Russia Is Told
Russia may, by squeeze tactics and power, eventually gain undisputed control of Berlin. If the cold war over Germany continues, such a result is really almost inevitable and will be the thing which makes partition complete.

But yesterday's municipal election in western Berlin told the Russians what they were getting, if their full military and political control of Berlin should ever be accomplished. The Russians may gain the city, yes, but yesterday's voting told them that they have already lost it.

Although the people of western Berlin are well aware of the probability that they may come under Russian control, and although all Russia's sly advice to them yesterday was to vote in a good percentage. Approximately 80 per cent of those eligible to vote did so. The act of voting was in itself a vote against the Russian pressure. It was a vote against Russia and against communism.

That does not mean, unfortunately, that it was a vote for the western powers and for democracy. The post-war Germans, when they are free of Russian domination, have shown more capacity for slipping back into their traditional love for an authoritarian way of life than they have for coming forward toward democracy.

And, as between Russia and the western powers, Russia probably enjoys the distinction in German minds of being regarded as the lesser of two evils. Germans don't want the Russians in Berlin, and they look their opportunity to say so. They don't want us in Germany, either, and they have already said that, too. If they have to have occupation, they would choose to have occupation by us rather than occupation by the Russians. But what they really want is for all the victor powers to get out.

Perhaps, indirectly, yesterday's vote will help them get what they want. For it should make it clear enough to the Russians, who have already been toying with the idea of getting out of Germany, that they have everything to lose and nothing to gain by prolonging their stay. The better the Germans know them, the less they like them.

Protection of UN For New Republic Of Korea Sought

United States Asks Political Committee Members to Show Solidarity With Newly Formed But Already Threatened Setup

Paris, Dec. 7.—(AP)—The United States today asked United Nations protection for the new republic of Korea against threats of violence and terror from Communist-controlled north Korea.
