### Pope Receives Spanish Envoy

Vatican City, Dec. 13.—Pope Pius XII yesterday received the credentials of the new Spanish ambassador to the Holy see and sent the blessings to the Spanish people and the head of the Spanish government, Generalissimo Francisco Franco.

The sending of blessings to a nation and its head is a custom with the pope.

The pontiff said "one of our major consultations is the knowledge that we are every moment supported and assisted by the love and prayers of our most beloved sons in all the world and among the first, the Spanish people."

"How then," he asked the ambassador, Joaquin Ruiz Jimenez Cortes, "shall we not give our affectionate blessing to the people, the head of state and the government, to your excellency and your distinguished family?"

New York, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Universal military training with educational features emphasized will be advocated by the American Legion when the next Congress opens, a Legion official says.

Absence of such a program leaves "a gap in our preparation for the future," said E. J. Cooke, chairman of the Legion's National Security commission, said yesterday.

He said the present selective service act is designed only to maintain an armed force in Europe.

### Beaten Girl Found Alive

Beauty Discovered in Pool of Blood Behind Guam Curio Shop

Guam, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Raped and left for dead, pretty Ruth Farnsworth was found unconscious in the jungle today near the small curio-shop from which she vanished mysteriously Saturday night.

The 27-year-old San Francisco beauty was found nude in a pool of blood in dense bushes about 200 yards behind the shop, where she worked part time.

Hospital attendants reported 12 hours later she was clinging to life. A searching party found her at 10:10 a. m. at 10 p. m. Sunday.

Guam authorities said she had been seized by a gang of "war fiends" criminally assaulted and beaten. They said she apparently fell into a terrific struggle.

A reward of \$1,000 was offered by the proprietor of the curio-shop for the arrest of Miss Farnsworth's attackers.

Her condition was regarded as critical.

In San Francisco, Miss Farnsworth's sister, Aline, 25, said she planned to fly to Ruy's bedside if the Navy will permit the trip.

"Thank God she was found alive," said Aline who notified by The Associated Press that her sister had been found. "I hope they'll let me fly to Guam and bring her back home when her condition improves enough for a trip."

(Aline returned from Guam only recently. Both young women worked on the Navy-administered island so they could send money to a brother, Lawrence, 21, who is in Mexico in a Latter Day Saints church mission. The Farnsworths are Mormons.)

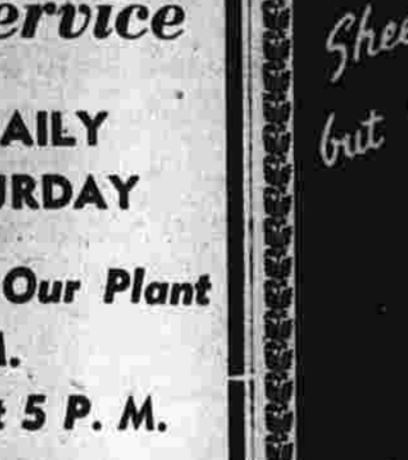

**The Debate of Our Times**  
 Dr. Russell Clinchy of Hartford, speaking in Manchester a few weeks ago, said rather cryptically that the really world-important, historically important debate going on at Paris was not the peace negotiations over Berlin, but the proceedings of the Social Committee of the United Nations General Assembly.  
 Those proceedings have now culminated in the formal adoption by the General Assembly of the document known as the "Universal Declaration of Human Rights."  
 The debate which has shaped this document, in the Social Committee, and for two years before that, in the United Nations Human Rights Commission, which formulated the basic draft of the document, has perhaps been the most important and vital debate in modern history. To seek any kind of parallel, one would have to go back to the great formative debates in which early Christianity resolved itself into specific doctrines—debates in which the deep, vital truths of life and principle as men could see them were openly and fearlessly discussed.  
 We know, in general, what has been the nature of this modern debate. And in our general knowledge of its nature we know why it has been so vital and important. It has been a debate between the philosophies and creeds of the East and the West.  
 On the one hand, there has been the individualistic, sometimes irreligious, frequently self-qualifying West, having its roots deep within itself what its own definitions of the most important things in the world may be. And yet the very diversity of its ideas, the very freedom of the West's internal battle over these ideas, also constitutes the West's strength.  
 And, on the other hand, there has been the disciplined, creedal, unified East, which has gloried in the strength of always knowing its own mind. That may seem a weak position rather than strength to us western individualists. Future history will judge. But it is a way of life, and a way of logic, which seems to defend itself as zealously as we defend our way of life and our logic.  
 These two ways of life have, in this great debate over the past two years, been talking directly to one another. They have been testing themselves against one another. They have been hurling thought and words at one another. At some times, they have been seriously seeking ideological agreement between themselves. At other times, they have been hopelessly divided, so that neither could begin to understand the meaning of the other. But the interchange—perhaps the most important interchange of ideas in all the world's history—has been taking place. This debate has been the first great meeting of East and West at the ideological discussion table.  
 And here is the unfortunate, unhappy thing. We know next to nothing about the actual course of this debate. The world knows next to nothing about it. We suppose, and hope, that in due course some one will take the minutes of these long proceedings, and weave from them an intelligible story of the debate itself. But in the present, the world has had only brief catches of address and rebuttal, only hearing and hearing accounts of the positions taken. Although Berlin, the greatest debate in modern history has not been considered newsworthy. All the world has, at the moment, is the document resulting from this debate, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. It is a document which the East is

