**Town Standard Over Average**

Income and Expenditures Better Than Most Of Cities of Country  
New York, Oct. 22.—(Special)—On the basis of food consumption per capita, Manchester is shown to be a quality market, with a higher standard of living than most cities in the United States. The data is contained in Sales Management's latest copyrighted survey of income and expenditures.

Food purchases in Manchester last year—in recent markets, groceries, delicatessens and the like—came to \$7,324,000. This was at the rate of \$229 for each man, woman and child in the town. The rest of the country, in the period, spent only \$212 per capita.

Manchester residents, because of their better standards of living, tend to spend a larger part of each dollar for food than do people in most cities. Locally, 10 per cent of all retail expenditures were for food.

Food sales in Manchester represent an increase of 24 1/2 per cent over the previous year, taking into account the increase in food, drugs, and other retail categories investigated, general merchandising and other retail categories. Purchases of general merchandise reached a total of \$4,123,000. Dry store buying was at the high level of \$442,000.

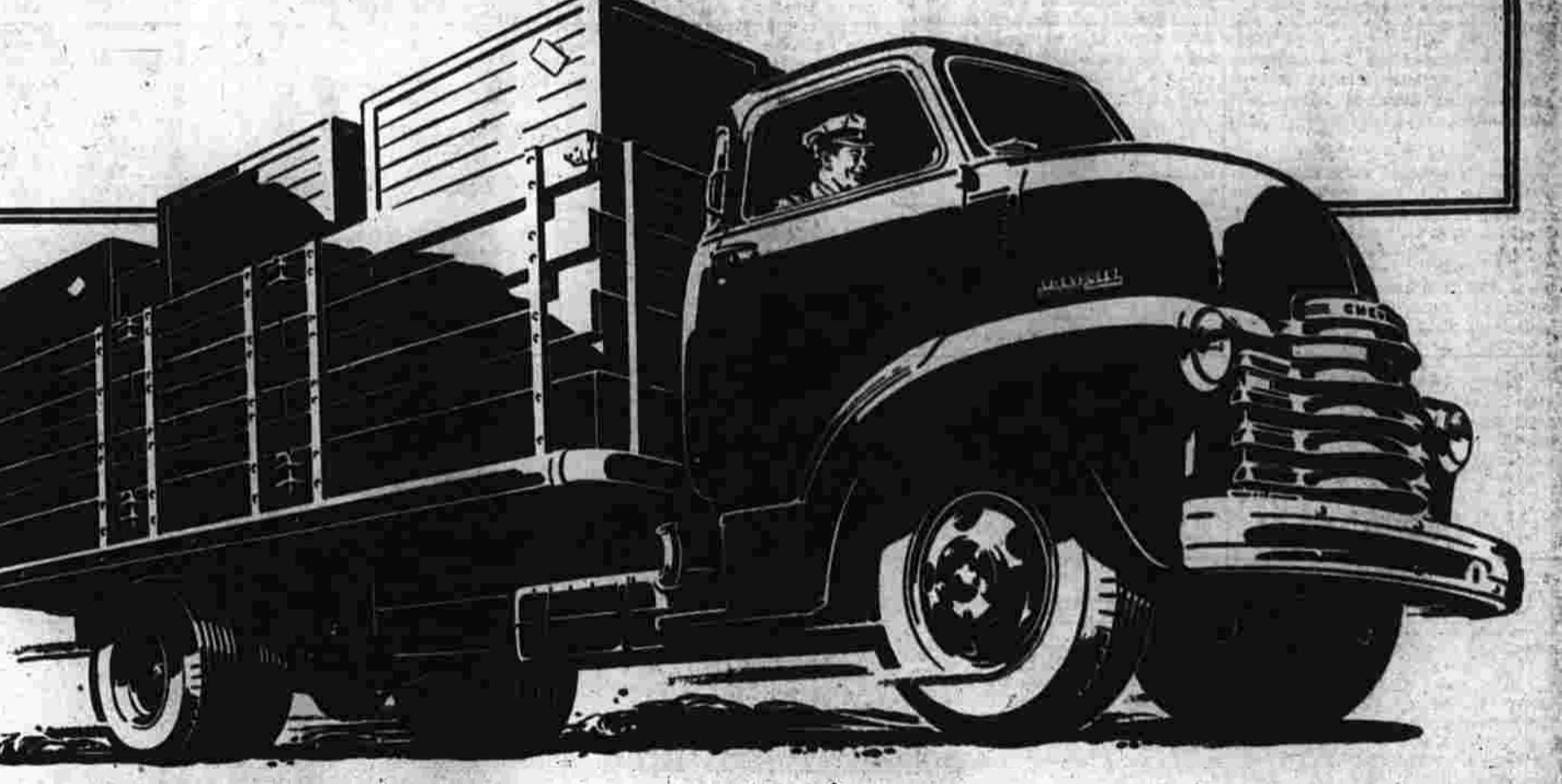
