Truman Says Dewey Ducks Wages Issue

Asserts Republican Opponent 'Won't Come Out and Say' What Maximum Should Be

Aboard Truman Campaign Train, Oct. 15—(AP)—President Truman declared today Gov. Thomas E. Dewey is "ducking the issue" of a higher minimum wage. Mr. Truman told a crowd of workers at Hammond, Ind., that his Republican opponent "won't come out and say" how much the present 40-cent minimum wage should be raised.

As for himself, the chief executive said, he and the Democratic party proposed to raise it "to at least 75 cents."

In his rear platform talk, the first of a series in Indiana en route to Indianapolis for a major address tonight on "Human extension," the president called for re-election of Rep. Ray J. Madden (D-Ind.) and said Madden's record is "straight, and clean."

"I think Indiana is going to come back where it belongs in the Democratic party," he said.

Former Gov. Henry F. Schricker, now the Democratic nominee for that office, joined Mr. Truman's campaign train at Hammond as did Frank M. McHale, the national committee man, and other party leaders.

Police Chief Anthony J. Stankiewicz estimated 20,000 turned out at Hammond to hear Mr. Truman.

In his Indianapolis address, Mr. Truman will feature his advocacy of Federal aid to education, a national health program, and increased benefits and other proposals he said the 80th Congress has rejected.

The Hammond stop was Mr. Truman's second visit to the first Indiana district.

The president asserted in his Hammond speech that Dewey says he believes in the minimum wage "but I think the smaller the minimum the better the Republicans like it."

Refused to Act on High Prices
He said the 80th Congress, on whose record his opponent "is campaigning," refused to act on high prices.

Apparently he believes that failure to help you meet the rising cost of living was a good thing for the country," Mr. Truman added.

As usual, the chief executive did not call his opponent by name.

At North Judson, Ind., which is in the home district of Rep. Charles A. Halleck, Republican House majority leader, the president was greeted by another large crowd.

Mediator Sees Time Ripe for Settlement

Bunche Believes Both Sides in Palestine Dispute Would Accept Proposal for Peace

Paris, Oct. 15—(AP)—The interim Palestine mediator told the United Nations today the "time is ripe for a settlement" in the Holy Land and he believes both sides would accept a reasonable U.N. proposal for peace.

On both sides there is a desire and a need for peace," Dr. Ralph Bunche told the 58-nation Political committee.

Bunche declared the state of Israel was "a going concern from the day of its birth, and could not be destroyed 'by any means other than force of sufficient strength to completely crush the Jews in Palestine.'"

He said Israel, from the day of its birth on May 15, has been "a vibrant reality."

Can Attain Lasting Peace
Clay said lasting peace in Europe could be attained if the western powers refuse to yield to the demands of the Soviet Union.

He linked the rise of democracy in western Europe directly with the maintenance of the western powers' position in Berlin.

Discussing the Soviet blockade of Berlin, Clay said the western powers tried to buy food from Poland and Czechoslovakia for the besieged former German capital, but were blocked by Russia.

Washington, Oct. 15—(AP)—Mutual agreements by union and company representatives kept wage boost bargaining going for day for many of some 225,000 telephone workers.

Neither of the unions has made specific wage increase demands. Bell system offers have ranged up to \$6 a week for top-skilled workers.

CWA said several of its bargaining groups reached no agreements for continuing negotiations. Under existing contract terms, these groups, including the District of Columbia and Maryland divisions, can cancel their contracts next spring.

Dewey Urges Voters Again Support Ball

Minnesota Senator Hit By Over Ripe Tomato At Albert Lea Station After Speech

En Route With Dewey to St. Paul, Oct. 15—(AP)—An over-ripe tomato, hurled from the crowd, struck Sen. Joseph H. Ball (R-Minn.) on the shoulder and splattered Mrs. Thomas E. Dewey today at Albert Lea, Minn.

The incident occurred shortly after Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, for Republican presidential nominee, had endorsed Ball's bid for re-election to Senate in a back platform appearance.

