Settled by that over-whelmingly Republican body but he kept hammering at the point in his campaign address.

Republicans contended they had done much for housing and that prices were a national matter but Bowles insisted both could be dealt with on state levels.

Bowles won despite the fact that two years ago he lost the Democratic nomination and the additional fact that he was on the verge of abandoning his candidacy in favor of another just prior to the convention last summer which nominated him.

Descendant of a family which helped settle Massachusetts by colony in 1632, and a native of Massachusetts, himself, Bowles has lived in Connecticut since 1925, when he moved with his family to Saybrook. Later he took up residence in Essex where his spacious home overlooks a big bend in the Connecticut river.

Grandson of Samuel Bowles, who founded The Springfield Republican in 1841, Bowles entered the advertising business via the newspaper vocation, but quit The Republican after a few months when, he says, he found himself "surrounded by too many cousins."

**Dewey Gains State Support; Bowles Winner**

160 municipalities had reported the gubernatorial race. The victory to Bowles by about 2,300 votes, smallest gubernatorial margin since 1924 when Raymond S. Baldwin, Republican, now a United States senator, won the state office by 2,588 votes.

The 47-year-old Bowles, wealthy advertising executive, defeated the Republican incumbent, Gov. James Shannon, by winning the governorship for Democrats for the first time since 1940.

The unofficial vote was Bowles, 431,283; Shannon, 428,983.

Although the Progressive party forces of Henry A. Wallace polled a comparatively negligible vote—less than 14,600 for president—their ballots appeared the decisive factor in Bowles' victory.

Wallace ran as one of Truman's rivals. The Progressives, who called themselves the People's party in the state, withdrew their candidate in Bowles' favor, however, despite the latter's repeated protestations that he did not support or want the Wallaceesque support.

The largest number of voters ever to vote in a Connecticut election was the final results of a very scrambled appearance as a result of extensive ticket splitting.

Other than the presidential and gubernatorial in statewide races, the unofficial tabulations gave victories to Democrats for lieutenant governor, secretary of the state, and comptroller; while Republicans were elected as congressman-at-large and state treasurer.

Of the six Republican House members in Congress elected two years ago when Republicans won the state with pluralities of upwards of 60,000, only Rep. John Davis Lodge in the Fourth district, James T. Patterson in the Fifth, and Antoni X. Sadiak, at large, survived.

Electing with them were Democratic nominees Abraham A. Ribicoff, who defeated Rep. William J. Miller in the First; Mrs. Chase Going Woodhouse, who beat Rep. Horace Selye-Brown in the Second; and John A. McGuire, who ousted Rep. Ellsworth B. Foote in the Third.

Besides Bowles, democrats elected to state offices were William F. Carroll, lieutenant governor; Mrs. Winifred McDonald, secretary of the state; and Raymond S. Thatcher, state comptroller.

The vote Republican incumbent to retain a state office was State Treasurer Joseph A. Adorno. He defeated Henry J. Gwiazda 33,223 to 430,066.

In giving back to Democrats much of ground they lost in 1940,

John J. Thornton. At that time Murphy got scarcely more than half the votes brought in by LaBelle—4,566 to 4,687 for Thornton. The high mark then was William J. Shaw, topped all with 4,831, since called to the Superior Court bench.

Nearly a "landslide" was the result in Manchester, where the Democratic rival was the closest thing to a "landslide" in the local election. It had been expected that Dewey would win handily, but he ran ahead of the whole slate showed he had wide support from Democrats and independents with held from New York.

High School Poll Off

The returns from the high school poll, while it was upheld in the presidential race, was not the track on Bowles. The reason for this was varied, but here it was held that the Bowles campaign for additional old age assistance, low rental housing and by well, and this impression proved to be well-grounded. Even Wallace and McGivney vote went to help Truman in Manchester. The Democratic vote still had trailed the Dewey-Warren combination by 448 votes. McGivney himself, striking out for governor, received only 135, while his presidential ticket, Socialists Thomas and Smith got 54.

Big Interest in Question

On the World Government question, Manchester voters gave 5,087 yes votes and only 10 no votes. Interest than had been figured on.

One thing they demonstrated one thing beyond doubt. Local citizens know who they want to elect for, and how to split their tickets to achieve their desire. There were, during the election, a "grit" vote necessitating assistance from moderators, but the voters presently realized their wishes and made their choices.

The Socialist Labor Party and the Socialist Workers Party got scant notice in town, amounting to the interest of less than 10 persons for a few candidates, and none for others.

Congressional Contest

In the First District congressional race, Manchester gave Republican William J. Miller 7,458 votes for Judge Ribicoff, the Democratic opponent.

The victory of Wallace for Judge of probate was approximately gratifying to large numbers of Republicans and similarly the success of John D. LaBelle for the general assembly aroused many Democratic voters. LaBelle had previously run within 700 votes of Judge Wallace's Communist vote of board of directors, and now stands as the second Manchester representative of his party to serve in Hartford. In 1938, during the Roosevelt years Democrat Edward J. Murphy by only 8 votes won over his Republican rival William J. Miller.

continue, here's about how the new Congress will look:

**Senate**  
 Democrats—54 seats.  
 Republicans—42 seats.  
 The G. O. P. now control the Senate 51 to 45.

**House**  
 Democrats—229 seats.  
 Republicans—205 seats.  
 American Labor party—1.  
 (The G. O. P. controls the 80th Congress House 243 to 183—with two American Labor members and five vacancies.)

