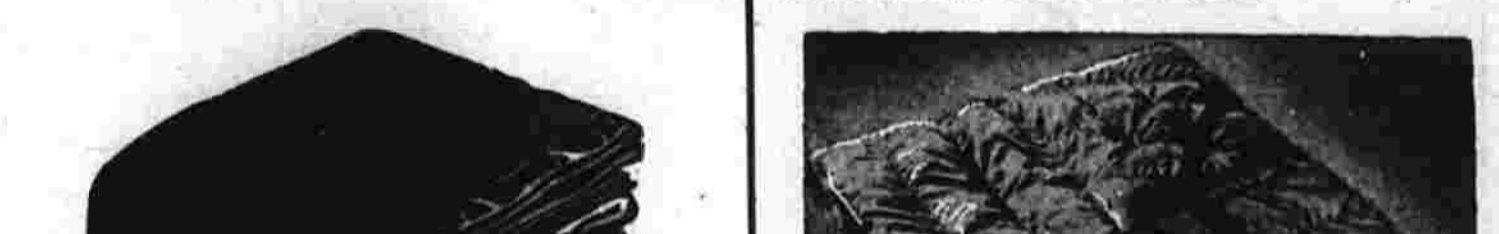

Groves Urges Keep A-Bomb
 General Views Missile as 'Weapon on Which Security Depends'
 Bridgeport, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Lieut. Gen. Leslie R. Groves, describing the atomic bomb as the "weapon on which our national security depends," asserts "we must not give it up."
 The general, now retired, was praising President Roosevelt's "Manhattan" project for development of the atomic bomb.
 Speaking at the Algonquin club's annual meeting here last night, Groves said:
 "Does not believe war year '49 do not believe war with Russia is imminent because an atomic bomb would be used in the war."
 He cautioned, neither the capabilities nor the intentions of Russian leaders are known, and the United States must not only preserve its atomic bomb supply but also "maintain a well-balanced, well-trained military and naval force capable of delivering an atomic bomb where they will be most effective."
 "Must be prepared to retaliate," he said, "we must be prepared to retaliate immediately and break up an offensive against our hemisphere."
 This will require the most efficient administration possible of the atomic energy program, declared General Groves.
 "Said the general: 'Every effort must be made to keep the atomic problem out of politics. During this election year, it is not possible, but I believe after the election, with the delivery of atomic energy to the public, the senatorial committee on Atomic Energy as a supervisory body in power, the job can be done.'"
 Feels Atoms Must Be Amended
 He added, however, that he felt that the atomic energy act of 1946 must eventually be amended to require some military authority over administration of the weapon's control.
 The general expressed the opinion that the United States permitted too rapid demobilization of the armed forces at the close of World War II. This was done, he said, with the aid of a "true friend and ally, and a fellow democrat of the world."
 He concluded: "We must at all costs avoid war provided we do not compromise our principles as a nation. And if we do compromise these principles, we don't have to worry about what happens to America anyway."

A Suggestion To The Board
 Next Tuesday evening, the Board of Directors will conduct a public hearing on a proposed ordinance under which parking meters would come to Manchester. The question of parking meters is one which has been brewing a long time, and deservingly so. For they will mean a fundamental change in the character of our "City of Village Charm," and, once installed, they will go on forever and forever. These things have been weighed against the service the parking meters do perform, and the town seems to be approaching a decision.
 Two things, however, make us suggest one more pause before the final decision is made.
 The first is that fact that community after community which has installed the parking meter within the past decade is now in the throes of providing itself with still another answer to the modern parking problem—the question of more parking space. Middletown is doing it, Stamford is doing it, Bridgeport is doing it. And, to put it plainly, every community which once thought the parking meter would solve its problem is going to have to do it. All in other words, can't solve a parking problem in the world, it is the palliative, the expedient, a community tries before it comes face to face with the real and basic problem, which is the question of space itself.
 The experience of these other communities suggests that perhaps a really sensible community would try the basic, the eventual, remedy first.
 Meanwhile, Manchester itself is in a period of Main street changes. One of these changes is a new extension of the shopping district southward, and it is a feature of this extension of the shopping district that two of the major shopping centers involved are providing their own parking space for patrons, which take a large number of cars off Main street itself.
 There is another change coming, as another of Manchester's biggest markets is soon scheduled to move off Main street to a side street, where it, too, will provide adequate parking facilities for its patrons, thus taking another large group of cars off Main street.
 Against these changes, which combine the provision of more parking space with a drawing of cars away from the most crowded sections of Main street, there must be cited a new professional building under construction, in a congested sector, which is apparently not going to provide its own parking space.
 But the net result of these developments is the provision, free to the people of Manchester, of more parking space in the shopping center, with more such space still to come.
 It is automatic, therefore, that the parking overload in Manchester's shopping district has been reduced from whatever it was a few months ago.
 The question is one of how much it has been reduced. Judgment on this point is reduced to haphazard personal experience, which may vary. We think the Main street parking situation has grown easier in recent weeks. We think that, with the exception of the greatest rush period, it is a reasonable situation, in which there is no need for meters. Others, on their own experience, and with different loads, may reach a different conclusion.
 But it seems to us that these basic changes in the Manchester situation which have occurred since parking meters were first proposed here are important

