Talbot Mentioned For Chairman Job

Hartford, Nov. 30.—Joseph E. Talbot of Naugatuck was mentioned today as a possible candidate to succeed Harold E. Mitchell as Republican state chairman.

The former U.S. representative was making no statement for publication, but friends pictured him as "interested" in the post although not to the extent of entering a fight for it.

Talbot has been relatively inactive in the party since 1946 when he was defeated by the late Gov. James L. McConaughy in a contest for the gubernatorial nomination.

Talbot, a Naugatuck resident, has considerable strength in Litchfield county, however, and in Fairfield county, where O. O. P. leaders have recently expressed disgruntlement over the leadership.

Mitchell backers in the party have been boosting his assistant, Clarence F. Baldwin, of Woodbridge, as his successor. Baldwin has said he'll take the post if it is offered to him.

New Britain Man Killed

New Britain, Nov. 30.—Theodore Logwin, 80, was struck and instantly killed by an automobile last night as he was walking across Farmington avenue near his home.

Police identified the driver as Harvey E. Bernstein, 16, also of New Britain and said they arrested him on a charge of homicide with a motor vehicle, pending the coroner's finding. Logwin's death was the first traffic fatality here in six months.

New Haven, Nov. 30.—Samuel Margolin, 42, of Brooklyn, N. Y., who is being held in the Danbury correctional institution for non-payment of a \$170,000 Federal fine, has again sought release—this time on the grounds of ill health.

Margolin, who has completed a seven months term for diverting raw materials into the black market, sought permission to avoid payment of the fine several weeks ago by taking the pauper's oath. His petition was denied by Judge Carroll C. Hincks in Federal court here.

The danger is that we shall indulge in maneuvers of face, saving our own face and saving hers by giving her something which will commit us without doing anybody any good.

The thing to do, we think, is to tell this distinguished leader the truth: that we would wish to give China efficient aid, but that we cannot do so when Nationalist China remains a state that if a fight has been lost in China, it has not been through lack of help from us in the past, but because the assurance of help from us has been lost in China. It is a neglect of the tortured people of democracy and of honesty in statecraft.

### Brothers Parted 30 Years Have Happy Reunion Here

Thanks to the quick cooperation of the chief of police in Stratford, Vt., and local Chief Herman O. Schendel, Carl A. Johnson, 145 West Center street, had a reunion with his brother, Gunnar, on Thanksgiving Day with a brother he has seen only once in the past 30 years. Ironically enough, the brother, Gunnar Johnson, 44, who is a Swedish sailor in the merchant marine and has traveled to ports all over the world, has spent the last two years in a hospital only about 150 miles away from Carl's home in Manchester. Neither of the brothers has known the whereabouts of the other for several years.

The brothers saw each other when Carl was on a ship on which Gunnar was serving docked in New York and since that time both men have tried without success to get in touch with each other. Their efforts were finally rewarded when Carl was notified by Chief Schendel on Wednesday, Nov. 24, that a letter was awaiting him at the local police station.

Upon reading the letter, written by his brother, Carl immediately set out for Stratford, where he had seen his brother for the first time since 1919. Carl and Gunnar returned to Manchester and spent their Thanksgiving Day together.

At the time of the 1930 reunion, Carl was living in Stratford, but since that time he had moved to Manchester and has been unable to contact his brother for 28 years. Upon the advice of a friend, Gunnar wrote a letter to the police chief in Stratford, who in turn relayed it to Chief Schendel.

### Wants Court Jobs For Democrats

Westport, Nov. 30—(AP)—A Democratic leader here who says he believes municipal court patronage should be divided between the two major parties nevertheless wants all posts in the Westport court to go to Democrats.

Edward M. Boucher, Democratic town chairman, made his views known yesterday in letters to Gov. Elmer C. Bowers and to John M. Bailey, the party's state chairman.

"Although I favor a split court, divided equally among the two parties, with the party in power receiving the ranking jobs," Boucher wrote, "the failure of the local Republican party to do this in past years has caused us to ask for complete control of the court."

Boucher told reporters he was sure the request would be granted because "Westport is the only town in the state that went from Republican to Democratic in local elections."

