant, but denies strikers the right to vote?

Does he support a law which has disrupted harmonious labor-management relations of many years standing in a large section of the printing industry and which has caused the loss of jobs to thousands of men?

Does Governor Shannon support a law which attempts to silence unions on political issues?

Does Governor Shannon support a law which in the words of one of its anti-labor authors, Rep. Fred Hartley "is only a beginning in the drive to nullify the social gains of the New Deal?"