All Sides Top Meditation
 Hissias, Tej, has quibbled with the Berlin mediation proposal of the six neutral nations at Paris. Whereas the western powers rejected the idea that they agree to a "simultaneous" lifting of the Berlin blockade and resumption of Big Four Council of Foreign Ministers talk on the whole problem of Germany, Russia rejects the idea that she should do anything while the western powers are still presenting their case against her in the Security Council.
 The western powers do not want to agree to talk on western Germany while they are under the "duress" of the Russian blockade of Berlin.
 Russia does not want to agree to lift the blockade of Berlin while she is under the "duress" of the western power move against her in the Security Council.
 So there the situation shifts into a new deadlock, slightly different in detail from all the other deadlocks, but precisely similar in spirit. What is going to give first? That is the question. And all sides reply: Not us!

More Dollars, More Guns
 Last summer, the American press was full of headlines about great victories being scored against the guerrillas in Greece. President Truman proclaimed, proudly, that the "Truman Doctrine" had been successful in purging Communism from Greece.
 Now Greece is asking more money from this country, not for economic rehabilitation, but for more expansion of its military forces so that it can wage fresh campaigns against the guerrillas.
 It is said that Greece needs more help because the guerrillas are continuing to get fresh help from Greece's northern Russian satellite neighbors. And there may be something to that. But one thing is certain, if the guerrillas are still enjoying their control of large sections of Greece far removed from the northern borders, in locations where they could not possibly receive any help from outside countries. One wonders at the continual difference between American newspaper reports of success in Greece and the language of newspapers re-ports and the knowledge in American Greek circles of conditions in Greece.
 Has the militaristic Truman Doctrine been a success? Has it succeeded in killing off the present government in Greece? Or are there so many of these that the fighting must go on and on, with an unlimited supply of American guns and dollars necessary to keep the people of Greece in line for a government they neither trust nor respect?
 Have we been able to lick Communism and political unrest with dollars and guns? President Truman, and some newspaper accounts, have said so. But, apparently, something is going to take more dollars and guns, and no end in sight.

Submarines Fleet Leader Decorated
 Washington, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Rear Admiral James Fife, Jr., commander of the Atlantic fleet submarines, has been decorated by The Netherlands government for his help in the critical days when the Japanese were sweeping through the East Indies.
 In a quiet ceremony at The Netherlands embassy in Washington, Fife was presented the Order of Orange Nassau with Swords, rank of grand officer, an Admiral's Fife.
 An commander of Task Force 71, Admiral Fife helped re-equip The Netherlands Navy, especially its submarines, and later directed their operations under his overall Allied command.

