No basis for Agreement

The Russian demanded that the delegates approve the Soviet plan for atomic control. He showed that there is no basis for agreement between the western and Russian plans.

He charged that the United States does not want atomic control and that the British plan is a "stunning maneuver" designed to wreck any control.

The western plan, approved by a majority of the Assembly's atomic committee, is based on proposals made on June 14, 1946, by Bernard M. Baruch, then the U.S. delegate to the U.N. Atomic Energy Commission.

Viskinski spoke nearly 90 minutes. After the rest room he received a burst of applause from the floor.

Mrs. Vijayalakshmi Pandit, chief Indian delegate and ambassador to Moscow, told the delegates after Viskinski spoke that India could not agree to international control of atomic materials while in private hands.

Proposed Amendment

Mrs. Pandit proposed an amendment to the western proposal. The majority of the 88 nations in committee has favored approving the western plan as drawn up by the majority of the 11-nation Atomic Commission.

Her amendment proposed that the Assembly "approve in substance" the majority report, India's proposal.

Chortle Over Election News

Western Europeans See Uninterrupted Continuation of Dollar Aid

By The Associated Press. Newspapers and radio commentaries throughout western Europe chortled today as they related the news of President Truman's election victory.

Alarmed, unanimously they declared the unexpected Democratic party victory means the uninterrupted continuation of dollar aid and all-out support of the anti-Communist Truman doctrine.

Getting New Picture. Above and beyond that, the people of western Europe are getting a new picture of the president as a man. They are being told he is going to out-Roosevelt Franklin D. Roosevelt in the world, the late president was the greatest American in the world to Europeans.

Even Communist newspapers found it difficult to strike a sour note. The Communist line as reflected in party newspapers in Britain, France and Germany, is that Mr. Truman won because he was "stronger."

Therefore, the London Daily Worker said, the winning Democratic vote "is proof of the mass desire for peace and social progress."

Laugh At Poll-Takers. Most of the other British newspapers laughed at the discomfiture of poll-takers, voiced relief that Washington would not have to undergo a changeover, and waxed almost lyrical in praise of Truman's personal fighting qualities.

From other European countries came very similar expressions. Almost everywhere, the news was said to be the best Mr. Truman could have wished for.

Roach Name Concluded. The right, left and center reached this same conclusion in different approaches.

The right stressed his anti-Communist stand and the crushing defeat of Wallace. The default press of France found "joy" in what it termed "a defeat but a rout in all its magnitude" of Kremlin supporters.

Italy's extreme left press said "the Americans voted for the party that knew best how to proceed itself as the defender of peace."

Middle-of-the-road Belgian and Norwegian newspapers found satisfaction in the assurance American foreign policy will be continued; that the movement from isolationism had been ratified by the people.

Labor's Part Seen Important. Socialist newspapers in other countries attached great importance to labor's part in the Democratic victory.

Berlin's papers said this "may well make possible a clearer picture in the interests of the working population."

The phrase "victory of the common man" cropped up often. Government leaders hastened to send their congratulations to Mr. Truman.

In eastern Europe, there was a different tone. The small vote for Wallace created consternation among people who had been told the Progressive party would make a strong showing.

Children of Moscow asked, "why wasn't Wallace elected?" Budapest newspapers, forestalling similar questions, pointed out that "tens of millions" abstained from voting because they were "uninterested, being aware that in consequence of terror and fraud, Wallace had no chance this time."

Good Reason to Vote Liberal. In Canada, Acting Prime Minister Louis St. Laurent, pointed to President Truman's victory as a good reason why his Liberal government should be returned for a fourth consecutive time.

Australian newspapers devoted more space to the election than any other news item of the year. They summed up the result as a

See Stronger American Role

United Nations Circles Predict Strengthening As Election Result

Paris, Nov. 4.—United Nations circles today predicted prompt strengthening of America's predominant role in world affairs as a result of President Truman's return to office.

While both the American and foreign delegations here still sought to secure their surprise at the election news and its implications, several principal factors emerged:

There will be no waiting period before a presidential inauguration office.

Furthermore, the president in the future can count on support from his party in both houses of Congress. The position of the American government thus is fixed firmly for at least the next two years.

The United States' bi-partisan foreign policy is being strengthened. All comment toward the President and Republican foreign affairs members noted that Governor Dewey himself also emphasized this point.

These factors are expected to result almost immediately in the production of a more self-confident American delegation.

A one word comment by Russian Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei A. Vishinskiy—"Amazing!"—remained the reaction of nearly all U.N. leaders as the scope of Mr. Truman's victory became apparent.

The victory of avowed internationalists in Illinois and Minnesota also drew the attention of delegates at Harvard and a number of American politicians on world affairs.

Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, a U.N. delegate, termed the election result a demonstration of how labor can organize to get out the vote.
