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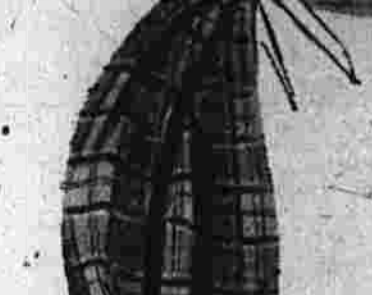

Between 7:00 and 8:00 the various rooms were open for inspection and many children accompanied their parents to point proudly to the worthwhile projects and projects which were on display.

The topic of the speaking program was "Welcome to Our School." Mrs. John Boyce, program chairman, welcomed the parents from the Green school who are proud of the progress of work with the different age levels.

Parents Always Welcome
Miss Esther Granstrom, principal, assured the parents that they are always welcome at the Manchester Green school, for their problems are also those of the school. The teachers are always ready to speak with the parents on any subject concerning the child's welfare. The parents and teachers must cooperate in every possible way when it is a question of understanding the individual child in his particular problems.

Miss Granstrom recalled the definition of a happy home as one where a child can come with a bad report and added further that a good school should be one in which the child can be happy if he doesn't have a "good" report card in the academic sense.

Mrs. Mary Hutchinson, kindergarten teacher, explained how the work of her group is important in helping the new pupil to adjust to the new environment. She spoke of the kindergarten, she said, is to provide a happy, wholesome atmosphere. She told of one small boy who was asked upon his return from the first day at school "What did you learn today?" Advise Youths To Learn Trade
Surveys Show Unskilled Workers Are Last to Obtain Positions

The newly instituted plan of exploratory courses at the Howell Cheney Technical school in cooperation with the Manchester High school is now in its second year of operation. According to the plan, all high school students are urged to enroll as high school students. All high school freshmen boys, regardless of the course they are taking, are required to attend Cheney Tech two double periods each week for trade experiences. Each boy spends one quarter of the school year of nine weeks in each one of the four shops—carpentry, drafting, electric and machine. This arrangement gives the boy an opportunity to discover his like or dislike for a trade and also a general understanding of the four different fields offered at the technical school.

A Cheney Tech memorandum says it is not too early in the school year for eighth grade students and their parents to begin thinking about the opportunities to prepare for one's life work. Many boys will not be able to attend college and prepare for a professional occupation. Surveys prove that many are not able to hold a job because of lack of understanding and preparation for the job while these troubles may have been avoided had he taken advantage of the technical opportunities offered at Cheney Tech.

Besides technical courses, the school offers regular courses in the machine, drafting, carpentry and electrical trades for those boys over 16 years of age who are not now attending school. As a pre-induction course this training program is of much value.

Benefit Claims Drop in State
Total of 21,485 Is Reported for Week Which Ended Oct. 16

Hartford, Oct. 21—(AP)—Total of 21,485 claims for unemployment insurance benefits in Connecticut was reported for the week which ended Oct. 16 by the state Labor department today. It compares with 21,738 for the previous week.

Initial claims rose to 2,108 from 2,026 the week before. There were 1,738 for the previous week. Lay-offs were reported by some factories in the following industries: Hats, dresses, textiles, razors, clocks and brass goods.

The Ansonia office reported a lay-off of 10 by a metal products company due to a materials shortage.

In the Danbury area, several hat shops were on part-time schedules. The Hartford office reported a few small scattered layoffs.

In the Stamford area, a range manufacturer curtailed production and laid off 85.

In the Waterbury area, one clock company laid off 100, another 25, and a brass goods factory 70 due to lack of work.

Top Nominees To Visit State
Wallace, Truman and Dewey All to Appear Within 38 Hours

Hartford, Oct. 21—(AP)—The nation's three top presidential candidates are expected to be in Connecticut bidding for the state's eight electoral votes, within a period of 38 hours next week.

Henry Wallace is due to start the parade of presidential hopefuls on Wednesday, October 27. President Truman will pass through the state next day, and also perhaps visit Hartford on the 27th, and Governor Dewey will follow in the President's footsteps Friday, the 29th.

Schedules Major Address
Wallace is the only one of the trio scheduled to make a major address to a Connecticut audience. His talk in New Haven Wednesday night will be his third appearance in that city in less than a year.

A series of race platform talks at shore towns will be arranged for President Truman, who will be traveling from Boston to New York a week from today. No definite schedule has been announced yet, but stops at New London, New Haven and Bridgeport seemed certain. Norwalk and Stamford are other possibilities.

Rally Silent On Floor
State Democratic leaders were reported also to be working on a plan to bring the President to Hartford by special motorcade from Springfield, Mass., next Wednesday. The party's state chairman, John M. Bailey, wouldn't talk about these reports, nor about the conference he had in New York yesterday with the national chairman, J. Howard McGrath.