usually refused to vote for or vote against, even though it influenced it. Nevertheless, as the first world-wide bill of human rights, it is automatically historic. It ought to be read and discussed, and we should have the privilege of reading it and discussing it with reference to the long debate in which the meaning and shadings of its words were discussed and determined. That is presently impossible.  
 And yet, if the document has real worth, it will be able to speak for itself. If it is going to live, it must be able to stand on its own logic. If they are to ever mean anything to the world, its words must mean something to us and to our readers, even if we lack any full account of the reasoning by which they were formulated and adopted. We propose, over the next few days, to reprint the document, which is relatively brief, with comment which will also be brief.

### Gov. Shannon Speaker At Local High School

Program Held to Honor Students Here Selected as Governors of the Boys' State

Those people, whether American or otherwise, who are least governed, Governor Shannon told several hundred students at an assembly held at Manchester High school this morning.

Gov. Shannon was the principal speaker on the program honoring two Manchester High seniors, Alfred Rogers and Raymond Fabery, who were elected Boys' State governors in 1947 and 1948.

Governor Shannon was introduced by State Senator Charles S. House.

Can Be Easily Lost

Stressing the difficulty with which freedom was won by early Americans, the governor warned that "freedom can be lost just as easily as you take of your overcoat."

He urged the students to adopt two principles to govern their lives as they prepare for the task ahead. First, he said, you should develop the type of citizen who respects his government but does not expect the government to solve his problems. He should do all in his power to strengthen the government. Another principle to keep in mind, he advised, is that those people are best governed who are least governed.

The governor paid tribute to Boys State, to Governors Rogers and Fabery, and to the citizens whose efforts make Boys' State possible.

He said, when state and possibly national figures need inspiration, and Boys' State provides the inspiration for them. He described one of Alfred Rogers' most important contributions as an officer of the American Legion, which has ever heard.

Governor Shannon won over his audience with his candid humor and received enthusiastic applause remarking that when he was in high school a speaker was judged on his ability to "kill a period" without "talking too loudly to interfere with our own thoughts."

Other speakers on the program included Edson Bulley, Alfred Rogers and Raymond Fabery. Rogers spoke on the organization of Boys' State and its value to youthful citizens. He said that the organization teaches boys of high school age the processes of government and their duties as citizens of the government. He stressed the importance of the building program and its value to Boys' State.

Fabery explained the political organization of Boys' State and the methods by which those three parties, the Federalists, Nationalists and Independent parties, have also stressed the value of Boys' State to youths of high school age.

Services Club Presented

Principal Bally thanked the organizations who have aided in the sponsoring of Boys' State and introduced representatives of these organizations to the students. The Exchange Club was represented by Carlo Roban, the Kiwanis club by Herbert McKinney and the American Legion by John Rottner. ### Calls FBI Off In Shooting Lack of Evidence Fed. In Dei Dolori Case

Hartford, Dec. 13—(AP)—The FBI was called off today from investigation of the shooting of Domenico M. Dei Dolori near the Massachusetts line early Saturday, which for a while held the possibility that the Lindbergh kidnap party held at the Rush memorial church, in Boston, William T. McCarty, announced "there will be no Federal prosecution" because of lack of evidence that Federal laws were violated.

Dei Dolori remained critical though slightly improved at Springfield hospital where he was taken with three bullets in his body after what he described as a "gangland" ride in his car. He remained in the hospital last week at Hartford for conspiracy to operate one of the largest illicit stills knock-out in the east in years. Two of the largest illicit stills were seized in his Federal penitentiary for other offenses.

When John J. Gleason of New Haven, investigator in charge of the FBI in Connecticut, received McCarty's announcement today he said he will no longer press the investigation in this district.

However, the FBI is cooperating with state police in making a ballistics and fingerprint examination of Dei Dolori's bullet-punctured car. Gleason said Dei Dolori, 42 of Thompsonville, said he was taken for "rides" in his car by three men from his boy store in Springfield to a point near the state line at Longmeadow, Mass., where he was shot and left for dead.

It had been definitely established that the "gang ride" crossed state lines, and that it would proceed under the Lindbergh law, penalty for which may be death in the discretion of the court.
