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Israel Retains Negeb Control
Refuses to Order All Armed Forces Out of Contested Desert Area
Tel Aviv, Israel, Nov. 13.—Israel retained control of the Negeb desert today, the deadline set by the United Nations for withdrawal of troops to positions occupied before last month's fighting in the area.
After a lengthy cabinet session yesterday, Israel announced it would not order all its armed forces out of the Negeb.
The government statement added, however, that all troops which entered the area after Oct. 14 had been withdrawn. This left only forces which the Jews said they had taken into the area since May 15.

### Hospital Fees Are Increased

**High Cost of Materials And Higher Payrolls Given as the Cause**

On June 1 of this year the Board of Trustees of the Manchester Memorial Hospital announced a slight increase in hospital charges, but due to further increased costs this has proven to be inadequate. Therefore, it becomes necessary to increase rates in the amount of \$1.75 per day for all adult and children's beds at the main hospital and 50 cents per day at the hospital Annex, effective December 1.

As a matter of fact, the high cost of materials, increased payrolls and inflated prices in general have reached the point where the hospital's ability to make a profit is being threatened. It is expected that the hospital's deficit for 1948 will reach approximately \$100,000.

Just as in the home, everything the hospital buys today costs a great deal more. Foods that cost \$1.50 to feed a patient in 1941 cost \$2.15 today. X-ray machines, laboratory equipment and general supplies have increased in cost tremendously. Shoes, soap, gauze and cotton products all cost a great deal more. The new water jet drugs that save so many lives are a major item on the bigger hospital bills of today.

The hospital has had to raise wages and salaries in order to secure the best technical and other personnel to adequately care for its patients. The hospital payroll costs have doubled since 1941 and the hours of work have been shortened because before the war hospital employees worked long hours for relatively low pay.

Hospital employees are now paid wages and salaries comparable to those of other fields, and so it should be. Certainly, the person who must work to save a life is entitled to adequate compensation. It is the responsibility of Manchester Memorial to insure the health of all those who live in the community and who open 24 hours a day, 365 days a year with three shifts of personnel each day dedicated to the purpose of caring for the sick and injured in necessary and expensive and it now costs the hospital more than twice as much to

care for a patient than it did in 1941.

Community institutions like the Manchester Memorial is a community institution with the sole purpose of helping all those who need it and no one makes or can make a profit from the operation of the hospital. Charges are set to pay no more than the actual costs of operation.

Offsetting the rate increase is an interesting comparison made at Manchester Memorial. Fifty years ago the average stay of a patient admitted to a hospital was 30 days at an approximate cost of \$3.00 per day to the patient. The average stay during 1947 at Manchester Memorial was eight days. The average patient paid \$111.11 per day. Therefore, the cost to the patient in the year 1900 was 30 days at \$3.00 per day, total cost \$111.11 to equal \$88.88. The average patient, due to the advances made in medical science and ad-

### Fail to Collect In Blaze Suit

**Three Derby Residents Allege Utility Company Was Responsible**

New Haven, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Three Derby residents have failed in their attempt to collect \$50,000 damages from the Derby Gas and Electric company which they alleged was responsible for a fire that damaged their property.

Judge John M. Conley of the superior court entered a non-suit in the case yesterday. The plaintiffs were Gustavo and Louisa Velasco, owners of a two family house and garage at 106 Derby avenue, Derby, and Michael Velasco, tenant and occupant of the garage.

Claim Company Negligent

They claimed that the fire which damaged their property on March 10, 1946, spread from gas company property, and that the gas company was negligent because it had permitted the growth of tall grass and weeds through which the fire spread.

The gas company claimed that the Velascos had surrounded their own property with various sorts of combustible material and that they were guilty of contributory negligence.

The Velascos also had sued the Birmingham Water company on the ground that water pressure at the time of the fire was insufficient to combat the blaze properly, but they withdrew this suit on March 11, 1947.

### Sure State Would Back Funds Curb

Hartford, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Chairman John Mears of the Connecticut Highway Users conference expressed confidence today that the Connecticut legislature would approve an anti-diversion highway fund amendment it allowed to vote on one.

Such an amendment was approved five to one by Massachusetts voters at the recent elections, said Mears.

"Given a similar opportunity," he said in a statement, "our people would not let Connecticut lag behind Massachusetts or any other state."

Repeated attempts to have such a proposal submitted to the Connecticut legislature have been defeated in the Legislature. The amendment would restrict use of motor vehicles revenue to highway purposes.

**Modernize Quicks Recorded**

Weston, Mass., Nov. 19.—(AP)—A moderate earthquake was recorded at the Boston College Seismograph station at 8:11:07 p. m. (e.s.t.) yesterday. The East Dan Linehan, S. J., estimated the disturbance at 2.15 miles from Boston, probably in Central America near Costa Rica.

### Town's Financial Report Shows \$1,700,272 Balance

According to the official statement of expenditures compared with appropriations of the Town of Manchester as of November 15, \$1,700,272 balance has been accumulated by the fiscal year which started August 15. This far has been \$127,777, leaving out of the total \$2,128,000.25 appropriation, an unexpended balance of \$1,700,272.36.

This early in the year, except for some unusual drain, the standing of appropriations would normally show no special depletions outside of regular operating costs, and a good balance exists in all accounts the report shows.