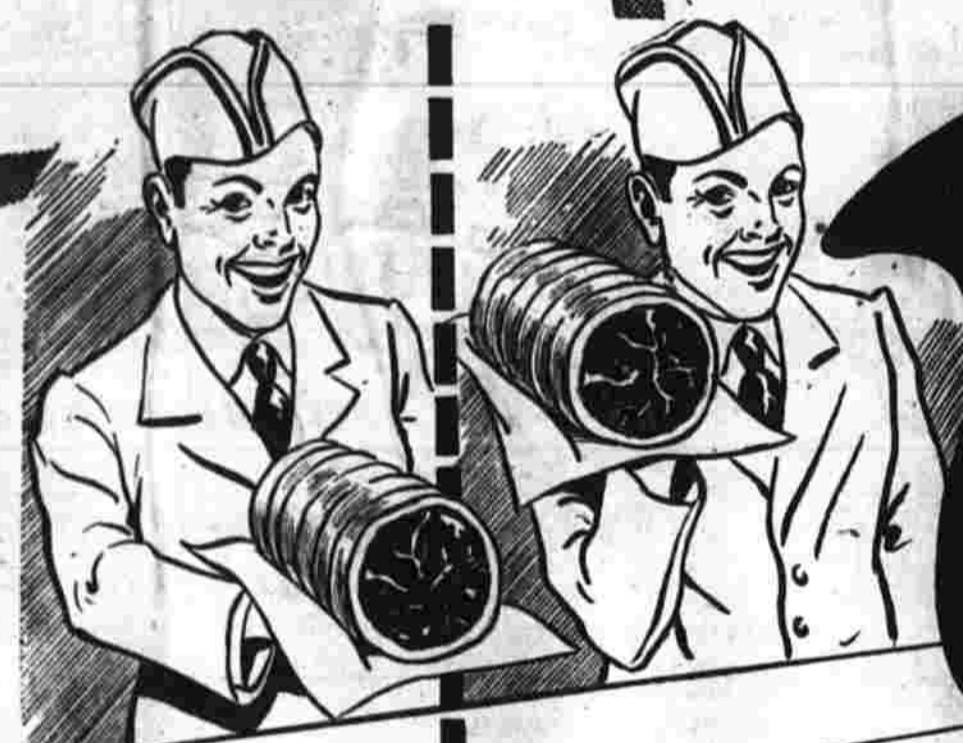

Fledges of Cooperation When the committee turned to the alternative plan for an all-Manchester entertainment at Memorial Field on the afternoon of Saturday, Oct. 23, there were prompt pledges of cooperation and talent participation from six groups represented at the meeting; and it is expected and hoped that other groups will join the program as soon as they become aware of it.

Definite assurances of talent participation in the entertainment program were received last night from the British-American club, from the Polish, Italian, Lithuanian, and Scotch groups, and from the Daughters of Isabella. The town's Swedish group are expected to arrange for joining the program today.

The Army and Navy Club may also sponsor a portion of the entertainment.

Ball in the Evening As the first program for United Nations Day in Manchester now stands, there will be two major events, the one the afternoon entertainment at Memorial Field, starting at 2 p. m., and the other the United Nations Ball at the State Armory Saturday evening, Oct. 23, starting at 8 p. m.

Proceeding the United Nations Ball, there will be presented a celebrated Pageant Team from the Bridgeport Redmen, which is being brought to Manchester for the event by the local Redmen, for whom Save Vendillo was spokesman last night.

Jack Saxon, co-chairman with Elmer Woden of the general observance committee, will be in charge of the afternoon entertainment and the evening dance.

Those on Committees On the entertainment committee he will be assisted by Harold Turkington as assistant chairman, Save Vendillo, John Calvin Fishbein, Fred Clark and Walter Mahoney. 

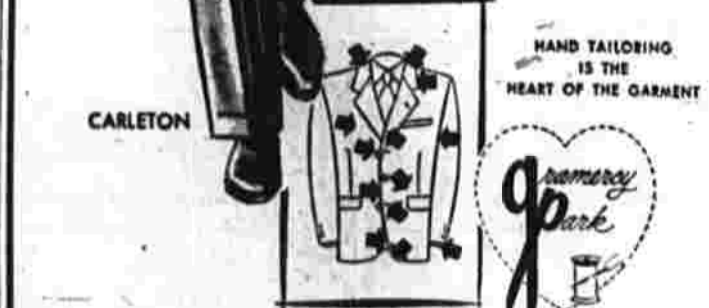

Truman Says Dewey Ducks Wages Issue

Asserts Republican Opponent 'Won't Come Out and Say' What Maximum Should Be

Aboard Truman Campaign Train, Oct. 15—(AP)—President Truman declared today Gov. Thomas E. Dewey is "ducking the issue" of a higher minimum wage. Mr. Truman told a crowd of workers at Hammond, Ind., that his Republican opponent "won't come out and say" how much the present 40-cent minimum wage should be raised.

As for himself, the chief executive said, he and the Democratic party proposed to raise it "to at least 75 cents."

In his rear platform talk, the first of a series in Indiana en route to Indianapolis for a major address tonight on "Human extension," Truman called for re-election of Rep. Ray J. Madden (D-Ind.) and said Madden's record is "straight, and clean."

"I think Indiana is going to come back where it belongs in the Democratic party," he said.

Former Gov. Henry F. Schricker, now the Democratic nominee for that office, joined Mr. Truman's campaign train at Hammond as did Frank M. McHale, the national committeeman, and other party leaders.

