

Indonesian Units Stab Repeatedly At Dutch Forces

Guerrillas Attack Positions on Java, According to Fugitive Underground Republican Radio; Picture of Harassing Tactics Given

Batavia, Java, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Indonesian guerrillas are stabbing repeatedly at Dutch positions on the island of Java, the fugitive underground republican radio said today. The Dutch have issued what they describe as a cease fire order on Java, although it authorizes Netherlands soldiers to continue operations against roaming groups of individuals trying to cause disorder.

Operations Nearly Over
They would not say when a similar order might be issued in neighboring Sumatra, where Dutch reports picture operations as nearly over.

The Dutch said there are "no regular republican troops under a responsible commander" in Java. But the republican radio, monitored here, gave this picture of harassing tactics against the conquering Netherlands:

1. Republicans attacked Pondok, Sunoharjo, Wonogiri, Sokobani, Garot and the Bantam harbor area, all on east Java.
2. Two Dutch planes were shot down in central Sumatra.
3. An automobile bridge outside Soerakarta, Java, was blown up by Republicans while seven Dutch Army trucks were crossing it.
4. Guerrillas attacked a Dutch military convoy west of Cheribon.

Suber Estate Attacked
The Dutch themselves reported a guerrilla attack on a rubber estate near Buitenzorg, 30 miles from Batavia. Dutch sources said five Europeans and 11 Indonesians were killed by 500 guerrillas. The same source said another estate in the same area was attacked later.

The Dutch commander, Lt. Gen. Simon Speer, issued an order of the day which is referred to as a cease fire. Netherlands government representatives then received a letter to the United Nations Good

CIO Officials Given Blame For Violence

Held Responsible by Congressional Committee for Defiance of Authority in Ohio Row

Washington, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Officials of a CIO union were blamed by a congressional committee today for violence and "defiance of lawful authority" in the Uniflex Lens company strike at Dayton, O., last August.

The union was identified by a House Labor subcommittee as the United Electrical, Radio and Machine Workers of America. The subcommittee was composed of Representative Hoffman (R., Mich.), Smith (R., Kas.), and Fisher (D., Tex.).

In one of six reports filed by House committees during the week-end, the Labor subcommittee said the Uniflex strike was a "typical case of a subcommittee committee as an organization with Communist control."

The other reports dealt with the congressional spy probe, labor problems in New York City and Pennsylvania, which the Federal Communications Commission and the incentive pay system for industrial workers.

Cost Will Be Paid by Citizens
The cost of the Uniflex strike, which caused National Guard troops to be sent to Dayton, will ultimately be paid by the citizens of Dayton and Ohio, the committee said.

United States Winning First Part of Fight

**Truman Expected to Advise Congress Long
And Costly Drive
Against Reds Ahead**

Washington, Jan. 3.—(AP)—President Truman is expected to tell Congress Wednesday that the United States is winning the first stage of the struggle with Russia. To that he is expected to add that a long, arduous, and costly campaign of counter-action still lies ahead.

Despite Communist victories in China, the president's top foreign policy advisers regard 1948 as a year of great gains in uniting the Western anti-Communist nations and building up their economic and military power.

But American experts do not believe the Soviet reaction to strengthening of the West will stop there. There is considerable speculation here that the Soviets may launch a new peace offensive in the new year to try to disarm the Western foreign advisers.

**14 Persons Killed
When Plane Burns**

**11 Yale Students and
Three Crewmen Victims
as Craft Hits
Revettment in Takeoff**

Seattle, Jan. 3.—(AP)—A chartered plane carrying vacationing Yale students back to school crashed and burned last night, killing 11 students and three crewmen. The two-engine DC-3 piled into a hangar revettment at Boeing field a few seconds after its takeoff—a takeoff a Civil Aeronautics administration official said was made against control tower orders.

There were 20 aboard when the non-scheduled transport, hired by 27 Washington and Oregon Yale students to take them back to New Haven, Conn., sped down an icy runway at 10 p. m. Sixteen escaped, some badly burned.

R. D. Bredinger, regional administrator of the CAA, said the pilot, William Chavers of Seattle, was warned that conditions were "below minimums" required for a takeoff. Witnesses said the field was glazed with ice and there was a light fog.

Witnesses said the big plane had barely risen from the ground when a wing dipped and scraped the concrete runway. Then the ship tipped the other way, dragged its left wing and veered into a Boeing airplane company experimental hangar at 80 to 100 miles an hour, and burst into flames.

Survivors said they crawled, on hands and knees through the wreckage.

Waterbury Fire Marshal Estimates Loss Will Approach Million

Waterbury, Jan. 8.—Connecticut, gratefully watching floodwaters recede, today estimated its damage "in the millions of dollars."

And while no definite figure could be set for the over-all losses, the fire marshal of the city of Waterbury stated that damage in that city would "run about a million dollars."

At the same time, a State Highway Department official said it would cost about \$200,000 to repair damage done to state highways and bridges.

More than 500 workers are toiling around the clock in many instances to remove landslides, repair washouts and make bridges safe for normal travel, he advised.

Only one major highway was not wholly opened to vehicular traffic in the flood areas today.

Portions of U. S. Route 7, between New Milford and South Danbury in Litchfield county, were closed until the morning of Jan. 7, when the route was reopened.

Large stretches of this route were inundated by the Housatonic river.

R. L. Donnelly, state director of road maintenance, said that a portion of Connecticut 169, the vicinity of Bantam lake, would be closed for repairs for about a week.

He also said that state police would be patrolling the route to broadcast warnings that the shoulders of many of the roads in the flood area have been undermined and are unsafe. Motorists are being asked not to drive on the shoulders of any roads.

Few Industries Escaped

Taft-Hartley Views Higher

Senate Labor Committee Democrats at Odds On Speeding Change

Washington, Jan. 8.—(AP)—Senate Labor committee Democrats differed today over whether to speed hearings on repeal of the Taft-Hartley law or wait a month or two.

Senator Elbert Thomas (D-Utah) who will lead the committee in the new Congress, told a reporter he still believes the group should go ahead on labor legislation.

But Senator Murray (D-Mont) said in a separate interview that hearings on repeal and a substitute for the Taft-Hartley measure ought to get started right away.

The measure is in the election that they want the law repealed. "There is no excuse for delay. The matter rates a No. 1 priority over all other committee business."

Has Caused "Enough Damage?"

Murray said the law has caused "enough damage" and should be taken off the books as soon as possible. He was one of the leaders in the fight against it in the 80th Congress. It was passed over President Truman's veto. Thomas opposed the law, too.