Public Works Item

In the public works item, which includes highways, cemeteries, garbage collection, public buildings and allied administration, the \$429,261 appropriation has been diminished by \$94,424.48 expenditures to date. General government, including administration and departmental staffs has \$77,062.51 left out of an original \$103,013.

Police standing with \$128,261.48 have \$95,772.53 left and recreation and parks standing with \$104,183 have \$59,574.31 remaining.

The education appropriation of \$944,800 still has \$726,559.97 to go, while courts with \$15,200 appropriated have spent \$3,781.13. Other smaller items are in similar good balance positions.

### River Highway Drive Starts

East Haddam, Nov. 19.—(AP)—The newly organized Connecticut River Valley association has undertaken the task of leading a drive for the construction of a Connecticut river scenic highway.

Nearly 100 valley residents, including selectmen, state representatives and members of the East Haddam Rotary club, organized the group last night. They immediately began conducting methods to forward their proposal for a special Hartford to Baybrook highway.

Propose Differing Ideas

Two differing ideas about the proposed highway were presented by the principal speakers, George C. Waldo, Jr., chairman of the State Parks and Forest commission, urged a scenic parkway similar to the Merritt parkway as a long range goal.

State Highway Commissioner G. Albert Hill suggested patience and a realistic approach to the problem of a new highway along the proposed route. He said that his department was working toward such a new road and cited the location of Route 9 in the Chester, Deep River and Essex area.

Waldo suggested tolls could help pay for the cost of the new road and urged a parkway for passenger cars only along the Connecticut river.

Commissioner Hill deplored the use of tolls as discriminatory. He expressed the belief that an expressway for commercial and private vehicles might be the better solution.

The new association also intends to confederate plans for combating pollution of the Connecticut river.

**Perpetually Mediocrity**  
 The best of all the dividends of the frustration of the political powers will have nothing at all to do with politics. The idea that the politicians can be anything more than mediocre is a conceit that they may be concealing merely automatic, surface responses which automatically convey what seems to be the accepted thought of the moment, while the more sincere, basic answer is something understood and conceived very different from the surface answer—this idea has importance for many fields beyond politics.

**Gordon and Ansaldi Fire Commissioners**  
 Elected at the Annual Meeting of South End District; Budget of \$102,831 Is Approved

Two new fire commissioners were elected at the annual meeting of the South End Fire District held last night at Firehouse No. 3 on Spruce street. Jack Gordon, former selectman, was elected to fill the three-year term of Robert J. Smith who decided not to be a candidate for re-election. Gordon defeated Joseph Taylor by a vote of 72-66.

The budget for the coming year amounts to \$102,831 and it was approved at the meeting. The district's budget was \$88,500. In their report, the commissioners said the increased budget was due to proposed salary increases and to the increased cost of water and water main extensions. The report continued: "Water main extensions usually mean new construction of buildings, and we anticipate no increase in the tax rate, and it is expected that when the district grant is completed, it will be large enough to offset our annual two-mill tax increase on our available cash balance on hand."

The report of Chief Albert B. Foy showed that during the year 1948 the South End Fire District had responded to 203 alarms, 27 less than last year, and eight of the alarms were in fire outside of the fire district. There were 19 box alarms, 164 silent alarms, two general alarms being for two of these boxes.

Total value of the property endangered by fire was \$28,964, and the total fire loss sustained was \$156,000 divided as follows: fire loss, \$57,287; contents, \$78,122; and automobiles, \$700.

### Sales Slow Up A Cross Nation

#### Fewer Dollars Clink In To Department Store Tills in November

Washington, Nov. 18.—(AP)—High prices may be slowing up department store sales. Or it may be the weather, or something else.

Whatever the reason, fewer dollars clinked into department store tills across the country in each week of the first two weeks of November than were rung up in the same weeks of last year.

The drop was eight per cent in the first week of the month; nine per cent last week.

That meant the actual amount of goods sold was less because prices are higher than they were five years ago.

#### Continual Rise Since War

Since the end of the war, department stores have risen to a new high after another in a series of price increases. Federal Reserve Board surveys of the past two consecutive weeks have been so rare official occasions that they are almost a novelty.

But the officials caution that a two-week showing is not enough to establish a definite trend. There are other factors which might explain the sales dip at least partly.

In some cases, merchants thought business was hurt by the weather. In others, by unseasonably high prices. But the decline shows up in all 12 Federal Reserve districts blanketing the nation.

#### Another Possible Explanation

For the decline, officials say that perhaps American consumers are returning to their traditional practice of waiting until the last hours—or even the "last minute"—to do their Christmas shopping. Last year, as in preceding years, going back into the wartime, consumers were making it a practice to do their Christmas buying early—partly for fear of scarcity.

This year, there is a good supply of most goods and in some lines—clothing, shoes, and some clothing items—stocks have been marked down.

On reflection of price consciousness, consumers are waiting until the last hours to do their Christmas buying early—partly for fear of scarcity.

#### Can Scarcity Be Called Bad?

But even with the new line, sales can scarcely be called bad—they simply aren't getting better.

The department stores for the first two weeks of November showed a decline of 10.5 per cent, according to the survey. That was 250 and 245 per cent, respectively, above the weekly average for pre-war 1936.

Furthermore, officials note that the retail sales—consumer income—was holding a record high annual rate of \$24,800,000,000 in October, the latest month recorded.

He reiterated that Israel was willing at any time to negotiate peace with the Arabs.