Police Chief Anthony J. Stankiewicz estimated 20,000 turned out at Hammond to hear Mr. Truman.

In his Indianapolis address, Mr. Truman will feature his advocacy of Federal aid to education, a national health program, and other proposals he said the 80th Congress has rejected.

The Hammond stop was Mr. Truman's second visit to the First Indiana district.

The president asserted in his Hammond speech that Dewey says he believes in the minimum wage "but I think the smaller the minimum the better the Republicans like it."

Refused to Act on High Prices
He said the 80th Congress, on whose record his opponent "is campaigning," refused to act on high prices.

Apparently he believes that failure to help you meet the rising cost of living was a good thing for the country," Mr. Truman added.

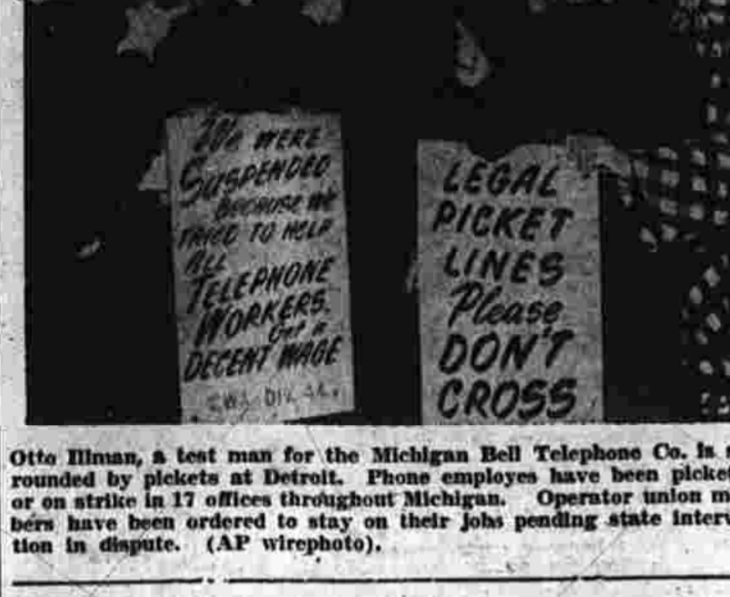

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Mediator Sees Time Ripe for Settlement

Bunche Believes Both Sides in Palestine Dispute Would Accept Proposal for Peace

Paris, Oct. 15—(AP)—The interim Palestine mediator told the United Nations today the "time is ripe for a settlement" in the Holy Land and he believes both sides would accept a reasonable U.N. proposal for peace.

On both sides there is a desire and a need for peace," Dr. Ralph Bunche told the 58-nation Political committee.

Bunche declared the state of Israel was "a going concern from the day of its birth, and could not be destroyed 'by any means other than force of sufficient strength to completely crush the Jews in Palestine.'"

He said Israel, from the day of its birth on May 15, has been "a vibrant reality."

Nine Fundamental Issues
He listed nine points as fundamental issues for the United Nations Assembly:

The Jewish state; the boundaries of such a state; the future status of Jerusalem; international guarantees of boundaries; the Arab area of Palestine; guarantees of the rights of all Palestinians; repatriation and resettlement of Arab refugees; the machinery of U.N. intervention.

Bunche said his predecessor, Count Folke Bernadotte who was assassinated September 17, had been unable to get the warring Arabs and Jews together.

Refused to Meet Jews
"The Arab representatives steadfastly refused to meet the Jews because they considered that a tacit

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Dewey Urges Voters Again Support Ball

Minnesota Senator Hit By Over Ripe Tomato At Albert Lea Station After Speech

En Route With Dewey to St. Paul, Oct. 15—(AP)—An over-ripe tomato, hurled from the crowd, struck Sen. Joseph H. Ball (R-Minn) on the shoulder and splattered Mrs. Thomas E. Dewey today at Albert Lea, Minn.

The incident occurred shortly after Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, for Republican presidential nominee, had endorsed Ball's bid for reelection to the Senate in a back platform appearance.

The Dewey campaign train was just pulling out of Albert Lea station when an unidentified person lobbed the tomato from the crowd of 3,500 persons there.

Splatters Mrs. Dewey's Suit
It struck Ball on the shoulder and splattered the black suit worn by Mrs. Dewey, standing nearby.

Besides that Dewey, Senator Ed Thye (R-Minn) and Gov. Luther Youngdahl were on the platform. They were not struck.

