Moscow, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Prime Minister Stalin accused the United States, Britain and the so-called neutral states of the United Nations Security Council today of supporting a policy which could lead to the "unmaking of a new war."

The Soviet leader added, however, that the present international crisis "can only end in an agreement on the part of the instigators of a new war."

Stalin answered a series of questions put to him by a reporter of Pravda, the Communist party newspaper, on the Berlin Cominform.

The prime minister criticized the "policy of support to a policy of aggression to a policy of unmaking of a new war."

The instigators of the aggression, he said, are the United States, Britain and the so-called neutral states of the United Nations Security Council.

Storm Swooper Soon For Procter Road

Three Survive Plane's Crash

Two Other Crew Members Killed as Cargo Aircraft Is Wrecked

St. Paul, Minn., Oct. 28.—(AP)—Three survivors of a Northwest Airlines cargo plane that crashed and burned last night, killing two other crew members, were hospitalized today at Edmondston, Alberta.

NWA identified the injured, all of Minneapolis, as Co-Pilot Harry W. Upham, 32, Rapid Operator Nicholas Tangredi, 23, and Navigator Harold N. Learned, 32.

Killed in the crash were Capt. Ben Christian, 34, Minneapolis, and Flight Mechanic Henry Kryk, 23, of St. Paul.

Officials said they had no information as to the cause of the crash. The plane, a DC-4, cleared Wold-Chamberlain field here Wednesday morning. It left the Edmondston air field shortly before 6 a. m. (G.M.T.) and the control tower there lost radio contact a few minutes later. Residents of the area said they saw the ship crash and burn, about 35 miles north of Edmondston. The plane was bound for Anchorage, Alaska.

To Safeguard Elderly Man His "Castle" Here Is Razed

Steps were taken here yesterday and today to destroy a man's castle. To the observer, the spot in question might appear to be a shack, but it held enough appeal for one elderly man to draw him back to it so repeatedly that it has been ordered destroyed.

The place in question is located on Congress street. It was razed down yesterday and will be burned up today in a practice fire drill by the Manchester Fire department.

According to those familiar with the story, the shack had been occupied by an elderly man who lacked means of self-support. He was, accordingly, given state aid and sent to the almshouse. But he refused to stay. For one reason or another, after a brief stay at the town farm, he would leave and go back to his private castle. The town and state did not feel that they could be responsible for him at his age under the conditions he chose and after some months of the "in again, out again" procedure, it was decided that the shack, which he held by squatter's rights only, might be demolished. The property owner agreed.

No yesterday equipment was moved in to demolish the rickety building. Today it is slated to be burned.

Maybe the former occupant will now stay put at the almshouse, or maybe he will find himself another private jungle.

