The following state of candidates was presented by Elmer Swanson, chairman of the nominating committee, and unanimously elected to their respective offices: Desires, three year term; Ernest Kjellev, Albert Johnson, Harry Sheehan, Thomas Walker, trustees for three years; Rev. Carl E. Olson, president; Sunday School superintendent, Mrs. Harry Larson, Edward Werner; Sunday School secretary, Mrs. Harry Larson, Lydia Anderson; pastor, Rev. Carl E. Olson, presiding; the meeting was called to order at 8:30, with 114 voting members in attendance.

The pastor's annual report reviewed the life and work of the congregation during the past year, revealing that there had been progress and growth along many lines, including a 10 per cent increase in attendance at Sunday morning worship and a net membership increase of 24. He further reported, in behalf of the Every Member Chorus committee, that the goal of \$17,000 in membership pledges for 1949 had been exceeded, resulting in a 20 per cent increase over 1948 in the averaging pledging unit of the congregation.

Report of Treasurer Paul Alderson, showed that during the year total expenditures had amounted to more than \$20,000, and of this amount \$8,231.54 had been given to benevolent causes. The budget adopted for 1949 made provision for hiring a full-time parish worker, and a 10 per cent increase for all members of the church staff.

Of special interest to the congregation was the report of the treasurer of the Parish Building Fund, Miss Ruth E. Benson, showing that pledges to this special fund, received from members, friends of the congregation, including hundreds of non-congregants of the town, now amount to \$50,491.78, of which over \$11,000 is in cash. Alan Coo, chairman of the building committee, stated that preliminary plans have been drawn up by Herman Peterson, an experienced draftsman and a member of the committee, and sent to Minneapolis for review by the Commission on Church Architecture of the Augustana Lutheran Church.

Other comprehensive and enlightening reports were given by the following: Everett Anderson, financial secretary; Alva Anderson, memorial organ fund; Hugo Benson, committee on inventory; Carl Gustafson, auditing committee; Clarence Wagoner and George Oberfell, church schools; Eva Johnson, Cradle Roll; Clarence Hebling, organist and churchmaster.

Memorial gifts in memory of the late Mrs. Aaron Johnson, in memory of their parents; and the new front entrance steps, presented by Arthur Anderson of Westley Hills, Mass., in memory of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Anderson and sisters Beatie, Esther and Mildred.

Italian-American Club Event Well Attended

Over 200 Present, Including Town, State Officials; Congressman Sadlak Chief Speaker

Last Thursday I introduced a bill to permit the use of unutilized quotas for those persons of Italian nationality not able to come to the United States during the war years. They should have that opportunity now. I shall make every effort to get that bill passed," said Congressman-at-large Antonio N. Sodalak of Rockville in his address to the more than 200 people attending the 25th annual banquet of the Italian-American Club Saturday night.

In discussing Italian immigration to this country since 1939, Mr. Sodalak said that the year had made it impossible for Italy to fill its yearly quota of immigrants to the United States and he added that the opportunity to fill these quotas should be extended again.

Referring to Italian-Americans and other "hyphenated Americans" as "great builders of railroads, skyscrapers," as having acquired prominence in every field, the Congressman said, "we have always value that. Let us always cherish that. The further progress of this country depends on you and me."

Speaks Of War Records

Dwelling on the war record of Italian-Americans, the speaker said that "in World War I, the Medal of Honor was awarded to men of Italian descent. This is a marvelous record of patriotism and bravery."

Wishing success to the new administration headed by James Trigg, Mr. Sodalak also congratulated the founders of the club "who have held the fort for so many years."

Other honored guests and speakers at the dinner included former U. S. District Attorney Valentin J. Sacco of Hartford, General Manager George H. Waddell, Clerk of Court Aldo Pagani and Fire Commissioner Andrew Anasadi. Joseph Piro, president of the Rotary club, served as toastmaster for the affair that honored the outgoing administration headed by John Andino, and welcomed the new administration of James Trigg.