Dewey aides said there was no way of knowing at whom the tomato was aimed.

It was the third tomato-throwing incident of the Dewey campaign. One struck the special train at Fort Morgan, Colo., and two were hurled at Dewey earlier in the week at Mt. Vernon, Ill.

Traveling across Minnesota toward St. Paul was a major speech tonight (9:30 p. m. e. s. t.) on foreign and farm topics, Dewey called for the re-election of Ball. The latter is opposed by Minnesota's Democratic Mayor Hubert Humphrey.

Ball, who bolted the Dewey ticket in 1944 to support the late President Roosevelt, joined the Republican presidential campaign train at its first Minnesota stop, Albert Lea.

Endorsement Given
Dewey's endorsement of Ball came in these words to a crowd estimated by police at 3,500 persons when the train paused at Albert Lea:

"I am happy to be here with Joe Ball, whom I most earnestly hope will return to the United States Senate. When the crowd applauded, he added: 'Is that a promise?'"

Dewey praised G.O.P. Leader Harold E. Stassen, former governor of Maine.

European Recovery Costs May Be Cut

Hoffman Expects Reduction Because of Progress Being Made By Countries Aided

Washington, Oct. 15—(AP)—Paul Hoffman said today that next year's European recovery fund may be lower than this year's \$5,055,000,000 because of the progress being made. The economic cooperation administrator told a news conference that he cannot judge the size of needed new ECA funds until the Council of European Countries at Paris has finally drafted its next-year's program.

He added: "I think recovery has gone on in the European countries to the point where we believe it will call for a smaller sum than we had this year."

"What the amount will be, I have no idea," Hoffman also reported failure thus far to gain an agreement with France and Britain on a halt to the dismantling of industrial plants in the western zones of Germany.

Hoffman wants to hold up dismantling of plants until fresh studies are made of whether the best interests of recovery would be served by keeping the plants standing.

The dismantling was undertaken originally as part of the program of seeing that Germany's industrial strength was cut so that Germany could never again become a war threat.

Indicate "No Disagreement"
Hoffman said French Foreign Minister Schuman of France and British Foreign Minister Bevin indicated "no disagreement" with his suggestion that plant dismantling be held up. They simply have not made formal decisions.

Plan to Boost Berlin Ration

Paris, Oct. 15—(AP)—Andrei Y. Vishinsky broke his silence on the Berlin crisis in the Security Council today but only to say he wouldn't debate the issue. The Russian deputy foreign minister spoke up in response to direct questions from Foreign Minister Juan A. Bramuglia of Argentina, acting Council president.

Asks More Information
Bramuglia asked more information on the Berlin blockade at the next Council session and got promises from the United States, Britain and France that they would supply it.

Then Vishinsky arose. He said it was a "very ill" maneuver but that it was "naive to believe the Soviet union will swallow this bait."

The Council adjourned at 5:40 p.m. (11:40 p. m. e. s. t.) until 3 p.m. Tuesday.

Vishinsky repeated his argument of last week that the Berlin dispute belongs in the Big Four Foreign Ministers' council and not the Security Council. For that season, he said, he will continue to refrain from participating in debate on the Berlin question.

The western powers have accused Russia of threatening world peace by their blockade of Berlin, imposed last June 25. They are supplying Berliners of the western zone by air.

Paris de Khoury of Syria and Bramuglia objected to the Russian stand today. Vishinsky's refusal to supply information about Berlin, and the blockade, the six "neutral" nations of the Council had in mind "any questions of double-dealing."

"We solve the questions in a normal fashion," he said. "We think this description of our motives was the result of oratory that got carried away."

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Views Sought On Sales Tax

Barkley Asks Public Statement by Dewey Upon Federal Levy

En Route With Senator Barkley, Oct. 15—(AP)—A public statement of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey on a federal sales tax was sought today by Senator Alben W. Barkley, Democratic vice presidential nominee.

The Kentucky senator demanded a tax expression from Dewey in a speech last night at Enid, Okla.

And he indicated he would renew the demand daily until Dewey replies, starting with three speeches today in Missouri and Kansas.

Says Democrats Opposed
"I asked Governor Dewey," Barkley said, "whether he favors a Federal sales tax. The American people are entitled to know."

Let there be any doubt where the Democrats stand, Barkley told his Enid audience, "we are opposed to a Federal sales tax."