Up to 8:45 a. m. (e. s. t.), the Democrats already had turned out six Republican senators in winning 18 of the 33 contested seats. They led in six other races. Republicans had elected only seven and were leading in two races. Only one third of the Senate's 80 members had elections this year.

**Out 49 Republicans**  
 In the battle royal for supremacy in the House—the chamber the Republicans were sure they couldn't lose—Democrats had ousted 40 or more Republicans and one American Labor party member, Rep. Leo Isaacson of New York. Not one Democrat who stood

for reelection had been turned down.  
 Among other personalities, Rep. Harold Knutson of Minnesota, author of last year's Republican tax-cutting bill, was trailing in his Minnesota election. He is chairman of the House Ways and Means committee.  
 Rep. Fred Hartley (R., N. J.), co-author of the Taft-Hartley labor act, did not stand for reelection. His district elected a Democrat, Charles A. Eaton (N. H.).  
 But House Speaker Joseph W. Martin, Jr., of Massachusetts, and other Republican big wheels in the House survived the Democratic onslaught. These included the Republican leader, Rep. Charles A. McNary of Indiana, Chairman John Taber (N. Y.) of the Appropriations committee, Chairman Charles A. Eaton (N. J.) of the Foreign Affairs committee, Chairman Leo E. Allen (Ill.) of the Rules committee, Chairman Jesse P. Wolcott (Mich.) of the Banking committee and Chairman Clifford R. Hope (Iowa) of the Agriculture committee.

More than the chairmanships were at stake. The party in control also holds a majority of the committee memberships.  
 With this machinery, if the Democrats stick together, they could say with finality what legis-

lation would be considered and what would be passed.  
 Condensed Republicans entered the Senate contests with 91 seats, of which only 18 were at stake this year. Most G. O. P. leaders expected to retain their six seats in margin or at worst end in a tie with the Democrats.

 By Margin of Only About 255 Votes; Vote in Detail

Rockville, Nov. 3.—(Special)—The Town of Vernon went Democratic in Tuesday's election, all of the Democratic candidates being elected by a margin of about 255 votes.

Thomas F. Rader, Jr., editor of the Rockville Leader, was elected judge of probate for the Ellington District which comprises both Ellington and Vernon, winning out over the present Judge of Probate Nelson C. Mead, Republican. In Ellington Mead received 733 votes and Rader 696, but in Vernon, Rader received 270 votes while Mead received only 237 votes. Rader, a lead of 27 votes over Mead. For Representative Maurice J. Sturling received 2542 votes, William Dunlap, 2454, both Democrats, with the Republican candidate receiving Attorney Harry R. Lugs, 2026; George C. Roberts, 2158.

was captured, or were leaning to State's Rights Candidate J. Strom Thurmond.

James Hagerly, Dewey's press secretary announced that Dewey had conceded the election in a telegram to Mr. Truman.

The last Republican hope that Dewey might hold out Truman in the electoral vote even though he was trailing well behind in popular balloting, apparently faded with the news that Truman had won in front that state.

At the time Dewey conceded, Truman was leading in or had won the following states: Arizona, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Illinois, Iowa, Kentucky, Maine, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, Rhode Island, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia, Wisconsin, Wyoming.

Thurmond was in front in four states having a total of 28 electoral votes. He had won Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana, and was leading in Louisiana.

To Return to Washington Mr. Truman plans to return to Washington from Independence, Mo., tomorrow, then go to Key West, Fla., Sunday, according to Dewey who has been in touch with his Kansas City headquarters.

Even before the president's victory was assured, the return had clinched Democratic control of Congress, wresting it away from the Republicans who won it two years ago.

The indicated congressional lineup is: Senate: 54 Democrats and 42 Republicans; House: 246 Democrats; 183 Republicans, and one American-Labor.

While these may not be the final figures, it is clear that Mr. Truman will have a working majority of his own party in Congress.

This majority he can submit the legislative program over which he and the O. P.-type Congress quarreled—quarrel so much that Mr. Truman called Congress "idiots" and the "second worst" in history.

Program Prepared This program included power to put on price controls, housing legislation, and the so-called "civil rights" measures which led many southern Democrats to break with Mr. Truman.

Among the civil rights proposals was a law against race segregation on trains and buses crossing state lines, against making a voter pay a poll tax before he can ballot in Federal elections, making lynching a Federal crime, and forbidding an employer to discriminate because of race or religious belief when he hires a workman.

For Mr. Truman, the win was a tremendous personal achievement. With a fighting campaign, the man from Missouri raised his party from dependence and loss in 1946 to victory which almost all its leaders except the president himself had written off months ago as an impossibility.

Indications are that Senator Robert W. La Follette, Ill., will succeed to the job as majority leader.

From John Foster Dulles in Paris came an assertion that the outcome of the election would mean a new bi-partisan foreign policy.

Dulles, Dewey's foreign affairs adviser, told reporters we shall go along in our bi-partisan way.

But a victorious Truman will certainly have more to say about the shaping of foreign policy than he appears to have had in the past.

And the president may have some political enemies in the future on the advice of many Democratic office-holders who were members of the Truman cabinet.

Mr. Truman's chief lobbyist, Labor Maurice Tobin and Secretary of Agriculture Charles Brannan.

The deponents figure these two men, however, are in a position to be "doubtful" of continuing as members of the administration family.