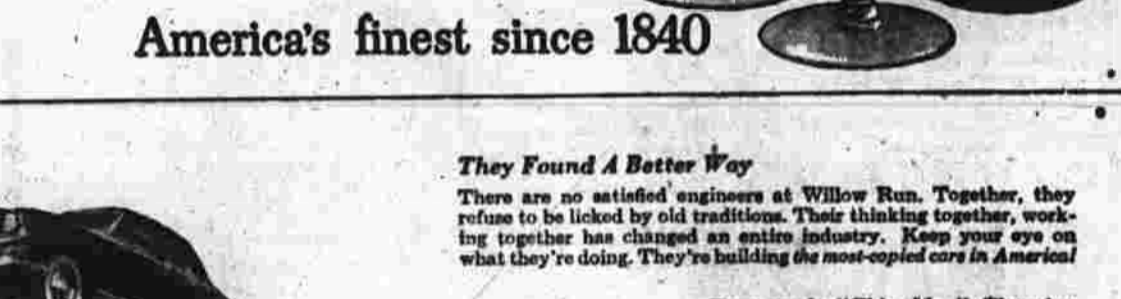

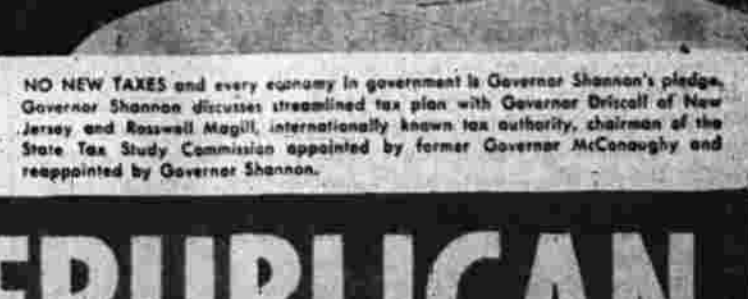
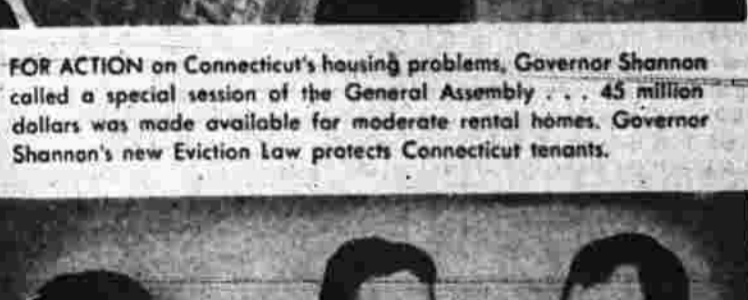

Democratic Strength Matter of Viewpoint

Bowles Asserts Party Stronger Than Ever; Shannon Sees Only Collection of Pieces

By The Associated Press
Depending on which side of the fence you live, the Democratic party is either stronger than ever has been in history or is concerned about its future.

Chester Bowles, the Democratic gubernatorial nominee, told a Watery audience last night that the party, stronger than it ever was, is a "solid and liberal party, now, with strength and vitality."

Republican Gov. James C. Shannon, however, broadcast an invitation to "real Democrats" to support him because he would not blame them for "being concerned about their party."

Shannon charged Bowles with wanting to "renew Connecticut, according to a new pattern or design."

He said the old Democratic party no longer existed in Connecticut "any more than there is a national Democratic party."

In Connecticut, he said, there is only a collection of fragments, of warring groups, of rival factions, of diverse ideologies ranging from "ultra-right to ultra-left."

"Do not blame real Democrats in Connecticut for feeling deep concern over the state situation in the party. I do not blame real Democrats in Connecticut for feeling that their party is now being led into unfamiliar paths."

To them, the Republican party in Connecticut this year offers a platform of sane liberalism. It offers a continuation of the sound, sane liberal policies that have served us so well. It offers the only hope of the kind of ideal state that we want our children to grow up in.

Republicans at Heart
Bowles said the Democratic party finally had rid itself of the Democrats and the Hibbs who, he said, were Republicans at heart.

He assailed as "chaotic" the record of the Republicans during the present campaign, maintaining they have avoided positive answers to the issues of the campaign.

The attacked the G.O.P. stand on the housing problem. He said that when he had described his plan to construct 56,000 homes in the next seven years to the Republicans through bond issues, the Republicans said that the 4,000 homes being built in Connecticut in the next five years were all that could be done in that state.

Later, Bowles said the Republicans changed their tactics and claimed there "really is no housing shortage" that will not "vanish in a year."

There has been no reorganization of the state government since 1885, Bowles declared. He added he felt a great deal could be done to operate the state more efficiently.

The establishment of a Public Works department which would draw up future plans for development of the state would place Connecticut in the forefront when Federal funds are made available for improvement projects, Bowles asserted.

He emphasized that that does not mean there will be a depression. The answer of the Republicans is that a depression is inevitable.

Albion also charged that Wallace had expressed admiration for Bowles at various times, and he also added:

"And don't you have, as an important member of your campaign staff, a former business associate and present friend and admirer of Henry Wallace? His own reputation of radical support stopped at the door of your own headquarters? Naturally all of these things make us pause—make us wonder—how many appointments from the Wallaces and pink and radicals you would make—indeed you would have to make—if you become governor of Connecticut."
