New Haven, Jan. 3 .- (P)-Shock and bewilderment marked Yale student reactions to news today that nearly a dozen of their classmates' lives had been snuffed out in a Scattle plane crash.

Most of the students had just returned from their holiday vacations and had received only sketchy reports of the early morn-ing crash of the chartered DC-3 plane in which 27 Yale men were The students were still unaware

of the names of the dead and injured aboard the aircraft, and expressed great concern lest clos friends were on the ill-fated flight. Sam Walker, chairman of The Yale News, said that the college was not yet operating, normally since most of the boys had not returned from their vacation. The majority are expected back tonight. Classes resume tomorrow.
Walker says that the Yate radio station, WYBC, and college papers will not be in actual opera-tion until the college officially opens its doors again tomorrow.

Therefore, he said, many of the students had not yet received word of the tragic mishap.