The Dewey campaign train was just pulling out of Albert Lea station when an unidentified person lobbed the tomato from the crowd of 3,500 persons there.

It struck Ball on the shoulder and splattered the black suit worn by Mrs. Dewey, standing nearby.

Besides that Dewey, Senator Ed Thyne (R-Minn.) and Gov. Luther Youngdahl were on the platform. They were not struck.

Dewey aides said there was no way of knowing at whom the tomato was aimed.

It was the third tomato-throwing incident of the Dewey campaign. One struck the special train at Fort Morgan, Colo., and two were hurled at Dewey earlier in the week at Mt. Vernon, Ill.

Traveling across Minnesota toward St. Paul, a major speech, Ball, 63, said in a major speech tonight (8:30 p. m. e. s. t.) on foreign and farm topics, Dewey called for the re-election of Ball.

The latter is opposed by Minnesota's Democratic Mayor Hubert Humphrey.

Ball, who bolted the Dewey ticket in 1944 to support the late President Roosevelt, joined the Republican presidential campaign train at its first Minnesota stop, Albert Lea.

Endorsement Given
Dewey's endorsement of Ball came in these words to a crowd estimated by police at 3,500 persons when the train paused at Albert Lea:

"I am happy to be here with Joe Ball, whom I most earnestly hope you will return to the United States Senate. When the crowd applauded, he added: 'Is that a promise?'"

Dewey praised G.O.P. Leader Harold E. Stassen, former governor of Maine.

European Recovery Costs May Be Cut

Hoffman Expects Reduction Because of Progress Being Made By Countries Aided

Washington, Oct. 15—(AP)—Paul Hoffman said today that next year's European recovery fund may be lower than this year's \$5,055,000,000 because of the progress being made.

The economic cooperation administrator told a news conference that he cannot judge the size of needed new ECA funds until the Council of European Countries at Paris has finally drafted its next-year's program.

"I think recovery has gone on in the European countries to the point where we believe it will call for a smaller sum than we had this year."

"What the amount will be, I have no idea."

Hoffman also reported failure thus far to gain an agreement with France and Britain on a halt to the dismantling of industrial plants in the western zones of Germany.

Hoffman wants to hold up dismantling of plants until fresh studies are made of whether the best interests of recovery would be served by keeping the plants standing.

The dismantling was undertaken originally as part of the program of seeing that Germany's industrial strength was cut so that Germany could never again become a war threat.

Indicate "No Disagreement"
Hoffman said French Foreign Minister Schuman of France and British Foreign Minister Bevin indicated "no disagreement" with his suggestion that plant dismantling be held up.

Russian Deputy Foreign Minister Breaks Silence in Response To Direct Questions From Bramuglia Today; United States, Britain and France Promise More Data

Paris, Oct. 15—(AP)—Andrei Y. Vishinsky broke his silence on the Berlin crisis in the Security Council today but only to say he wouldn't debate the issue.

Then Vishinsky arose. He said it spoke up in response to direct questions from Foreign Minister Juan A. Bramuglia of Argentina, acting Council president.

Asks More Information
Bramuglia asked more information on the Berlin blockade at the next Council session and got promises from the United States, Britain and France that they would supply it.

The Council adjourned at 5:40 p. m. (11:40 p. m. e. s. t.) until 3 p. m. Tuesday.

Vishinsky repeated his argument of last week that the Berlin dispute belongs in the Big Four Foreign Ministers' council and not the Security Council.

The western powers have accused Russia of threatening world peace by their blockade of Berlin, imposed last June 25.

Paris of Khoury of Syria and Bramuglia objected to the Russian stand today. Vishinsky's refusal to supply information about Berlin and the blockade, the six "neutral" nations of the Council had in mind "any questions of double-dealing."

"We solve the questions in a normal fashion," he said. "I think this description of our motives was the result of oratory that got carried away."

