Junta Rules El Salvador

Fifth Successful Army Uprising in Latin America During 1948

Guatemala, Dec. 16 (AP)—A junta of five young men has taken over El Salvador's government in the fifth successful Army uprising in Latin America in 1948.

"Absolute calm reigns in all the country and the people applaud the action of the Army," said a bulletin broadcast from San Salvador, the capital of the little republic.

The Army ousted President Salvador Castaneda Castro after a short fight with police Tuesday. It is holding him at El Zapote fort on a charge of violating the constitution. The charge is based upon Castaneda's efforts to obtain a two-year extension of his term of office, due to expire March 1, 1949.

Described as Rightist, Maj. Oscar Osorio is expected to lead the junta (provisional council), which is described as rightist. He has been a member of El Salvador's diplomatic staff in Mexico City.

His associates are Lt. Col. Manuel De J. Cordova, Maj. Oscar Bonanos and two lawyers, Dr. Feliciano Galindo Pohl and Dr. Humberto Costa. All are in their 30s.

The first of the fighting Tuesday was between El Zapote fort and the police station, which the president appealed for protection. There was a heavy exchange of machine gun, automatic rifle and mortar fire. Four civilians were reported as killed. Army officers pledged no harm would come to his family.

The decision will affect all 25 of the top Japanese leaders convicted by the Tokyo tribunal, even though only seven appeared. Tojo was one of the seven.

Their cases came up for argument under the unprecedented circumstances that four of the justices already have publicly declared their belief that the court has no authority to intercede. The views of the judges on pending litigation ordinarily are among the capital's most closely guarded secrets.

The four—Chief Justice Yamanashi and Justices Kawanishi, Kato and Nakamura—revealed their opinion in a brief court announcement Tuesday. It is one of the most influential elements of young Republicans in the state and for president group.

Chief Justice for Post-Japan, Justice Kawanishi, Murphy, Rutledge and Jackson.

Jackson, who served as chief U.S. prosecutor of top Nazi war criminals, cast the deciding vote in favor of today's hearing. In a statement explaining his vote said that he had not committed himself.

Jackson said he hoped today's arguments would "convince" one or more of the judges on one side or the other so that there would not be another 4 to 4 tie on the question of the Supreme court's power in such cases. He said he would not take part in the final decision unless such a deadlock develops. He pointed out that so far he never has been consulted on the question of the court's jurisdiction in such cases.

Jackson commented that the court's decision "will establish or deny that this court has power to review executive or military power abroad and the president's conduct of external affairs of our government. The answer will influence our nation's reputation for continuity of policy for a long time to come."

If a majority of the justices should decide to intercede, court attaches said the judges likely will take the next step and rule simultaneously whether the Tokyo tribunal was within its jurisdiction or not. He said he was confident the court would be no ruling on the guilt or innocence of the Japanese.

Hickey Warns About Driving

Says 'You Can't Bluff Way Through Hard Packed Snow or Ice'

Hartford, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Commissioner Hickey's first fairly heavy snow of the season brought from Hialeah, Fla., to the State Police Commissioner Edward J. Hickey this morning.

"You can't bluff your way through hard packed snow or ice," said Commissioner Hickey in commenting upon reports of numerous bumps throughout the state.

"Today is the day after the season's first snow storm of any consequence. Agencies concerned with safety yesterday gave warning of the conditions expected and reminded automobile drivers through the press and radio to check their chains, defrosters and windshield wipers, as well as their own driving."

"Yesterday in spite of that adequate warning a number of motorists caused traffic jams on various highways throughout the state because they thought they could get by without good traction or stopping aids."

"Remember, please, you can't bluff your way through hard packed snow or ice, you've got to have what it takes on your wheels. Then again, folks want to get last night knowing snow was falling. Many rose this morning at their usual time, hastily moved their wheels and then didn't bother to clear the snow from their windshields or rear windows because they were already late."

"May I quote just a bit from the state law. One section says 'each motor vehicle shall be equipped with a mirror attached to and so located and adjusted so such vehicle as to give the operator thereof a clear reflected view of the highway directly to the rear of or on a line parallel to the side of the body of such motor vehicle.'"

"An inside mirror is ineffective when snow covers your rear window. Remember that, please. Don't make it necessary for any police department to give you a written reminder of this safety law."

Art Dealer Loses Case

Restaurant Chain Operator Gets \$13,508.26 Judgment on Note

Bridgeport, Dec. 16.—(AP)—E. W. Ingram, a Columbia, O., national restaurant chain operator, obtained a \$13,508.26 preliminary note judgment against David B. Findlay, a New Canaan art dealer, in Superior court today.

An agreement which preceded the entry of judgment provided that a painting, an etching and a dedicated book of compositions now in possession of Mr. Ingram, will be sold and the proceeds applied to the debt.

In a complaint claiming damages of \$15,000, Mr. Ingram alleged that Mr. Findlay failed to pay a \$10,000 note executed February 13, 1946.

Nationalist Units Begin Evacuating Pengu Positions

Withdrawing to Chulien, Only 30 Miles North of Nanking; Action Coincides With Reliable Reports of Wiping Out of 12th Army

Nanking, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Supreme headquarters of Chiang Kai-shek's east China command today began withdrawing from threatened Pengu to Chulien, only 30 miles north of this uneasy capital. Pengu, 105 miles northwest of Nanking, was the anchor for the government's new Hwai river defense line. It became a Nationalist headquarters after the abandonment of the stronghold of Fuchow, 100 miles farther north.

The withdrawal coincided with reliable reports that the government's 12th Army, garrisoned by the Chinese Nationalists northwest of Pengu for 18 days, has been wiped out.

Official dispatches Thursday reported that the 12th was making a last stand with less than half its original force of 110,000 troops. They were described as compressed into an area of only three miles in circumference.

The Chinese Communist radio claimed yesterday that the 12th had been wiped out.

Associated Press Correspondent Seymour Hersh reported from Pengu that transports, which had been sitting, began to load to the sea. No longer could be seen.