Even less is being said about Governor Dewey's plans, but he, too, will be traveling from Boston to New York 24 hours after Mr. Truman follows the same route, and Republican leaders are hopeful he will make a series of appearances.

Seminar Leader At South Church

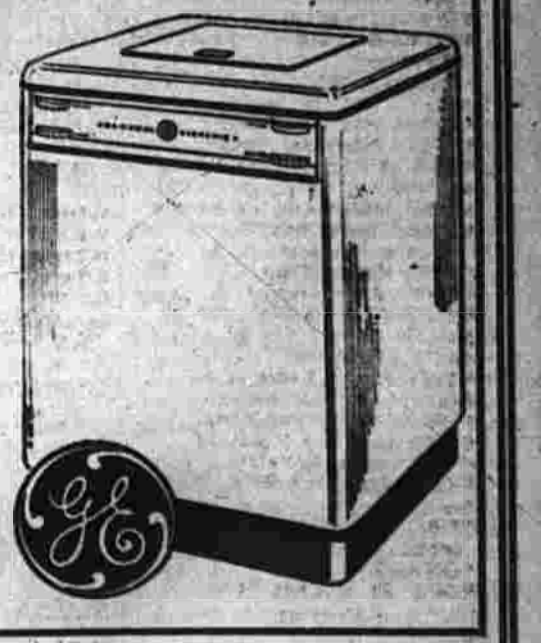

Something To Vote For
 Indications are that the withdrawal of Russian troops from Korea, presumably leaving strong Communist-dominated national political and police forces behind them, is but a rehearsal for an approaching Russian master-stroke—the similar evacuation of Germany.
 Some reports from the Soviet zone in Germany indicate that the Russians are busy making preparations for just such a step—setting up German Communists as political leaders, training German Communists for a strong police force, creating in front of such high preparations, a facade of preparation for German self-government.
 Such preparations complete, the Russians would announce to the world that they were pulling out of Germany, even as they are now pulling out of Korea. And they would march their troops out and back to Russia.
 We say this would be a "master-stroke." And so it would be, bog-trotting the West with embarrassment, and for the following reasons:
 1. The West is supposed to want Russia to withdraw to her own borders.
 2. The withdrawal of armed forces is, on the surface, the first prerequisite of peace.
 3. The Russian withdrawal would threaten to win the heart of all Germany, for if there is one thing all Germans want, it is to get rid of the occupying powers, no matter who they happen to be.
 4. The Russian withdrawal would make it difficult for the West to press its charges of aggression against Russia, even though such aggression might be continuing without the front line aid of Russian armies.
 5. The Russian withdrawal would enable the Russians to pose as a people having enough confidence in their own system and in their own way of life to have it standing alone, on its own feet.
 6. The West, to the contrary, does not dare evacuate Korea or Germany, and does not have confidence that its own way of life can stand on its own feet in a strange country.
 7. The prospective dilemma of the West would, therefore, be this: To remain in Germany and thus take the blame for postponing conditions of peace and also for plotting the virtual annexation of Germany, or to join Russia in getting out of Germany, thus running the risk that all Germany would drift toward Russia anyway. The true embarrassment of this dilemma has to be emphasized: we would be likely to lose Germany both ways, and probably much more likely to lose it if we stayed than if we joined Russia in getting out.
 Now one question must be asked: It is the question of why Russia is in a position to deliver us such a crushing blow of strategic embarrassment. How does it come about that Russia has the power and the opportunity to put us on the horns of such an impossible dilemma?
 The answer is that we are vulnerable to such a dilemma because we have, as Columbus Walker Lippmann keeps lamenting, no clear policy of our own. We do not yet know whether we want to turn the German people into democratic fish or merely anti-Russian fowl. We do not yet know whether we want to disarm Germany or arm Germany. We should be the ones proposing the evacuation of Germany, but we can't make up our minds to it. We should be the ones taking the lead

 It would seem, on the surface of things, that there could be no more notorious practice in all political campaigning than the sly preemption of the contents of an opponent's speech, such as that practiced by the Bowles campaign. It is distinctly not cricket, and it is certainly the crowning injustice of that general party by the Republicans have been warning the state to expect from in the invading hucksters.
 Yet, surprisingly enough, even this perfidy has been surpassed, and is not the worst of its kind. The Bowles camp, after all, practiced its sly tactics on an enemy. It was something much worse, because it was between presumed friends, which distinguished a state campaign not so long ago, between two candidates on the same ticket, the Republican, who now to suspect one another. Each candidate happened to employ his own set of campaign hucksters, and, at the beginning of the campaign, the two candidates and their hucksters made a common sense arrangement for the mutual exchange of their campaign speeches.  Obviously enough, he is just playing around to see if the thing can be done. But if it can be done with non-animal and profitless combinations, the first graft will soon be providing beauty and fragrance for our gardens and fat salivary to the Jap beetle. Is it too much to ask that the first strain of geranium be named "Heraldium?"