In his talk Attorney Sacco dwelt on "hyphenated Americans." He gave as a crisis through which this country has passed "the standstill of various racial groups that go to make up America." During the war he continued, there was a lot of criticism about the hyphenated American. But that person has nothing to be ashamed of, said the attorney. He has only to point to the honor rolls and to the list of American war dead, where the hyphenated American is well represented.

"America is and always has been a melting pot... The hyphenated American brings to this country... the best of culture of his lands."

Earlier in the evening, Toastmaster Piro announced the founding of a memorial to the late Judge William E. Hyde, in referring to Judge Hyde, who was always prominent in Italian circles, Mr. Piro said, "His club has lost a good friend."

Race Warfare Spreads Now; Looters Shot

many, 17 miles from here yesterday, killing four.

White people barricaded themselves in their homes and hotels in Pineville, also 17 miles away, when the Zulus went on the rampage.

The fighting between Indians and Zulus spread to Pietermaritzburg, Natal's capital.

Major Refugee Problem

Because more than 25,000 Indians had fled from their homes here and would not return, authorities were presented with a major refugee problem.

The only unbridled violence of the last three days has shocked the civilized world. Dr. G. M. Nutter, president of the Natal Indian Congress, said in a broadcast message.

He said the Indians were grateful for the assistance they had been given by responsible African native leaders. He thanks all those who had provided food, clothing and shelter for the thousands of Indian refugees. He appealed against racial feeling.

These riots, the report in South Africa's history, mark the first time Indians and Zulus have been pitted against each other in an open fight.

Foodstuffs In Short Supply

Economic dislocation has been blamed for the native unrest. The main foodstuffs of the blacks have been in short supply and they have claimed Indian merchants were gouging and forcing them to buy goods at inflated prices.

The natives say they are forced to buy goods at inflated prices at triple prices in order to get necessities.

There are few native traders and many rich Indian wholesalers, landlords and landowners. The poor native who couldn't afford to buy necessities at inflated prices at the Indian trader's shop, he said, is a victim of the new American model.

Segregation Laws Victims

Both are victims of South Africa's strict segregation laws. The Indians fought with passive resistance the Asiatic land tenure act which restricted Indians' rights to purchase land in certain areas.

Indians have given the natives support in their fight for greater political and economic freedom.

But the smoldering resentment of the better economic position of the Indians is regarded as the key to the fighting which broke out Thursday.

Vivien Kellems Withholds \$1,685.40 from Her 1948 Payment

Westport, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Miss Vivien Kellems, cable grip manufacturer, today renewed her battle with the government over the withholding tax law by herself withholding \$1,685.40 from her 1948 income tax payment.

The Westport industrialist contended in a letter to Secretary of the Treasury John W. Snyder said "today I have paid my 1948 income tax but I have deducted the sum of \$1,685.40 which you illegally took from me."

"If you wish that money you can sue me or you can again sue your Gestapo agent and grab it from the bank."

Amount Withheld Last May

The \$1,685.40 was the amount withheld last May from her account in the Westport Bank and Trust company when she refused to pay the first installment of the withholding tax for her employees. The sum of \$1,685.40 was in taxes due and a like amount in penalties.

Miss Kellems contended that she had no right to withhold money from her employees.

Power Facilities Face Another Critique

Portland, Ore., Jan. 17.—(AP)—Pacific northwest electric power facilities today faced another 24-hour critical operation period.

A voluntary dim-out appeal, until noon on a late afternoon hour, has been shifted to a full 24-hour program.

Housewives were asked to postpone until later in the week in the latest bid to keep the interstate interlocking transmission system from falling apart.

If power demand exceeds output, the load on the transformer points would automatically disconnect the network.

Several thousand kilowatt large industries would have to be shut down from the lines before services could be restored. Several thousand persons already are confined to plant undergrounds and utility substations in the lumber and aluminum industries.

Bonneville Power administration officials report that continued cold weather, which has reduced stream flow in the Columbia, is doing nothing to help matters, but is having more kilowattage than the situation. Furthermore, the great stress feeding power into the system have been drawing on reserve water resources to make up a 100,000 daily kilowatt deficit from stream flow capacity.

Officials are uncertain that today's load can be handled. Inquiries are being asked to cut down as much as 10 per cent of their power needs.