The Supreme Allied Command's Public Information office said all seven major Japanese war lords were included in a statement issued early today by MacArthur that the death sentences "remain in force" but are carried out pending the high court's answer.

### Backs Resolution On Quitting Korea

Paris, Nov. 30—(AP)—The United States is reported backing a United Nations resolution for withdrawal of American troops from Korea as soon as practicable.

Informed sources said yesterday the U. S. will be among the powers sponsoring a joint resolution on Korea to come before the Political Committee after the Palestine debate.

Russia already has begun removing her troops from north Korea.

The resolution also would give U. S. approval to the republic of Korea where elections were held in April under U. N. supervision. Another part of the resolution would instruct the U. N. Korean Commission to make another attempt to hold a U. N.-supervised election in the Russian zone. Russia barred the commission this year.

### The New Meditation Proposal

Previous efforts of the six neutral nations in the Security Council to solve the Berlin crisis by mediation were rebuffed by both East and West. Both sides, in scorning the mediation proposal of Secretary General Trygve Lie and Dr. Herbert Ehall, but finally, in the closing days of the United Nations session at Paris, both East and West have been pressured into what looks like acceptance of one last mediation proposal—another from the Argentine's Foreign Minister Juan Bramuglia is spokesman.

Under the latest Bramuglia proposal, the four powers interested are asked to agree to the appointment of a neutral commission of financial experts, who would set to work to draw up a final plan for the introduction of Soviet currency into all Berlin.

One of the chief objections to the proposal is that the commission produces a satisfactory result, the four powers would then agree to have the introduction of the Soviet currency and the lifting of the Berlin blockade be simultaneous operations.

This proposal has in view the same eventual compromise which has been obviously logical for some weeks past, but which the western powers have refused to accept, insisting that the lifting of the blockade must come first, as a clear and military act on the part of Russia.

That the western powers now seem ready to accept the conciliatory principle that the introduction of Soviet currency and the lifting of the blockade could be simultaneous operations is the first indication that the western powers actually want to reach an agreement on Berlin.

Hitherto it has frankly been the position of United States policy that this is not the time to allow any agreement with Russia to be reached. The theory behind this policy is that she shall get better agreements with Russia if we wait until we have amassed more armament and power against Russia and have thus improved our bargaining position. In line with that policy, we have kept backed away from settlement of the Berlin crisis, and we have succeeded in keeping our western partners in line with us, on the surface at least, even though France thinks the West has no very good moral position on Berlin, since Russia has only been doing to us there what we first began doing to Russia in Western Germany.

Whether our expected compliance with the Bramuglia plan indicates a change of policy, or merely a tactical yielding to neutral world opinion which will be cancelled out later by our rejection of the results of the neutral commission's work remains to be seen.

### Wrong Way Miracle

Our economy has become so complicated and so bungled up that it is beginning, ironically, to defeat itself. Measures we adopt to improve it turn out to be at cross-purposes, again and again.

We have a policy of government support prices for agricultural products, for instance, in order to assure ourselves of plentiful production.

One of the crops in which we certainly need, and get, plentiful production this year was the crop of corn.

We need big crops of corn because corn has always been, almost automatically, the equivalent of things just as we need the greatest continuing agricultural shortage.

Now there comes a forecast that our record crop of corn will not mean a better crop of meat. The forecast may be wrong; we hope it is. But the forecaster says that the government support prices are sufficiently attractive to discourage farmers from putting corn to its normal use—feeding livestock, which means more work and worry and responsibility for the government and the consumer. So this particular forecaster says that next year, the year after our mammoth corn crop, may be in lower supply than even this year.

So, in this instance, crop support, the very policy we pursue in order to get more corn, and therefore more meat, leads to less meat.

The western farmers have a wide choice of selling their corn to the government at a price which is good enough, and taking their money now, or of putting their corn into meat, which would make most more plentiful and bring down the proffering meat prices of the post OPA era. They are choosing to unload their corn on the government and to keep the meat crop, and the meat prices, where they are. Both ways, the consumer and the taxpayer take a licking.

Our cross purpose policies have now achieved the most tragic of all miracles: they can turn plenty into scarcity.
