The government claims he offered his letters to sell second hand rifles to a Wisconsin man, accepted payment and then did not make delivery.

Voting hours previously announced in a legal warning Oct. 19 were from 6 a. m. to 8 p. m. The change was announced today in a new warning upon advice of the secretary of state's office. Town officials explained that the Oct. 19 warning was improperly drawn up.

Miss Yvonne Bordeaux brought suit against the actor, Actress Lela Leeds, Danore Vicki Evans, and Robin Ford, a realtor, for \$2,500. Damages allegedly done to her Laurel canyon home Sept. 1, when the quartet was arrested there on the narcotics charge.

Miss Bordeaux said she had rented the home to Mrs. Virginia Ann Hyland, and did not grant permission for it to be sub-let. She said some of the furniture and walls had been burned and destroyed.

Raises Exceed Living Jumps

Average Salary of Teachers in State Given by Engleman

Hartford, Oct. 27.—(AP)—The average salary of Connecticut teachers rose \$1,200, or 62.3 per cent, between 1941 and 1948, Dr. Pina E. Engleman, state commissioner of education, reported yesterday. The cost of living rose 64.1 in the same period.

The average salary of Connecticut teachers was \$1,841 in 1940-1941 as compared with an average salary of \$2,043 for the 1947-1948 school year.

Dr. Engleman said that the \$2,043 salary today has a buying power of only about \$12 more than the 1940-1941 salary. "In terms of the 1947 dollar," he said, "the \$2,043 salary of 1941 had a buying power of \$1,819.17 in terms of the 1947 dollar. Today's \$2,043 salary has a buying power of \$1,832.05 in terms of the 1947 dollar, he said.

Dr. Engleman said that 123 of Connecticut's towns operated under a salary schedule in the 1947-1948 school year.

Salaries About Equal

He said that 123 of these towns have a "single salary schedule" under which elementary and secondary school teachers' salaries are about equal.

He said that 84 of the state's 85 towns of over 2,500 population have salary schedules and that only one town sets its teachers' salary maximum under \$3,000.

Sixty-four towns have a maximum salary of \$3,000-\$3,500. In 34 towns the maximum salary is over \$4,000 and one town has a maximum of \$4,800 a year, for teachers' salaries.

In 1944-1945, about 73 per cent of the towns set their maximum salaries over \$3,000 and 21 per cent of the towns had maximum teachers' salaries of over \$3,500.

Starting salaries for teachers with four years of training are \$2,500 a year in four towns, \$2,400 a year in 17 towns, \$2,200 in 21 towns and \$2,000 in 26 towns. There are towns of over 2,500 population each.

Truman Destroys A Candidate

As we hope our readers have sensed over the years, we would rather campaign for some one than try to tear the hide off his opponent. Candidates are, for the most part, decent human beings, usually trying, by their own best lights, to fight for things they think are right.

To be specific, the man named Harry Truman is a human being, neither better nor worse than a good many average Americans. If he sometimes seems worse, that is probably because he has been asked to be President, as the rest of us have not been asked. And Truman, as he is engaged in the certain of a campaign, has a certain measure of stoniness and conviction with which he tells himself that he is fighting a good fight for something true and important. Furthermore, it is possible that, for the moment, he himself does not realize how far he has strayed from such moorings. Perhaps we should remember that he will be a better American after he is elected than he is now, when he is behaving with political desperation.

But, all this charity in mind, President Truman has now swung into one last desperate effort, to alter the election, and would-be intelligent voters ought to take a look at it. The most partisan part in the world could derive no more devastating an attack upon President Truman than he himself has delivered against himself, in the words he himself is now speaking.

All Chicago Monday night, President Truman struck the keynote for the last week of his own effort to retain the Presidency. Let his own words reveal the price he and his campaign advisers are willing to pay for the Presidency:

"The American way of life which most of us have taken for granted is threatened today by powerful forces which most people are not even aware of. It happened in Italy twenty-five years ago. It happened in Germany fifteen years ago. It happened in Czechoslovakia a few months ago. And it could happen here.

"What are these forces that threaten our way of life? Who are the men behind them? They are the men who want to see isolation continue unchecked. They are the men who are striving to concentrate great economic power in their own hands. They are the men who are stirring up racial and religious prejudice against some of our fellow-Americans. I propose to attack in simple, unmistakable language, just exactly how each of these three groups of men—working through the Republican party—is a serious threat to the future welfare of this nation....

"When a few men get control of the economy of a nation they find a 'front man' to run the country for them. Before Hitler came to power control over the German economy had passed into the hands of a small group of big manufacturers, bankers and land owners.

"These men decided that Germany had to have a tough, ruthless dictator who would play their game and crush the strong German labor unions. So they put money and influence behind Adolf Hitler. We know the rest of the story.

"We also know that in Italy, in the Nineteen Twenties, powerful Italian businessmen backed Mussolini and that in the Nineteen Thirties Japanese financiers helped Toy's military clique take over Japan.

Shannon Hits Truman; Sales Levy Attacked

Entire Federal Administration Lashed by Governor; Bowles Also Assails Legislature

By The Associated Press

President Truman's coming to Connecticut today has been greeted by a lashing attack by Gov. James G. Shannon on the entire Federal administration.

And while the governor was attacking the Federal administration, Chester Bowles, his Democratic rival, was hammering away on a state level, assailing the state sales tax and what he called the "gripping committee" of Republicans which "laid the 1947 Legislature wide to rest."

The governor labeled the high cost of living in Connecticut "a disgrace" and again stressed his campaign stand that high prices are a national and not a state issue. He also criticized the "so-called Federal payroll which has created a bureaucracy that grows and grows and grows."

Gov. Bowles' stand on high prices, Shannon said, "is a plan to lower prices. Such a scheme—and it is a scheme—failed in Detroit and failed again in Newburgh. My opponent knows as well as I do that the real answer lies in Washington."

Bowles charged in a radio broadcast that the state sales tax was "railroaded through the General Assembly without the slightest formality of an open discussion."

"It is time we laid down a policy whereby our legislature acts in the interests of Connecticut and not just for the Republican party," Bowles asserted. "The General Assembly is no precinct caucus, nor are our government posts something which were invented to pension off political retainers."

Appearing on the same broadcast with Bowles were Democratic State Senate Minority Leader Alfred P. Wechsler and House Minority Leader John P. Collier.

Wechsler charged Shannon with "audaciously refraining from telling the people that the sales tax will be raised from 2 to 2 1/2 per cent next July," adding the charge that the Republicans have "quietly decided to retain the tax permanently, as long as the Republican machine can stay in power."

Bowles claimed that State Republican Chairman Harold E. Mitchell was a member of the Screening committee of the 1947 General Assembly. He charged that the committee was a "fine example of how the Republican bosses, and not the votes of the people of Connecticut, told the Legislature what to do."

Both Truman and Bowles found another backer in William F. Hattie, who since 1940 has been the first Negro governor of the Virgin Islands. Hattie, speaking at Hartford, said President Truman's

Hartford VA Regional Office, explained today that if the veteran dies without naming a beneficiary to his NSLI, the insurance will be paid in a lump sum to the veteran's estate.