Chinese Admit Chinhsien Fall

Key Supply Point for Isolated Mukden Captured by Communists

Nanking, Oct. 15—(AP)—The Chinese Defense ministry announced late today that the Communists had captured Chinhsien at noon yesterday.

The city of southwestern Manchuria had been the key supply point for isolated Mukden, 125 miles to the northeast.

Shortly before the announcement of its fall after a prolonged Communist siege, reliable sources said Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek had flown to Peiping because of Chinhsien's critical situation.

Earlier unofficial reports of Chinhsien's fall had been denied.

Afame From Shells
Press accounts said the city was aflame from more than 1,000 artillery shells poured in from the encircling Red lines.

The dispatches reported the Communists had smashed into the city and there was fighting in the streets. This is a bad sign. Such reports, usually precede the announcement of a city's fall.

Auto Workers Stay in Plant

Thousand in Bordeaux Barricade Themselves: Hold Manager Hostage

Paris, Oct. 15—(AP)—One thousand Bordeaux auto workers barricaded themselves inside the Georges Irat factory today and refused to leave.

The workers kept the plant manager as a hostage and welded the factory doors shut.

The Communist-led General Confederation of Labor asked other metal workers in the region to show sympathy strikes and ordered the men inside the auto plant to resist arrest.

France's 335,000 coal miners remained off the job for the twelfth day, despite a government expression of confidence yesterday that the Communist-led strike wave was on the wane.

The sit-down strike in Bordeaux came as striking metal workers in the Moselle section of eastern France returned to work.

The word "vehicle" as used herein shall mean any motor vehicle, whether on wheels or runners or otherwise; (b) the word "parking" shall mean the standing of a vehicle whether occupied or not upon a highway otherwise than temporarily for the purpose of and while actually engaged in receiving or discharging passengers or loading or unloading merchandise or when stopped any traffic regulation, traffic sign or signal; (c) the word "operator" shall mean the person operating or in control of a vehicle on a public highway; (d) the words "mechanism having a visible time indicator, a coin receiving and coin actuating device, and a coin return device" shall mean a device designed to be used as a parking meter.
Sec. 2. Whenever the parking of a vehicle on a public highway is such that it obstructs the free flow of traffic, the parking of such vehicle shall be deemed to be a violation of this ordinance.

When any vehicle shall be parked in any parking meter space adjacent to which a parking meter is located, the operator of such vehicle shall park it within the lines or marks established, excepting any vehicle whose length, width or load overlaps the said lines or marks, and upon entering said parking meter space, the operator shall deposit or cause to be deposited in said parking meter such proper coin of the United States as is required by the traffic authority for such parking meter and as is designated by direction on the meter. When requested by direction on the meter, the operator of said vehicle after the deposit of the proper coin shall also completely turn or cause to be turned the crank handle on said parking meter for the purpose of starting the timing mechanism. Failure to deposit such proper coin and to turn the crank handle when so required shall constitute a violation of this ordinance.
Upon the deposit of such proper coin, and placing said meter in operation, the parking meter space may be lawfully occupied by such vehicle during the period of parking time which has been prescribed for the part of the street in which said parking meter space is located. If such vehicle shall remain parked in any such parking meter space beyond the parking time limit fixed for such parking meter space, and if the parking meter shall by its dial and pointer or otherwise indicate such illegal parking, then in that event, any parking overtime and beyond the period of legal parking time shall be deemed a violation of this ordinance.
Sec. 5. It shall be unlawful for any person not so authorized to deface, damage, tamper with, open or willfully break, destroy or impair the usefulness of any parking meter installed under the provisions of this ordinance or of aid or abet in so doing.
Sec. 6. It shall be unlawful for any person to deposit or cause to be deposited in any parking meter additional proper coin of the United States for the purpose of increasing or extending the legal time which has been established by the traffic authority for the parking meter space adjacent to which said parking meter is located.
Sec. 7. Vehicles bearing commercial license plates may occupy


