### Favors Admitting Negro Students

Jefferson City, Mo., Dec. 3.—(AP)—The University of Missouri Board of Curators has recommended that Missouri laws be revised to let state-supported colleges admit Negroes on a restricted basis.

The board suggested Negroes be admitted in courses not offered at Lincoln university for Negroes at Jefferson City.

The recommendation was placed before a House Committee on Civil Rights yesterday by Allen McReynolds, president of the curators.

McReynolds cited Federal court decisions and said it is clear educational courses not available at Lincoln either must be provided at Lincoln or the program at these (white) colleges opened to Negroes.

### Report Made By Collector

#### Total Receipts of \$21,992, Other Than Taxation, Is Announced

A total intake of \$21,992.46 on accounts other than taxation figured since the start of the fiscal August 15 and extending through November 30, was reported today to General Manager George H. Waddell by Collector of Revenue Samuel Nelson.

The collection from sources other than taxes during November alone is listed at \$9,843.29.

The month's income is broken down as follows: Charities payments \$1,217.25 (representing payments of previous aid extended and other income for assistance); sidewalk repair payments \$2,787.51; police department \$478.92; common-wealth case payments, \$1,060.25; sale of lots and burials, \$253; building and plumbing inspection fees, \$1,077.75; rents payments, \$210; insurance, \$400.92; veterans' housing rental income, \$2,980; zoning fees, \$17.50; park department fees, \$18.

Income on Tax Accounts

The Collector of Revenue reports that income on tax accounts from the start of the fiscal year August 15, has been \$15,144.58, of which \$1,974.95 was collected during November. Most of the tax collections are made early in the summer when they are originally due and payable. The total unpaid taxes as of November 30 is reported at \$29,650.38, said to be one of the lowest balances in the state for any town of comparable size, and on a percentage basis, the lowest of all. The balance has been claimed Manchester has the lowest of all unpaid balances on taxes.

### Town To Distribute Sand From December 6th to 9th

General Manager George Waddell has set Dec. 6-9 as the time when trucks and men in the employ of the town will distribute sand in all sections of Manchester, filling boxes, barrels, or other suitable receptacles if they are placed on the lawn in front of houses, near the sidewalk, but not on the sidewalk. Receptacles should be placed on the lawn the night before so men and trucks will start the distribution of sand at 7 a. m.

A by-law was adopted by the Town Meeting of March 2, 1948, requiring property owners and tenants to keep walks clean of ice and snow, and to make same safe by the application of sand or some other suitable substance, within 12 hours after a formation of ice.

### Electricity Kills House Mover

New York, Dec. 3.—(AP)—A Yonkers, N. Y., man was electrocuted and a man who tried to save him was critically injured late yesterday when a high tension wire sent a 2,000-volt current down through the wet roof-top of a house.

John Attabell, 24, of 21 Summer avenue, Yonkers, got out to adjust a tow cable. He screamed as he touched the cable, and resigned himself to it. Dominick Perisco, 26, of 209 Thurston street, Yonkers, tried to pull Attabell free, but fell to the ground critically burned.

Perisco was taken to a hospital by a police emergency squad, which reported Attabell was dead on his arrival.

**Foreign Policy Paradox**  
 The great mystery of American  
 foreign policy in these post-war  
 years is that of how the State  
 Department can formulate American  
 policy for China and the rest of  
 Europe.

When it comes to China, Sec-  
 retary of State George C. Mar-  
 shall personally and American  
 policy in general, recognition and  
 aid to the central truth . . . that  
 you can't hope to beat commu-  
 nism by pouring dollars and guns  
 into the hands of reactionaries.

When it comes to Europe, Amer-  
 ican policy insists that there is only  
 one way to defeat communism,  
 and that is to meet it with  
 better and more democratic  
 people to whom communism  
 might appeal. When it comes to  
 China we know that nothing can  
 hold China against communism  
 unless that is done for the people  
 of China. We know, too, that it  
 will go communism more harm  
 than good to compare China with  
 actual fact, it is not able to carry  
 out its own promises.

But everything we have returned  
 to do in China, we have returned  
 to try to do in Greece, and we  
 are now trying to do in Europe as  
 a whole. And the cure we keep  
 prescribing for China is the cure  
 we prescribe in Greece.

Our Truman Doctrine, and our  
 policy toward China, are as dif-  
 ferent as day and night, white  
 and black.

And in both countries, we have  
 had demonstrations that it is our  
 pronounced policy toward China  
 which is the right policy. What  
 help in dollars and guns we have  
 given to China has fallen either  
 into the hands of corrupt res-  
 reactionaries or into the hands of  
 the Chinese Communists, who are  
 now largely equipped with the  
 weapons we have given to Na-  
 tionalist China. And, in Greece,  
 where we have given the business  
 of the dollar and gun answer to  
 communism full and open trial,  
 we have succeeded in making the  
 Greeks, in doubling the number of  
 guerrillas in the field against us.

Whatever will keep communism  
 out of China and out of Greece,  
 out of any other country, it is  
 not dollars and guns alone. The  
 evidence continues to be that it  
 must be honest, democratic polit-  
 ics, social justice, a non-privatizing  
 economy, which alone can  
 guarantee to keep communism out  
 of any country. And if any one  
 should contend that contrary  
 standards are today making Spain  
 the one country in Europe which  
 is most safe against communism,  
 we would insist that the Spanish  
 contrary, it is precisely Spain which,  
 of all the countries in Europe,  
 is in greatest danger of falling ul-  
 timately victim to the most violent  
 brand of communism.