Phone Unions Still Talking

Mutual Agreements Result in Continuing Bargaining on Wages

Washington, Oct. 15—(AP)—Mutual agreements by union and company representatives kept wage boost bargaining going today for many of some 225,000 telephone workers.

A negotiating deadline originally set for last midnight passed without any move toward a possible nationwide phone strike, and the two unions involved indicated they had agreed with Bell system concerns to continue the talks.

The two unions are the independent Communications Workers of America and the CIO American Union of Telephone Workers. The CIO union represents long distance operators.

CWA said many Bell system bargaining deadlines had been extended for from 24 hours to over the week-end. The CIO union, negotiating in New York, said it had obtained time until Monday to act on a new company offer.

No Specific Wage Demands
Neither of the unions has made specific wage increase demands. Bell system offers have ranged up to \$6 a week for top-skilled workers.

Clay Urges Firm Stand

Feels Soviet Expansion Will Recede if West Refuses to Yield

Berlin, Oct. 15—(AP)—Gen. Lucius D. Clay feels "Soviet expansion will not only be halted, it will recede," if the western powers continue their firm stand in Berlin.

The remarks by the American commander in Germany were in a speech made public last night by a responsible source close to Clay.

The speech was made privately Sept. 28 to delegates of the British Parliamentary conference who visited Berlin.

Can Attain Lasting Peace
Clay said lasting peace in Europe could be attained if the western powers refuse to yield to the demands of the Soviet Union.

Views Truman As 'Prisoner'

Wallace Asserts 'Real Masters' Stopped Vinson's Visits to Moscow

Chicago, Oct. 15—(AP)—Henry A. Wallace has a busy week-end of speechmaking.

The third-party presidential candidate is in Chicago tonight. "He is to fly to Dalton, Ga., for an address tomorrow. He has talks scheduled in Detroit and Flint, Mich., on Sunday."

Senator Glen H. Taylor of Idaho, third-party vice presidential candidate, was to join Wallace in his speeches here tonight.

Stopped Vinson Visit
In an address over the ABC network in Milwaukee last night Wallace said President Truman is a "prisoner" of big business and military interests who "clamped down" and stopped the president's plans to send Chief Justice Fred Vinson to Moscow.

Wallace said after he had demanded the resumption of negotiations with Russia two weeks ago the people took up the demand and Mr. Truman "was forced" to assign Vinson to go to Moscow.

Chinese Admit Chihshien Fall

Key Supply Point for Isolated Mukden Captured by Communists

Nanking, Oct. 15—(AP)—The Chinese Defense ministry announced late today that the Communists had captured Chihshien at noon yesterday.

The city of southwestern Manchuria had been the key supply point for isolated Mukden, 125 miles to the northeast.

Shortly before the announcement of its fall after a prolonged Communist siege, reliable sources said Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek had flown to Peiping because of Chihshien's critical situation.

Earlier unofficial reports of Chihshien's fall had been denied.

Afame From Shells
Press accounts said the city was aflame from more than 1,000 artillery shells poured in from the encircling Red lines.

The dispatches reported the Communists had smashed into the city and there was fighting in the streets. This is a bad sign. Such reports, usually precede the announcement of a city's fall.

Observers regard the defense of Chihshien as a decisive test of Chiang Kai-shek's ability to hold well-defended cities. He has just returned from a visit to this front.

Chihshien has been the supporting base for Mukden, 125 miles to the northeast. The two cities and the port of Huludao represent the most important points still held in Manchuria.

Earlier this week pro-government accounts said relief forces were fighting toward the city from both the north and south.

Reports Changwu Captured
The government asserted it had captured Changwu, northeast of Chihshien, and supplies down from northern Manchuria.

Then abruptly the picture changed. Newspaper dispatches spoke of Red shells falling into Chihshien. Then the city, by one press account became "a sea of fire."

Predicts Russia May Fight
Berlin, Oct. 15—(AP)—A U. S. Military government officer has predicted in an official report that Russia may fight rather than compromise in its drive to Sovietize Europe. The report was made by Louis Glazer of Washington, D. C., and Brookline, Mass., when he left recently for the United States after three years as chief of the political affairs branch for U. S. Military government in Berlin.

Colchester, Oct. 15—(AP)—Harry and Edward Levine, proprietors of Levine & Levine Clank Company, have been arrested charged with conspiracy in connection with the state Sunday store closing law. Bench warrants for their arrests on two counts were issued by the New London Superior court. Arresting and investigating officers were Lieutenant Robert Bumble, Sgt.