But, coming back from that  
 aside, the paradox of American  
 foreign policy is that it has been  
 fairly consistent in seeing the  
 truth when it looks at China, but  
 conspicuously unable to recognize  
 the same truth in Greece.

Perhaps the mangled and secret  
 papers of our time will explain it  
 by spelling Secretary Marshall  
 with our China policy, attributing  
 the contradictory Truman Doc-  
 trine to President Truman and  
 other advisers, and then giving  
 Secretary Marshall credit for try-  
 ing to bring away from the Tru-  
 man Doctrine toward a sound  
 policy through the Marshall plan,  
 which originated with that fac-  
 tious of the State Department  
 which does not believe in wield-  
 ing the military big stick as a  
 cure for all problems. It may be  
 that our foreign policy has been  
 inconsistent, not because one  
 individual set of individuals

### Income Forms To Be Mailed

Tax Will Be Due in Just Another 102 Days; Some Changes

Hartford, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Just a little reminder: In another 102 days your income tax will be due! The painful subject was raised yesterday by Collector of Internal Revenue John J. Fitzpatrick, who announced that the 1948 forms and instructions are ready for mailing to more than 400,000 Federal taxpayers in the state.

Fitzpatrick mingled a little good news with the bad. He pointed out that taxpayers will get the benefit this year of a "community property" provision which permits husbands and wives to split their joint income equally for tax purposes. That should result in a small total tax payment, he said.

Other important changes, he said, include an increase in personal exemptions for taxpayers 65 or older, and added exemptions for blind persons.

The new changes, the collector said, are explained in the new 16-page instruction booklet, described as written "in every day language." It will be sent to taxpayers along with the Form 1010.

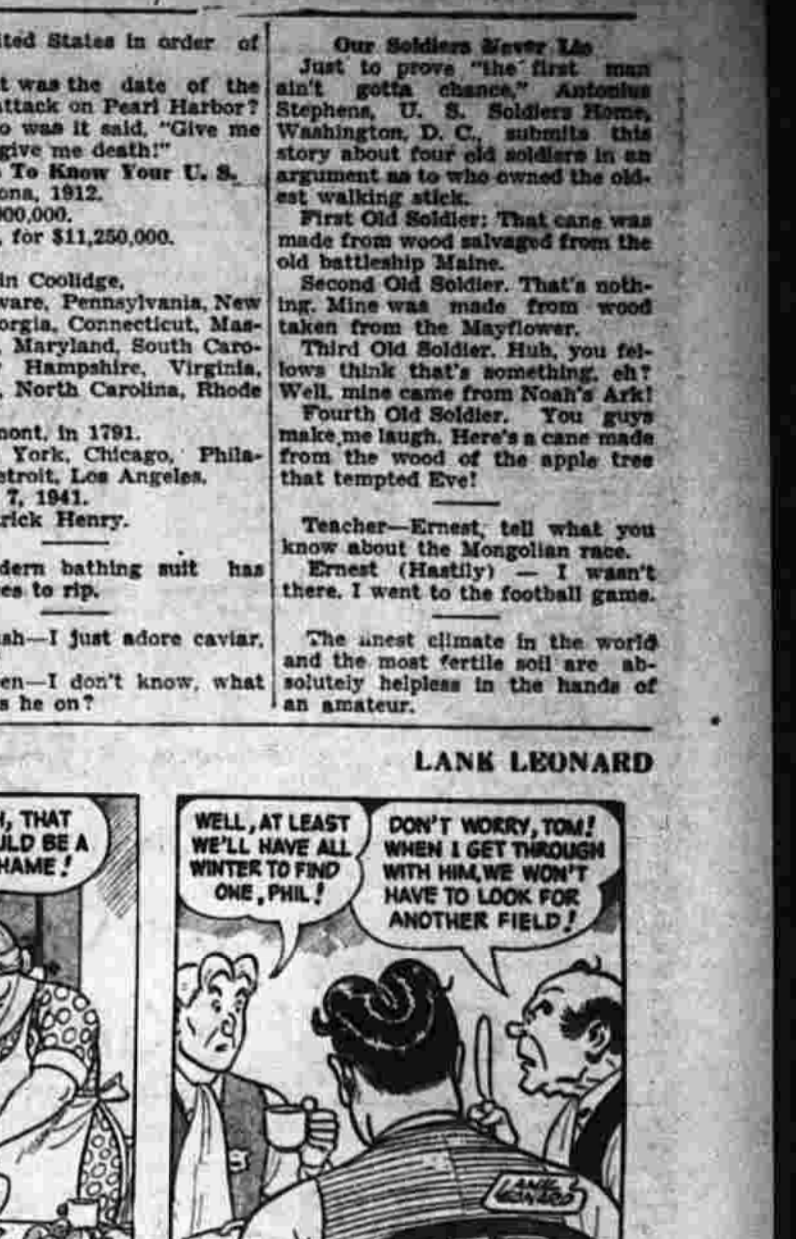
